FORCE MAY BE USED TO QUIET RUSSIANS

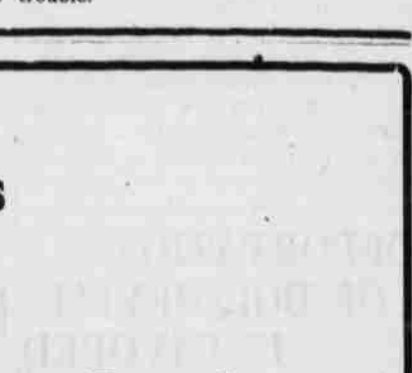
PARIS, Feb. 19.—Several plans for a solution of the Russian problem have been laid before the supreme council. Only one of these plans involves the use of force. It is based on the idea that the reluctance of the allied powers to the use of their arms against what some of them regard as only a "workingmen's government" can be met by recourse to a volunteer army. It is held that no difficulty would be encountered in raising almost any desired number of soldiers for a Russian campaign from the millions of men now being discharged from the armies of the entente and America.

Several members of the council doubt, however, whether their governments would escape Socialistic wrath by even this indirect method of combatting Bolshevism.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26.—Grain growers in Idaho, Oregon and Washington, organized as the Inland Empire Shippers' league, filed with the interstate commerce commission today an attack upon the 25 per cent increase in freight rates on grain and grain products made by the railroad administration last June.

The mayor, who started life as a bootblack and was elected head of Seattle's city government in 1917, took a firm grip on things, organized extra police and gave them orders to shoot to kill any fomenters of trouble.

MARKET REPORT

Various kinds of vegetables are in the market today. These include parsnips, celery, rutabagas, spinach, turnips, carrots, cabbage, young onions, dried onions. These are home grown, and are fresh each day in the local markets.

During the past week creamery butter advanced from 53 to 54 cents, while eggs decreased two cents per dozen. Large amount of eggs are now arriving in the local markets and many are shipped to the Portland markets.

California fruits are more plentiful in the markets, and are finding a steady market. In the livestock department veal has gone from 21 to 22 cents; live hogs from 14 to 16 cents; dressed hogs from 19 to 22 cents. Spring chickens are finding good demand at 25 cents per pound.
