## MR. GERBER ALLEGES HAGGEMANN TWISTED RECORDS OF COUNTY

LOGAN, Ore., Jan. 6.—(Editor of the Enterprise).—In the New Years issue of the Banner-Courier, H. W. Hagemann has a lengthy article, consisting mostly of figures claimed to be taken from the published county court reports but which have in fact been twisted and changed and falsified to suit his own purpose. He gives a total of \$10,206 which he says was charged to District 12 and paid to my relatives, when it can be proven that of that amount over \$6000 was spent entirely for handling material at the paving plant, repairing bridges, etc., entirely under the supervision of the county court and road master.

As an instance of the misrepresentation indulged in he says that Bruno or B. L. Friedrich received a total of \$1,670.85 from District 12 when in fact he has not worked in said district since 1917, under E. C. Gerber. Here are the totals of the different items that H. W. Hagemann charges to district 12 but which are charged to general road funds:

General road, February, \$171; March, \$270; April, \$52; May, \$105.50; June, \$19.70; July, \$823.55; August, \$1813.14; September, \$1515.62; October, \$1079.28; November, \$496.68; giving a total, as previously stated of over \$6000.

H. W. Hagemann evidently forgot to charge up to road district 12 the account of E. C. Gerber, two sister-in-laws that worked at the court house.

H. W. Hagemann mentions only the relatives and nothing of the numerous others who worked on the road. He also fails to mention the amounts drawn by the five others who also worked trucks and drew amounts to equal or to exceed the amounts drawn by E. C. Gerber, Harry Babler (cousin of E. C. Gerber), Bruno Friedrich (brother-in-law of E. C. Gerber) at the paving plant.


