CABIN WALL PAPERED WITH THE ENTERPRISE

Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Graham and Mr. and Mrs. H. H. Keoles formed a motoring party leaving Canby Saturday for the Bee ranch in the Molalla country, where they remained until Sunday evening. Flaming was good and the party had fish for every meal after arriving at their destination.

Two years ago Mr. Graham visited the point, and several miles beyond he came across an old cabin known as the "dungeon" and occupied many years ago by an old settler, who had made his living by killing elk. The settler's body was found years ago in his cabin by several hunters, and was buried close by his little home in the mountains, and the little mound is often remembered by hunters and flowers placed thereon when visiting at the point. The walls of the old man's home are papered with old Oregon City Enterprise copies, some which bear the date of early '60s, one of the copies having a headline telling of the erection of a brick building in Oregon City by Captain Pope. Mr. Graham had desired to have a number of these copies as a souvenir, but after a second thought decided not to deface the interior of the old mountaineer's home by removing them, as he had placed these papers by his own hands.

GRAIN DISPLAYED.

In the office of J. J. Sandness on Main Street are some fine samples of grain grown in the Canby districts. Among these displaying some of the grain grown this year are Nels Stefansson, who has barley and wheat, also some of the bearded wheat Henry Smith, who has oats that will go about 50 bushels to the acre; Colonel Whipple, oats and wheat; Wesley Riggs, oats; Charles Spencer, wheat.

By having these samples displayed will be an inducement to farmers who are looking for a place to settle to come to Canby.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4.—Maintenance of one field army with a strength of 1,250,000 men is proposed in a bill establishing a permanent military policy which was sent to congress today by Secretary Baker.

The active force of this army would be 510,000 regulars, while the remainder would be young men who had tak-

FIRE QUESTION IS MAIN TOPIC AT BOARD MEET

The outstanding feature of the monthly session of the city council Wednesday evening was the discussion attendant upon the petition of M. J. Lee for the renewal of the franchise which he has held for the operation of a bus between Oregon City and Canby. In his petition presented Wednesday evening Mr. Lee asked that he be granted a franchise for a period of five years from the date of expiration of his present franchise, which expires within a short time.

A mild surprise was sprung coincident with the presenting of Mr. Lee's petition was read in which it was attested that an automobile operated by Mr. Huffon was struck by the stage bus operated by Mr. Lee near New Era and that an attempt to recover damages in the amount of \$21 from Mr. Lee had been unsuccessful through the failure of any provision for a bond to be furnished by Mr. Lee. A considerable amount of discussion followed the reading of the petition for the two franchises and the affidavit, with the result that a clause was written into each petition providing for the furnishing of bonds by the two petitioners, and the petitions were then declared as having passed their first reading and were posted for a second reading and final passage at a special meeting to be held on August 18.

It was voted in connection with the franchises presented that an ordinance be drawn up providing for the payment of a license by all busses and commercial carrier trucks engaged in the handling of freight to and from Oregon City, this license to be in the amount of \$120 a year, payable quarterly in advance. The passage of this ordinance will affect a considerable number of trucks operating out of Portland and making deliveries in this city and will furnish a considerable amount of revenue to the city.

The petition of the Gas company for permission to extend two gas mains was granted.

The report of City Health Officer Norris was read and approved. The report showed that there are but five cases of smallpox in the city at present and that all these cases are progressing favorably and will probably be discharged from quarantine by the 21st of the month. No new cases have been reported for the past two weeks outside of families where cases already exist.

A letter from J. E. Hedges, chairman of the library board, was read, in which Mr. Hedges thanked the city council for its offer to assist in raising funds for the assistance of the library through the levying of a one mill tax.

The application of Wm. Stone for permission to connect his property at 12th and Taylor streets with the city sewer was read and referred to the committee on sewers with power to act.

In pursuance to previous instructions the council ordered the sale of lot one in block 115 to E. M. Howell reported for first reading and posted for second reading and final passage at the special meeting on August 18.

The report of the Finance committee was read and approved. It was ordered that the Southern Pacific and Willamette Valley Southern railways be sent bills covering the cost to the city of the excavation and paving of the street at 14th and Washington at the point where the railroad right of way crosses the street.

On motion by Councilman Kelly the committee on Fire and Water was instructed to confer and work out some feasible plan for the reorganization of the Fire department that would make for increased efficiency. Councilman Kelly was appointed as a member of the committee by the Mayor.

Judge Anderson addressed the council meeting at considerable length regarding the manner of controlling the condition and grade of the Pacific highway within the city limits and in the course of his discussion made the emphatic statement that the time has come that the road tax be levied in the same manner as the general tax and that the county court have control of the spending of the entire road tax, instead of allowing the cities 70 per cent of the road tax for the maintenance of streets, as is done at present. Judge Anderson remarked his firm intention to endeavor to bring about legislation that would make possible the vesting of full road authority in the hands of the county court. Discussion of this point revealed the fact that Oregon City would be deprived of an annual fund of \$20,000 with which to maintain its streets and lay new pavement should such legislation be passed, and that the only manner in which funds would be made available for street work would be through the levying of an additional tax on city property. Through the proposed arrangement Judge Anderson stated that it would be the duty of the county to repair and maintain the city streets of the cities of the county after payment of assessments for street work has been completed by the property owners.

The remarks of the Judge elicited a considerable amount of discussion and the mayor ordered that the City Attorney and Finance committee confer with the county court further on the subject.

After consideration of several subjects of minor importance the council adjourned to meet in special session on Monday, August 18.

Farm Bureau Notes of Interest

Edited by R. G. Scott, County Agent.

During July there were 601 mole skins handled in the County Agent's office, for which 134.76 was received and distributed among the boys and girls of the county. This is an average of 22 cents each. The highest price per skin was 30 cents and a number did not bring more than 10 cents. Considering the damage the moles do to crops and gardens, there is a double profit to be derived from trapping them.

J. L. Smith who has been county agent for Coos county nearly six years, has resigned his office to become connected with three banks in that county. His work will be to advise the farmers how they can borrow money to advantage, and to protect the banks from ill-advised loans. This makes the third county agent in the last few years to become connected with a bank. It is significant that the banks are taking more interest in loans to farmers. The security is almost always the best, and on the other hand a great many farmers would do well

to use their credit more for such things as buying better stock or better machinery with which to improve their crops. Recently a man in our county who has paid what is considered a high price for a heifer calf of exceptional breeding discussed this point. He remarked that if he had bought a high priced automobile his neighbors would have congratulated him; but his heifer is increasing in value constantly, and will begin to pay returns on the investment about the time that an automobile would have to be sold or traded in, at a big discount, to say nothing of the cost of running the car. Too many men are using their credit for buying automobiles and not enough are using their credit for the purchase of strictly high class livestock.

The Canada thistles are spreading. There are many new patches showing up this year. Most of the owners of these patches are making an honest effort to control them. But some are not, and it is planned to invoke the

full penalty of the law on those men who allow the thistle to go to seed. What difference is there from a moral standpoint whether you allow a bull to run loose and tear down fences and destroy crops, or allow your dog to kill your neighbors sheep; or whether you allow the Canada thistle to spread from your field to your neighbors? When once the Canada thistle is established it means hours of hard work to get it out. It often means losing a crop from that field for several years, in order to destroy it by summer fallow. The problem of making a living from a farm is difficult enough without having the sins of other peoples carelessness visited on those who keep their own fields clean.

Beginning Friday, August 8, the county agent will take his first vacation, lasting for two weeks. Most of this time will be spent on his own farm fixing up the fences and burning logs. During his absence the office work will be in charge of his stenographer, who will take care of the routine work.

D. A. R. WILL PRESENT ROSES TO WIVES OF EDITORIAL DELEGATES

It is the intention of the Daughters of the American Revolution of this city to present roses to the wives and other ladies accompanying the editors here Saturday, and it is desired by the organization to have the women of this city or others having roses to donate these to the wives. The flowers are to be left at the home of Mrs. George A. Harding before 1 p. m., and will be distributed to the visitors upon their arrival here for the dedication of the monument in honor of the Oregon Spectator, the first newspaper of Oregon City.

CHARLES RICHARDSON AT CAMP MERRITT ON WAY HOME FROM FRANCE

Mrs. C. W. Richardson received a telegram this morning from the Salvation Army War Department, advising her of the arrival of her son, Charles Richardson, at Camp Merritt, where he is temporarily stationed.

Richardson has been with the Army of Occupation and has been stationed in Germany, being at the German border when the armistice was signed. He left here in 1917 with Company D, 162nd Infantry.

DEGENERATE TERROR OF MOTHERS OF SMALL GIRLS IN PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Aug. 2.—For months past the police have been on the look-out for a degenerate who has been molesting young girls, the majority of them not over six years of age. The case has become so hopeless that they now appeal to parents to keep a closer watch on their children.

A score of cases have been reported, apparently all at the hands of the same man, who from the meager description of the little children, is about 30 or 35 years of age and of medium build. He approaches little girls as they are playing and asks them if they wish to see some rabbits or white rabbits.

He takes them to some wooded spot, where the poor little tots suffer from a terrible assault. This has happened in nearly all parts of the city.

Motorcycle policemen have answered these calls time after time and have spent much time scouring the vicinity for the fiend.

Mint Taxed in Coining Pennies

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 2.—The abnormal demand for pennies is still taxing the capacity of the Philadelphia mint, the enormous total of 38,931,000 having been struck during July. The other coinage consisted of 950,000 dimes and 9,306,000 nickels.

CLACKAMAS COUNTY SCHOOLS RECEIVE YEARLY ALLOTMENT

According to advices just received by County Superintendent of Schools J. E. Calavan, Clackamas County's allotment of the interest from the State Irreducible School funds for the present year will amount to \$21,590.15.

This amount will be divided among the districts on a basis of a total enrollment of 11,277 children of school age between the ages of 4 and 20 years.

SENATE PROPOSES CURRENCY REDUCTION AS HIGH COST REMEDY

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2.—The senate this afternoon passed a resolution introduced by Senator Myers of Montana, ordering the banking and currency committee of the senate to investigate the amount of currency in circulation and to make recommendations as to the wisdom of withdrawing currency in circulation.

Senator Myers declared that inflation of currency is the cause of the high cost of living and stated that an investigation by the banking and currency committee will provide a remedy by offering a plan to withdraw currency without causing a panic.

Congress has been hauled up short by unrest throughout the country over the high cost of living.

AUTO LICENSES IN STATE EXCEED NUMBER OF YEAR'S ESTIMATE

SALEM, Aug. 2.—With a total of 75,044 automobiles bearing the Oregon license tag up to the close of business July 31, the 75,000 mark set early in the year as the probable maximum registrations for 1919 has already been passed and five months yet to come. It is now confidently expected that 80,000 automobiles will have been registered by the automobile department in the secretary of state's office by the end of the year.
