Labor and Progress

The American Federation of Labor is not making an enviable record for progressiveness at its national convention in Atlantic City. It promptly vetoed, by an overwhelming vote a proposal to have the federation's affairs conducted under the initiative and referendum and Brother Samuel Compers, who is as thick as two in a bed with Mr. Wilson, is loud in his opposition to prohibition, which, he says, the laboring people do not want. "No beer, no work!" says Brother Compers, or words to that effect.

We should explain that the delegates from the Pacific Northwest, where we live under the beneficent reign of the initiative and referendum, stood firmly by their local colors.

Eastern labor delegates never lived in Oregon City during the palmy days of the wets. They never saw 16 saloons scattered along and bordering on one street. They did not know that 75 per cent of the checks issued by the paper companies were cashed in drink resorts. They had no knowledge of the unpaid grocery and butcher bills. They were probably not informed that wages were diverted from the needs of the mothers and children to the mahogany bars.

TRACT IN GLADSTONE TAKEN BY M'RAE FOR HIGH GRADE POULTRY

A real estate deal of some importance to the community has just been consummated by O. E. Freytag of Gladstone. The A. Jones tract of eight acres on the northeast boundary of Gladstone has been purchased by J. R. McRae, president of the Oregon Poultry Dealers Association, and interested in the McKenna Park Poultry Farm, Portland.

A poultry expert was engaged to go over the grounds, and he pronounced location, soil and contour of the land ideal for poultry raising. Buildings of the type best adapted to successful breeding and raising will be erected at once.

Mr. McRae has had five years experience in this line of work, and has tramped continuously for four years, and about July 1 will move 900 pedigreed White Leghorns and Rhode Island Red hens and pullets to his new ranch where he will continue to trumpet all his laying stock.

Mr. McRae hopes eventually to have the finest breeding plant in the state for producing heavy laying White Leghorns and Rhode Island Reds, and with foundation stock of tried and proven merit, his hopes are not without reason.

In the All-Northwest laying contest at Pullman, Wash., last year Mr. McRae's Leghorn No. 191 laid 232 eggs for the year, taking second place over all entrants, a splendid record, and a testimonial for good blood and careful breeding. Besides this record maker, there are pens of hens ranging from 200 to 250 eggs per year.

Mr. McRae is a young man of energy and initiative, and a splendid business will no doubt be worked up by him in his new location.
