SALEM FRUIT UNION SELLS PEAR CROP AT RECORD MARK PRICE

SALEM, Or., Aug. 23.—At the record-breaking price of \$85 a ton the Salem Fruit union yesterday sold its pear crop to canneries at Sheridan, Woodburn and Lafayette. Manager Robert C. Paulus declares this is the highest figure ever received for pears in the Northwest. The cost of delivery to the canneries will be about \$5 a ton.

A carload of dried loganberries which brought the union \$29,000, was shipped yesterday to various points in Canada. Another carload will be shipped in October.

CAREFUL SPRAYING FOR CODDLING MOTH WILL SAVE APPLES

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Aug. 23.—Oregon apple growers last year lost from 18 to 80 per cent of their fruit in many districts from the September "ating" of the coddling moth. Damage has been slight in the Willamette valley so far from the coddling moth and the good record may be maintained for the year by thoroughly spraying the apples and late pears August 25 to 30, says A. L. Lovett, entomologist of the college station. Use lead arsenate powder 3 to 3½ pounds—twice as much lead arsenate paste—to 100 gallons of water and coat every fruit.

All Officers Killed, He Led Company to Victory

The largest number of war decorations presented at one time on this side of the Atlantic was conferred on forty-four enlisted men and officers of New York regiments at New York's city hall. One of them was Sergeant Thomas J. Haynes of Jersey City, ordered to be made a Knight of the Order of Leopold by the Belgian government. After his captain and three lieutenants were killed in the Argonne campaign, although wounded, took command of his company and led it into a successful action.

DAN CUPID WINS IN RACE FOR SERVICES OF LIEUTENANT TOOZE

The university of Oregon has been receiving requests from different towns not included in the itinerary of Lieut. Lamar Tooze, the Oregon boy who is now giving a series of lectures upon his experiences as a soldier in France and Belgium and his impressions of the international situation gained during a four months stay in Paris during the session of the Peace Conference, asking that Lieut. Tooze speak in those towns.

Lieut. Tooze and Miss Marie Sheehan, an Oregon City girl temporarily living in Canada, are to be married in Ocean Falls, B. C., Sept. 11. Being necessary at the wedding, Lieut. Tooze has stated that though he would welcome the opportunity to make the lectures, still—well, he can't. The last lecture of the tour is scheduled Sept. 2 at Pendleton and Mr. Tooze will leave for the Canadian city Sept. 3.

The romance started at the University of Oregon while both were students there. Miss Sheehan was there but one year, 1914-15. She continued her studies at the University of Wisconsin. Lieut. Tooze, after his graduation from the University of Oregon in 1916 took up his law studies in Harvard Law School. When the war broke out he dropped his books and enlisted. Miss Sheehan is a member of Chi Omega sorority and Lieut. Tooze is a member of Beta Theta Pi. After their marriage they will leave over the Canadian Pacific for Cambridge, Mass., where they will make their home during the next two years while Mr. Tooze is completing his studies. Upon graduation from the law school they expect to return to Oregon.

OREGON CITY YOUNG LADY FINDS SUCCESS IN HOME ECONOMICS

The experience of Miss Evangeline Dye ought to be an encouragement to Oregon City girls who are studying Home Economics. After graduating from the high school here she took four years at the Oregon Agricultural college with side excursions into cafeteria and institutional management and hospital nursing since graduating in June of this year.

Miss Dye has been elected to four high schools with salaries varying from \$500 to \$1200 a year. At the latter figure she has accepted a position at Raymond, Washington, where school begins September 8.

FIREBUG ARRESTED IN GRANTS PASS FOR SETTING HOME AFIRE

Salem, Aug. 22.—H. H. Pomeroy, special deputy of the state fire marshal's office, returned Friday morning from the Grants Pass country with the signed confession of F. D. Morton to the effect that he had deliberately set fire to his residence in Grants Pass on the evening of August 14.

Morton is in the county jail at Grants Pass, charged with setting fire to his residence for the purpose of securing the insurance money. He will face a sentence of from one to three years in the state prison.

SALEM PAPER COMPANY MOVES MILLION POUND BUILDING BODILY

Salem, Ore., Aug. 26.—Nearly a million pounds is the weight of a warehouse, formerly owned by the Salem Flour Mills company, which is being moved by A. T. Moffitt, a Salem house-mover, to a new foundation prepared for it by the Oregon Pulp & Paper company. It will become one of the buildings used by the new paper mill now in process of construction here. The building is 95 by 55 feet, 50 feet high to the eaves and 65 feet high to the comb. In its new location another story will be added. In raising the building clear of the ground 135 jack screws were used.

JETTY QUESTION IS DISTURBING FACTOR IN RECALL ACTION

Newport, Ore., Aug. 22.—A movement to recall O. F. Jackson and M. H. Abbey, members of the port commission at Newport, was started this week by citizens opposing the attitude taken by these members in a dispute that has arisen over the terms of contract for the construction work on the south jetty. The factor bringing about the heated feeling is the refusal of the secretary of the commission, L. H. Williams, to sign warrants audited by the body and allowing the contractor full pay on parts of work. Under the original terms the commission was to withhold ten percent of the amount each time until the entire contract is fulfilled. Following the action of the secretary the body met with the majority favoring the ousting of Williams and the appointing of an assistant secretary.

SCHOOL BOOK SUPPLY IS THREATENED BY ACTION OF DEALERS

A report is current that unless publishers and jobbers of school books meet the demands of Oregon dealers outside of Portland within a few days, by granting them a larger margin of profit on all books handled, that pupils will be unable to secure the necessary books in time for the fall opening. Jobbers to whom the demand was made have passed the complaint to the publishers. In the meantime many retail dealers are making no effort to obtain their usual supply. In so far as Oregon City is affected, an investigation shows that the newly adopted school books are already in stock. However, owing to the increased population there will undoubtedly be a shortage of some books, and the situation may be complicated by the position taken by other dealers of the state. The prudent buyer of school books this year will necessarily be the early one.
