Use this on calliflower also. The aphides or lice should be sprayed with nicotine sulphate solution, repeating if necessary. Aphis often attack peas, beans, squash, pumpkin and melon leaves. The under side of the leaves should be sprayed as well as the top.

Aphides, sap-sucking insects, also infest rose bushes and should be sprayed with nicotine sulphate. Aphidse or plant lice are one of the most prolific of insects, producing in its twelfth broad 10,000,000,000,000,000, 000,000 offsprings. The squash bug dose its damage to roung plants. They may be picked by hand. As they prefer squash as food one can diminish their attack on melons, cucumbers, eggplant etc, by planting in the beds of the latter an occasional "trap plant," as handpicking will be easier on a few trap plants than over the whole field. A small board laid beside the young plant often furnishes night shelter for the bugs, which may be collected and killed the next morning.

The beetle inflicts damage on the potato, tomato and other garden plants. Any substance disagreeable to the beetle such as plaster, soot,
