A Non-Salaried Reform

Every citizen of Oregon should go to the polls Tuesday and cast a vote in favor of the constitutional amendment providing for the creation of the office of lieutenant-governor.

This amendment is calculated to provide for an emergency, which has occurred a number of times in this state and is confronting us today. If we had had a lieutenant-governor, we would not now be facing a problem that the supreme court should not have been called upon to solve. The death or resignation of a governor brings about a condition that is not conducive to the welfare of our state.

Under the terms of the proposed amendment the lieutenant-governor would be elected by the people in 1922. He would draw no salary, except that during the legislative session, he would preside over the state senate and receive a salary of \$10 a day for 40 days very two years. This provision would eliminate the log-rolling over the choice of a president of the senate, which has become a biennial spectacle in Oregon.

Here is an office that carries no salary, but is a provision against the hand of providence throwing a monkey wrench into the machinery of the state government.
