An Ambitious Program

Our city council has an ambitious program for 1920. It has been suggested that we have a new city hall, a reorganized and paid fire department, with adequate apparatus and a suitable building, cleaner streets, motorcycles for our patrolmen, and a municipal elevator and fire hydrants that may be used when desired.

Oregon City would certainly take pride in a modern city hall. The present structure is no ornament, its equipment is next to nothing and the town is big enough and prosperous enough to justify the erection of a decent municipal structure. Cleaner streets would mean an improvement in sanitation and a better taste in the mouths of our residents, and public safety and convenience would be aided through the constant operation of the elevator and a knowledge that the fire hydrants are 100 per cent efficient 24 hours every day.

By far the most important municipal problem facing us, however, is that of adequate fire apparatus. We recently had a severe lesson in a disastrous fire, and it was only the help of a friendly city that saved us from further loss. The statement of an official from the state fire marshal's office to the effect that we may obtain a 50 per cent reduction in insurance rates by the purchase of modern apparatus and the organization of a paid fire department along lines recommended is worthy of immediate consideration. The fire insurance burden on property owners in Oregon City is a heavy one and many thousands of dollars leave this city annually that otherwise could be kept in circulation at home. The council is entitled to the hearty support and cooperation of all of the people in its proposal to make our town healthier, safer and happier.

LIVE WIRES TAKE STAND AGAINST JAPS OWNING PROPERTY

By unanimous vote the Live Wires of the Oregon City Commercial Club went on record as being opposed to the possession of land in this country, either through ownership or lease, by Japanese, and Arthur G. Oatle, L. A. Henderson, Rev. Melville Wire and Dr. L. A. Morris were named as a committee to draft a resolution for transmittal to the Oregon legislature.

It developed during the luncheon on Tuesday that Japanese have secured farms along the lower Clackamas river, and have obtained possession of valuable property adjoining country places purchased within the last few years by wealthy residents of Portland.

In an effort to secure 100 per cent enrollment by the federal census enumerators, the Wires appointed C. H. Caulfield, W. W. Woodbeck and A. G. Rae to devise a plan to bring about the enumeration of those who may have been missed by the enumerators.

Mr. Woodbeck, who has had years of experience in the directory publishing and who is now compiling a directory for Clackamas county, believes that hundreds of people will escape enumeration unless cooperation is extended to the enumerators.

C. F. Blake, scoutmaster for one of the Oregon City troops of Boy Scouts, gave a brief talk on the Boy Scout movement and urged the formation of a council in this section.

He called attention to a meeting that will be held in the high school auditorium February 7, which is the 10th anniversary of the organization of the Boy Scouts. A representative of the state fire marshal's office will be present and give an illustrated talk on fire dangers, and other entertainment will be provided.

BOXER SPOILS MILWAUKIE CARD

Frankie Malone, the champion lightweight of Oakland, seems to have put the card scheduled for Milwaukee tonight, on the bum. Malone was to have met Earl Baird in a ten round go at the Milwaukee arena, and the contest was one of the head liners on the bill. At the last minute, Frankie Kendall, matchmaker for the Milwaukee commission received a telegram from Malone saying that he would be unable to appear against Baird, as he was scheduled for a fight on Friday night with Johnny Weber at San Francisco. Manager Moore of the Milwaukee commission, immediately postponed the entire card scheduled for tonight and the date for the bill has not been set.

However, it is rumored that the card will be put on at an early date, with a substitute for the Baird-Malone fight, which will be just as good if not better.

It is also rumored among the wise ones that Malone is afraid to meet the Baird boy, and has "run out" on the managers, who arranged for the fight.

LOCAL MAN SEES START OF BREAKING UP OF RECENT ICEJAM

Many people of this city have been interested as to what hour and how the great pack of ice in the Willamette river disappeared. This was formed below the falls during the recent cold weather when the thermometer registered zero and below that point, and when people, who were brave enough to make the trip, cross the river over and Thomas Brown, the latter a pioneer resident of Oregon City, who was anxious to see the ice disappear. The Brown home is but a few feet above the river and the family had the pleasure of watching the unusual sight.

About 11 o'clock about a week after it had formed, after the family had retired they heard an unusual noise, a noise they had never heard before. Arising from their beds they hastened to the rear porch that overlooks the river, and found that it was the ice commencing to move.

At first it commenced breaking away from the shore, when the water would rise in the river and for some time the Brown family feared it would reach their home and made preparations to move in case it was necessary.

Then the ice commenced moving, and would go a short distance then the peculiar noise would start again. This continued for some time, until the entire river seemed to be moving.

Finally the ice started down its course toward Portland. Thomas Brown, never experiencing a sight of this kind, hastily rushed to the suspension bridge, for he was anxious to see the huge "cake" of ice pass beneath.

Floating down the river in one massive piece, turned at the rapids still in one piece, and on and on until Oswego was reached, when it was reported to have broken when striking other ice that had formed at that point.

STEWART MITCHELL IS MADE DISTRICT BRIDGE ENGINEER OF COUNTY

OLCOTT IS TO FILL FULL TERM AS GOVERNOR

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 13.—Hon. W. O. Olcott, by an opinion of the supreme court today in the case of the state, or rel. G. M. Roberts against Olcott, will retain the office of governor through the entire unexpired term of the late Governor Withycombe.

The prevailing opinion was written by Justice Johns, and with him Justices Bennett and Bean, and Chief Justice Melville concurred, Bennett writing a special concurring opinion.

Dissenting Justices were Harris, Benson and Burdett, the latter writing an elaborate dissent, holding that the Chadwick-Earhart case on which the Johns opinion is based, is not a parallel case.

The case was taken into the supreme court directly in the form of a mandamus to compel Olcott as secretary of state to include the office of governor in the list of offices certified to be filled by election this year.

The action by Mr. Roberts, who is district attorney for Jackson county, was brought as a test to determine the status of Mr. Olcott as governor, an office to which he succeeded by virtue of being secretary of state when Governor Withycombe died.

An early move of Governor Olcott, now that his status has been determined, is his resignation from the office of secretary of state so that he may devote all his time to the governorship, and his appointment of Sam A. Koser to the post of secretary of state. Koser is now deputy secretary of state, and a candidate for secretary this year.
