In Which We Enter the Wilderness.
Andros, as no other of the islands, is surrounded by a ring of reefs stretching all around its coasts. From Bryan To Wilson

"If I know the American people," says William Jennings Bryan, "they will never give to any foreign nation the right to say when our boys shall be conscripted."

Bryan probably knows the American people. He has traveled more miles than most Americans, and after having thrice been a nominee for president, the American people surely know him. His reply to Mr. Wilson's defiance of the United States senate is characteristic, and he flatly takes issue with the president who would make a campaign over the country, making the League of Nations covenant a political football. Mr. Bryan says that the Democrats have denounced the Republicans for seven months delay, and now Mr. Wilson proposes a delay of 14 months, in order to submit the question to the American people.

The League of Nations has split the Democratic party asunder. Those who are close to the administration and whose political welfare depends upon the favor of Mr. Wilson are naturally very strong for the president's position. Others, and there are many good Americans in the Democratic party, know that it was Mr. Wilson who prevented the ratification of the Peace Treaty when he demanded the approval of the covenant without the change of a single comma, and they know that Mr. Wilson, in his stern denunciation of the senate and his proposal that the Peace Treaty shall be made a campaign issue, has probably blocked the way to a compromise.

Mr. Bryan made it plain in his Washington address that he is not a candidate for the presidency, but he discussed the future program of the nation, in behalf of his party, and urged a national system of roads in every state, which hope will no doubt be realized through the activity of the motorists rather than the politicians. Mr. Bryan would also like to have a national initiative and referendum, which we approach with fear and trembling in the face of what we are up against in Oregon, and last but not least a national bulletin, which he explains is not a newspaper, but a bulletin for the presentation of national issues under bipartisan control. As we now have the esteemed Congressional Record and the congressional frank and 30,000 newspapers, we are unable to enthuse over this proposal for the extension of paternalism.

WILSON CHALLENGE TO REFER TREATY ACCEPTED GLADLY BY G. O. P.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9.—President Wilson's challenge to make the treaty issue in the 1920 presidential campaign was accepted by the senate Republicans with promptness and enthusiasm. With only one or two exceptions, Republican senators warmly welcomed the issue.

Among the Democrats however, there was much conflict particularly after it became definitely known that Bryan had taken sharp issue with the president on the treaty question.

Keen speculation prevailed as to whether President Wilson would be able to hold firm on the Democratic side or whether the majority would drift to the Bryan camp and yield to the Lodge reservations.

It was pointed out that if the president maintained his leadership over one-half of the Democratic senators he could prevent ratification by the compromise route.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

Faded Goods—Flush goods and all articles dyed with aniline colors, which have faded from exposure to the light will look as bright as new after sponging with chloroform.

To Prevent Rust on Knives—Steel knives which are not in general use may be kept from rusting if they are dipped in a strong solution of soda. One part water to four parts of soda is used. Then wipe dry, roll in flannel and keep in a dry place.

To Scour Knives—Mix a small quantity of baking soda in your brick dust and see if your knives do not polish easier.

To Remove Tar From Cloth—Saturate the spot and rub it well with turpentine and every trace of tar will be removed.

To Prevent Mold on Top of Jelly—Lay a lump of paraffine on top of the hot jelly, letting it melt and spread over it.

To Clean Drain Pipes—Drain pipes and all places that are sour or impure may be cleaned with lime water or carbolic acid.

To Remove Paint From Window Glass—Rub it well with hot sharp vinegar.

Coon, Treasurer For While, Dead

SEATTLE, Wash., Jan. 9.—Charles E. Coon, 75 years old, at one time acting secretary of the treasury, under President Arthur, and from 1895 to 1909 lieutenant-governor of Washington, died at Port Townsend, Wash., late yesterday. He was unmarried.

LONDON, Jan. 9.—The opinion prevailed at headquarters of the Union of Railway Workers that the union representatives who have been deliberating on the government's wage offer would reject the proposals.

BOSTON MEN MAKE VIGOROUS PROTEST ON TALK BY GOMPERS

BOSTON, Jan. 9.—Vigorous protest was registered against the utterances of Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, in reference to the recent Boston police strike, when he addressed more than 1000 business men here yesterday afternoon as the luncheon guests of the Boston Chamber of Commerce. Nearly all present were members of the chamber.

"Loud cries of 'No, no,' greeted Mr. Gompers when he accused Police Commissioner Edwin U. Curtis of suspending members of the former police force to provoke disorders and give opportunity to a lawless element to take advantage of the situation that developed."

The labor chief was clearly on the defensive as soon as he mentioned the police issue. "One might imagine that, in view of the trouncing the old police force got, according to the press, I would evade this discussion," Mr. Gompers said. "What is it we have witnessed, after all, but a plan provoked by the man who occupies the great position of police commissioner?"

"No, no, no!" went up cries from the audience. "Keep away from it; rang out a clear voice at the front."

CLERGYMAN SAYS PROHIBITION WILL BE CAUSE OF TROUBLE

SYRACUSE, N. Y., Jan. 9.—Revolution is likely to follow in the wake of prohibition, according to the Rev. Dr. G. Campbell Morgan, pastor of Westminister Chapel, London, now visiting in Syracuse.

"Whenever a great country banishes strong drink, it must prepare for a revolution," he declared from the pulpit here.

"When a man stops drinking he begins to think. All that happens in Russia in the revolutionary line has occurred since vodka was abolished. Whenever London goes dry her East end will rise."

PREMIERS IN PARIS DISCUSS PROBLEM OF THE ADRIATIC SEA

PARIS, Jan. 12.—The three premiers—M. Clemenceau of France, Mr. Lloyd George of Great Britain and Signor Nitti of Italy—met this morning at the foreign ministry to consider the Adriatic question. The supreme council did not sit today. Its next meeting will be held tomorrow. The peace conference committee on verification of credentials today examined the letters of credit of the Hungarian peace delegates and found them to be satisfactory.

NEW YORK, Jan. 12.—A resolution urging that January 6, anniversary of the death of Colonel Theodore Roosevelt, be observed nationally for emphasizing the need of forest conservation, will be introduced here tomorrow at the annual meeting of the American Forestry association.

CHICAGO'S CRIME WAVE IS NOW DOWN TO THE ZERO MARK

CHICAGO, Jan. 12.—Chicago's crime wave has ebbed to zero early today with 4 Sunday free from hold-ups and robberies as a result of the city-wide roundup of criminals in which more than 600 suspects have been taken.

DEMONSTRATIONS HELD TO BRING ABOUT GOVERNMENT CHANGE

SALONIKI, Jan. 12.—Bulgarian socialists are organizing successive demonstrations, according to dispatches, in order to bring about a change in the government.

FOR SECOND TIME BERGER IS DENIED SEAT IN HOUSE

PARIS, Jan. 10.—Brigadier General W. D. Connor, chief of staff of the American department of supply, together with his staff and 100 non-commissioned men, the last American soldiers in France, left for Antwerp last night.

MANY ARE KILLED BY SNOW SLIDE IN ITALIAN ALPS

BERNE, Jan. 12.—Porrachia, a village in the Italian Alps, has been buried by an avalanche and many persons are reported to have been killed. Five children were killed in their homes, which was buried by the avalanche near Galtuer in the Vorarlberg mountains. Heavy snowstorms in the Alps have blocked railroads and highways, many villages being isolated.

NEW YORK, Jan. 12.—Violent storms in France have seriously interrupted telegraph service between France and foreign countries, the French cable company announced today. Long delays are to be expected, it said.

RICH DODGE BROTHERS ARE SERIOUSLY ILL IN NEW YORK

NEW YORK, Jan. 12.—Horace and John Dodge, multi-millionaire automobile manufacturers of Detroit, are both seriously ill at the Ritz-Carlton hotel here. Horace Dodge is suffering from pneumonia and his brother has a severe case of the grippe, which at one time was diagnosed as influenza. Although Dr. Ira L. Hill, who has charge of both patients, said today he was confident each had passed the crisis safely, he declared that both are very sick men, especially Horace. The Dodge brothers came here a week ago Saturday from Detroit to attend the automobile show which closed Saturday night. Tuesday evening they attended a banquet of 200 Dodge automobile salesmen and on Wednesday both brothers were stricken.

BAY CITY LOSES BIG STOCK OF WINE TO U. S. GOVERNMENT

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 12.—Twenty thousand gallons of wine were seized in a wholesale liquor establishment here yesterday by internal revenue officials, who said they had evidence that fifteen barrels labelled as sacramental wine had been sold for beverage purposes.

BOLSHEVISTS SAY THEY HAVE CAPTURED A BIG LOT PRISONERS

LONDON, Jan. 12.—The capture of 25,400 prisoners is claimed in an official statement issued today by the soviet government at Moscow, giving details of the results of Bolshevik operations on the southern front between December 21 and January 9.

Germans Plan To Sink Other Ships

COPENHAGEN, Jan. 12.—A plan to settle the German warships not yet turned over to the allies is being considered by officers of the German navy, according to information received by the Majority Socialist party leaders. A Berlin message quotes Die Freiheit as declaring a high German officer had so informed the leaders.

SUB CHASERS WANTED

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—Costa Rica is negotiating for the purchase of two of the disarmed submarine chasers offered for sale by the navy department. Consul Chase today advised the department of commerce.

VIOLENT GALES HIT FRANCE
PARIS, Jan. 12.—Violent gales prevailed over Paris and vicinity during the night. Telephone wires were disabled, houses unroofed and trees blown down.
