

PRESIDENT GREETED ON ENTRANCE INTO PARIS

PARIS, Dec. 14.—President Wilson made his entrance into Paris at 10:15 o'clock this morning. The president's arrival at the capital was greeted with a salvo of artillery in salute.

The dense throng gathered to greet the American executive hailed his coming with cries of cheering. Huge crowds were massed around the Bois de Cologne station awaiting the president's coming. As he alighted from his train a roar of welcome went up. There is no doubt of the cordiality of the greeting given by Paris to its latest guest.

President Wilson was greeted by President and Madame Poincare, Premier Clemenceau, Andre Tardieu, French high commissioner to the United States, and other high officials.

President Poincare greeted President Wilson warmly as the latter stepped from the train, the French executive firmly grasping him by the hand. William Marfin, who is attached to the foreign office as introducer of ambassadors, presented Premier Clemenceau, who welcomed President Wilson in English, saying he was extremely glad to meet him.

TRIBUTE IS PAID TO LAFAYETTE BY PRESIDENT WILSON

PARIS, Dec. 17.—President Wilson placed a wreath upon the tomb of Lafayette Sunday. Attached to it was a card upon which was written:

"To the memory of the great Lafayette, from a fellow servant of liberty."

Other than this simple tribute to the friend of America in her time of greatest need, the president's activities Sunday were limited to attendance upon two church services and two brief conferences, one with Premier Clemenceau and the other with Colonel E. M. House. A short call was made on President and Madame Poincare at the palace of the Elysee during the afternoon, and the evening was given over to a complete rest in anticipation of the strenuous week before him.

The American Presbyterian church in the Rue de Berri was visited by President and Mrs. Wilson in the morning. Admiral Grayson accompanied them to this service. His attendance at this particular church had been anticipated by a few, for he had made no statement of his intentions upon this score.

BOLSHEVIKI PLOT

LONDON, Dec. 14.—The Geneva Tribune today publishes details of a plot by agents of the Nikolai Lenin and Leon Trotsky, the Russian Bolsheviki leaders, against Premier Clemenceau, of France, declaring that two Bolshevists were apprehended as they were crossing the French frontier, according to an Exchange Telegraph dispatch.

AIRPLANE PASSENGER LINE ACROSS OCEAN WILL START SOON

NEW YORK, Dec. 17.—Captain Benjamin B. Lipsner, who resigned recently as superintendent of the government airmail service, announces that, backed by a group of wealthy men, he will establish next year the first aerial passenger and express lines in this country.

Captain Lipsner said that he was not at liberty to announce proposed routes, but asserted that the first line would be put into operation on May 15, 1919. The service, he said, would be started with six planes, each with a speed of 110 miles an hour and a capacity of 40 passengers or an equivalent weight in express. Equipment of passenger planes, he said, will include a wireless telephonic system and all latest scientific appliances. The rates "will be within the reach of all," he said.

Captain Lipsner also said that unless some one else has already done so, on June 15 he will make the first trans-Atlantic flight, selecting the same route followed by the transport George Washington in taking President Wilson to France. He added that "a seagoing plane" to be used in the flight is now being constructed.

QUESTIONNAIRES TO BE FILED AND KEPT IN WASHINGTON D. C.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17.—All questionnaires which have been filled out and returned to local draft boards are to be kept as historical records in war department vaults here.

Practically every man in the United States between the ages of 18 and 45 has filled out one of these blank forms, thereby placing himself at the service of the government in the past emergency. The only exceptions are those near the age limit of 45, who were the last to receive questionnaires. Those which were not filled out before the armistice was signed have been returned to the provost marshal general's office.

All questionnaires are to be sealed and kept for reference, it was stated today. Chief among the uses to which they will be put are:

- First—Will be used in connection with other data, to aid war risk insurance bureau in checking up on soldiers due to receive allowances for injury or service.
- Second—Will provide a record for men eligible to enter organizations similar to the G. A. R., which will undoubtedly be formed after all the soldiers have returned home.

DUTCH PRESS URGES KAISER BE MADE LEAVE

AMSTERDAM, Dec. 13.—The Nieuwe van den Tag urges the government to request the Hohenzollerns to leave the country. Premier Beerensbruck declared in a speech that the government is willing to discuss with the entente extradition of the former kaiser, providing the discussion is in keeping with Holland's honor and dignity. He stated that the present arrangement is provisional.

CLACKAMAS HAS LARGE AREA OF LAND GUARDED

SALEM, Or., Dec. 14.—(Special to the Enterprise)—Thirty thousand, six hundred and seventeen acres of timbered lands in Clackamas County were patrolled under the direction of State Forester Elliott, according to figures which have just been compiled in his office relative to the patrol work for 1918. This does not include all the patrols in that county, but only those under the law which require the State Forestry department to patrol lands for which patrol of no other kind is provided. When such a patrol is made the cost of it is charged against the timber owned, and is assessed on the books against the same as the cost for other taxes.

APPROPRIATIONS ARE MADE BY BOARD FOR STATE DEFICIENCIES

SALEM, Or., Dec. 14.—Deficiency appropriations made by the state emergency board during the last biennium which must be provided for by the next legislature total \$552,385, according to figures on the books of Secretary of State Olcott, who is secretary of the board. The amounts allowed by deficiency appropriation follow in the order in which they were allowed.

Executive department to meet needs of state council of defense, \$5,000.

It is remembered here that when the candidacy of Jones was in a very embryonic form that one of his first announcements was that he had the Marlon and Clackamas delegations behind him in the race to the finish. Jones is very reticent about what he intends to do in the matter of committees, but political wisheads are satisfied that he is not going to forget his first loves who were with him when his chances for speakership seemed somewhat doubtful to many and it is expected that Clackamas will get its full share of patronage when the lid is lifted from the patronage pot.

MORE MONEY SOUGHT TO FINISH FISHWAY AT OREGON CITY

SALEM, Or., Dec. 16.—(Special to the Enterprise)—Appropriation of an additional \$5000 will be sought by the State Fish and Game Commission of the next Legislature for the completion of the fishway at Oregon City.

Ten thousand dollars was granted for this purpose by the last Legislature and Master Fish Warden Clanton has reported to the Governor that satisfactory progress has been made on the work.

All of the Master Fish Warden's reports have indicated that the fish and game commission is more and more considering the Oregon City location as an important part of the salmon development work in the state.

SALEM, Or., Dec. 14.—(Special to the Enterprise)—Orders by the State Highway Commission to the Columbia Contract Company for delivery of 50,000 tons of crushed rock and 2200 tons of asphaltum, deliveries to start by the first of the year, practically insures during the coming year the completion of the Pacific Highway from Oregon City to Salem.

The road will be paved from Aurora to Salem and the rock and asphaltum are for that purpose to be dumped along the Pacific Highway at convenient points so that it can be picked up readily for use early in the spring when actual construction work will start.

Efforts have been made in the past to get ahead with this work, but just when the sailing seemed clear something arose to sidetrack it. The last insurmountable obstacle was the war and highway work was definitely delayed until peace was in sight. With all the bars now down there seems no chance of the work being delayed further than the close of the next season when it is expected it will be completed.

Another year or two will be seen finished a gigantic loop from Salem to Portland on the East Side and back on the West Side, with Oregon City one of the show spots along the highway. Tourist travel through the valley towns is expected to increase by leaps and bounds with the finishing of these magnificent stretches of roadway.
