#### NEW TELEPHONE RATE SCHEDULE IS EFFECTIVE

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20.-Despite he opposition of the public utilities commissions of several states, the new schedule of telephone toll rates will be put into effect tonight at midnight. Among the states that have objected to Postmaster General Burleson's new rates are Nebraska, Illinois, Ohio and Michigan. The effect of the schedule is to place all toll rates throughout the country on a uniform

Under the new arrangement a "station to station" rate is the basis upon which all tolls for the various classes of services are to be computed. This rate is made from one telephone to another without specifying that a particular person is desired. The rate is determined by the airline distance between toll points and is computed for the initial talking period on the basis of 5 cents for each six miles up to 24 miles, and 5 cents additional eight miles.
