There was a light mist but hardly any wind, and the water was smooth for the start of the president's second voyage to the peace conference.

Although the progress of the George Washington from her wharf in Hoboken to the narrows, the entrance into the bay, was quiet and unattended by any demonstration, there was a rousing sendoff as the transport passed the harbor forts and the war vessels anchored under their guns.


