Farm Bureau Notes of Interest

TUBERCULOSIS.

Some people may wonder what the Farm Bureau has to do with tuberculosis. As a matter of fact this dreaded disease which annually kills more people than any other one malady, except perhaps recently influenza, is the most serious disease of cattle, and also affects hogs and chickens. Because tuberculosis works silently and sometimes slowly, it is often neglected. It not only affects animals, causing a loss by being transferred to healthy ones, but also may very easily be communicated from infected animals to human beings.

It may be said that the state law requires cows from which milk is sold must be free from tuberculosis. The state veterinary will test free all cows from which it is desired to sell fresh milk. Dealers who do not sell milk from tested cows must pasteurize it, thus destroying all germs. The cities and towns are thus protected by law, as they should be, for milk is the one indispensable food, and one which should be more widely used.

But there are many farmers in Clackamas County who are unknowingly harboring tuberculous cows. There are no outward symptoms which can be relied upon. Sometimes the healthiest looking animals are affected. Coughing may or may not indicate the presence of the disease. The only sure test is the tuberculin test, administered by a competent veterinarian.

Many farmers who would fight a cattle thief, or raise a great howl if coyotes or cougars destroyed his

calves, will sit quietly by and let the T. B. sneak into his herd and spoil it. There needs to be a campaign for tuberculin testing in our county. If any man has an infected animal he is making money to give it away, anything to get it out of his herd. But the state will help him out. An indemnity is given, which varies according to circumstances, but which in addition to value of the carcass is enough to cover the worth of the cow. The county agent looks forward to the time when Clackamas county will go on the accredited list, and have every cow tuberculin tested, and have every cow that comes into the county tested. This is no idle dream. Other counties have done it.

TAKING THE HOP OUT OF GRASSHOPPERS.

Over in Clackamas county they have a county agent who is making things hot for the grasshoppers. He has been serving a light cafeteria lunch to them composed mostly of arsenic and bran and sawdust and molasses. He dishes out 200 or 400 pounds of arsenic at a time, wet down with five or six barrels of molasses, with a few oranges and lemons to give it a "kick" and a filler of bran and sawdust. Then a few days later he goes out to count the dead and wounded. An average of counts taken at random showed 139 dead hoppers to the square foot. 25 dead ones were picked up in one horse track. Clackamas county must have been very much alive. But apparently it is dead now, since this live county agent came in.

CANNING COMPOUNDS.

Slovenly housewives may save themselves some bother by using canning compounds when they put up their fruit. But they are taking chances on injuring the health of the family by doing so. It is not necessary to use canning compounds in order to make fruit keep. Proper methods of canning will preserve almost any kind of food for a long time. If you are uncertain on this matter send to your home demonstration agent at Oregon City for bulletins along this line.

POULTRY CULLING.

One of the things which makes for success in poultry is culling the flock. If only laying hens were kept on the farms of Clackamas county, there might not be so many of them, but there would be a very much greater profit. Now, there are ways by which the non layers can be told. Perhaps the best time for doing this is in September. Generally speaking, the early moults are the poorest layers. There are a number of signs by which the wise one can tell whether a hen is doing her duty or just loafing. Recently Prof. Brewster of the O. A. C. gave a culling demonstration at Henry Voss farm over near the Washington county line. This meeting was well attended and careful attention was given while the method of culling was outlined and a large number of birds were given the "once over" and their fate determined. It is planned to get Mr. Brewster back again for similar demonstrations in September. Notices will be given in due time as to where these will be held.

The Americans Come

The Oregon Spectator was first published here February 5, 1846, and was the spokesman for the Oregon territory until its suspension in 1855.

These visitors who are due in Oregon City on the afternoon of Saturday, August 9, will have something to say about our town. Nearly every one of them will write something about Oregon City for his own paper. They are coming from Gooding, Idaho, from Davenport, Wash., from LeMars, Iowa, from Springfield, Ill., from Newton, Mass., from Little Rock, Ark., from Mapleton, Minn., and from hundreds of other cities all over this country. They are live people.

It would be well, therefore, for the business men along Main street to put on their best bibs and tuckers, clean their windows, and freshen up, so as to give our friends, the newspaper people, a good and lasting impression of our city and ourselves.

EXPORTS TAKE JUMP DURING JUNE WITH MANY RECORDS BROKEN

A remarkable jump in exports during June brought the total for the fiscal year 1919 to more than seven billion dollars, a new record, according to a statement issued today by the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce, Department of Commerce.

The June exports are put at \$918,000,000, which exceeds the previous high record established in April of this year, by more than \$200,000,000. Exports for June of last year were valued at \$434,000,000. Total exports for the fiscal year stand at \$7,225,000,000, as compared with \$5,920,000,000 for the fiscal year 1918. This is more than three times the exports for 1914, the last normal year. Exports since the armistice was signed in November are estimated at about \$5,000,000,000. The excess of exports over imports for the fiscal year 1919 was \$4,129,000,000 against \$3,000,000,000 the previous year and less than \$500,000 in 1914.

Imports for June were valued at \$293,000,000, a falling off from the total of \$329,000,000 recorded for May, but an increase over the \$260,000,000 for June of the previous year. Total imports for the fiscal year just closed are placed at \$3,096,000,000, as against \$2,946,000,000 for 1918.

The removal of wartime restrictions caused a decided increase in the exports of gold, from less than \$2,000,000 each in April and May to \$83,000,000 in June. Gold exports for the fiscal year amounted to \$117,000,000, against \$191,000,000 for 1918. Exports of silver fell off from \$29,000,000 in May to \$13,000,000 in June, but increased from \$139,000,000 for the fiscal year 1918 to \$301,000,000 for 1919.

MISSING MAN THOUGHT SUFFERING MENTAL LAPSE; NOT DROWNED

According to a report received at the Sheriff's office Wednesday afternoon the Portland police department has been advised that a stranger, suspected of being Lester St. Onge, who disappeared in this city last Friday, was seen at the fire station at Fourth and Montgomery streets in Portland on Sunday, after he had been reported drowned above the Hawley mill here.

George Ashler, a fireman stationed at the Portland fire station at Fourth and Montgomery streets, declared Wednesday morning that he was positive that the young man who is supposed to be St. Onge was in the station for several hours last Sunday, having recalled the incident from his curious actions at the time and from a photograph published in the Portland papers following his reported drowning.

Mr. Ashler stated Wednesday that the stranger told him and other members of the department at the station that he was unable to remember who he was or where he came from, and a thorough search of his clothing failed to reveal any marks of identification. He told the firemen that he was subject to mental lapses. After inquiring the way to the hospital and also to the state insane asylum the young man disappeared, according to Mr. Ashler.
