

MANIAC BELIEVED SLAYER OF YOUNG GIRL NEAR BANDON

MARSHFIELD, July 30.—That an insane person may have killed Lillian Leuthold, 16-year-old daughter of John Leuthold, near Bandon, is a theory held by authorities. When the body was found Sunday evening in the bushes near an unfrequented road through which the girl passed on her way home from a visit to her chum, daughter of the Rev. Jennings, the torn condition of her clothes led to the belief that the murderer had attempted an assault. The doctors disprove this theory.

Further than the two pistol shot wounds in the head there were no marks of violence.

A bed made of boughs and canvas was found near the scene of the crime and a stranger, probably a tramp, was seen sleeping there last Thursday night and was seen in the neighborhood Saturday. He has not been seen since the murder and searches for him have been fruitless. Descriptions of him are indefinite.

The girl did not carry any money and two rings which she wore were not removed from her fingers, which tends to show robbery was not the motive.

There is an unsupported rumor that a woman is suspected. The murder apparently lacked motive and therefore baffles investigators.

CHICAGO CAR SYSTEM TIED UP BY STRIKE

CHICAGO, July 29.—Chicago was caught today by a surprise strike of traction company employees, who housed their cars at 4 a. m. Both elevated and surface line employees rejected the compromise engineered by Governor F. C. Lowden in their wage controversy. Fifteen thousand men refused an offer of 20 cents an hour increase. The strike decision came late last night, when streetcar men, in a riotous meeting, were carried along by radicals, who demanded a 77 per cent raise.

"To hell with the public," was one of the yells raised by the radicals. Chicago went to bed Monday assured the wage disagreement between the roads and their men had been settled. Leaders of the unions had agreed to the compromise and asserted it would go through.

A mass meeting of carmen sprung the surprise by voting loudly against the compromise and deciding to strike at 4 a. m., only a few hours after the meeting closed.

Suggestions from the crowd in the meeting that the men walk out at 4 a. m. were approved by acclamation. The action was concurred in at once by elevated workers.

Almost immediately the strike began to become effective.

UNITED STATES HOLDS NINE BILLIONS OF EUROPEAN CREDITS

WASHINGTON, July 26.—The United States now holds \$9,615,400, 927.65 worth of I. O. U.'s of the allies. This total was reached today when a new loan was made to France for \$157,549,000.

Beasts

The girl's parents thought she was spending the night with her friend, as this has been her occasional custom, and did not become alarmed until her failure to return home the following morning. Whether they were careless of her safety, or not, is beside the question. She was walking along a public highway, and was at the mercy of the beast who overcame her.

In the national capital, the other day, the disregard of colored people for the safety of white women caused a riot that resulted in the death of a number of people. Such occurrences are not rare in the south. Out here, thank God, they are not so frequent. One's blood surges to the boiling point at the recital of the terrible story of Coos County.

The beast who is responsible for the crime should be treated in a manner that will be an example to other beasts of his kind.

With a Yank and a Tommy she herself escaped and got as far as Hamburg. She was in the vilest of prisons for more than a year and when she got out weighed only seventy-five pounds.

They also visited for two days in the Yellowstone Park, and saw many wonderful sights. Returning to the coast states, they visited Seattle and Washington.

Mrs. DeBok says since leaving here she saw no section of country to compare with Oregon, except the Yakima valley, where the crops are abundant.

More Prehistoric Mounds Are Found

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, July 26.—Carlton B. Swift, of the Swift Packing company, B. G. White of Portland, Ralph R. Cronis, editor of the Albany Democrat, and Professor J. B. Horner of the college, who visited the prehistoric burial grounds on the Calapooia, following the recent explorations made by students of the O. A. C. summer school under Professor Horner, discovered two additional mounds on the Osburn farm. In all approximately 30 mounds have been located on the banks of the Calapooia and half as many on near by streams.

PORTLAND, July 26.—Pam Finley, retail merchandiser of the California Fruit Growers' exchange, the famous Southern California cooperative association which packs and distributes "Sun Kist" oranges and lemons, was a visitor in Oregon this week.
