INDUSTRIAL PROBLEMS NEGLECTED BY CHURCH

Declaring that the church should awake to the imperative need of aiding in the solution of industrial problems of today, Rev. R. S. Gill, of Portland, in an address Wednesday afternoon before the conference of Congregational churches now in session here, criticized the failure of the churches in helping to adjust labor differences.

"There are two elements," he declared, "the radicals and the conservatives. The former is represented by the Reds and that class which believes in the destruction of property and the overthrow of government. We must draw a strict line of demarcation between these two elements. It is the duty of the church to help in every way the conservatives, those who are seeking to better themselves by peaceful means. And it is the obligation of the churches and church people to combat the obstructionists."

The church, he said, passed a great many good resolutions bearing upon the industrial situation, but resolutions were never followed up with

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
