## NORTHWEST TROOPS GIVEN HIGH PRAISE BY ARMY AUTHORITIES

CAMP LEWIS, American Lake, Wn. Nov. 11 .- The 91st division, composed almost entirely of men drafted from California, Washington, Oregon, Utah, Wyoming, Idaho, Montana, Alaska, North and South Dakota and Minnesota in the first calls after the United States declared war on Germany, and which was the first division to be trained at Camp Lewis, has been in action and drawn the plaudits of the American commanding general.
