

WAR PROGRAM GOES ON WITHOUT PAUSE DESPITE PEACE TALK

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.—The war department is steadily pressing forward its military program for the year 1919, despite the acceptance of armistice by the three great allies of the German empire.

It was announced today that orders for 4,350,811 tons of coal and coke have been placed by the raw materials division of the office of director of purchase and supply for the use of army camps, posts, forts, proving grounds and hospitals in this country for the coming year.

The army camps in this country now have a coal reserve for the winter approximating 600,000 tons.

Band music costing \$50,000 has been purchased for the use of the American expeditionary forces, regulation having been made by General Pershing that the 50 bands abroad might be better trained.

Brigadier General D. W. Wood, acting quartermaster general, stated today that orders have been placed with the British government for the manufacture of uniforms for the troops in France, the orders entailing the delivery of 1,800,000 pairs of trousers and 1,400,000 uniform coats.

About 50,000,000 pounds of prunes have been bought for the overseas forces, which is more than twice the amount used from the 1917 crop. Contracts also are being made for the purchase of canned sardines, the army abroad needing about \$100,000 worth.

MAN AND WIFE SUSPECTED OF MURDER HELD

TOLEDO, Or., Nov. 1.—The body of John J. Werner, a Siletta homesteader, found with a bullet hole in his head, buried near his cabin, led to the request for the arrest of Frank Brown and wife at Sherwood last night, the grand jury investigating the death of Werner having recommended the investigation of the Browns.

Werner disappeared on October 6, and the Browns, near neighbors, a few days later an Indian trailer secured to make the search, discovered the grave of Werner and the body with a bullet hole in the abdomen and a crushed head. Search for the Browns started immediately after the inquest, and they were located when Brown wrote to the local draft board giving his new address. On receipt of the letter, Sheriff Geer asked the Hillsboro sheriff to make the arrest, and a deputy from here is there today to bring the couple to this city to face the possible charge of murder.

AMERICAN PRISONERS TREATED BRUTAL IN DETENTION CAMPS

LONDON, Nov. 5.—Brutal treatment has been accorded American prisoners of war in the detention camps at Lemberg, Gressen and Darmstadt, said a Geneva dispatch to the Daily Express today. The captives' clothes are stolen and replaced with rags. Supplies sent by the American Red Cross are confiscated on the ground that they are war booty. The Red Cross has been notified of the circumstances.
