PAROL SOCIALIST INDICTED

CHICAGO, Jan. 21.—The special grand jury, which has been investigating "red" activities in Cook county, today returned indictments against William Bross Lloyd, millionaire parol socialist, and 27 other alleged members of the "communist labor party."

The Veto Ax

Governor Olcott has vetoed 16 measures enacted at the special session of the legislature, 11 of them being local road measures affecting the state's road map, and log-rolled through both houses. He has manifested his official disapproval of the straight party ballot measure, qualifying his veto with the statement that such measures should be submitted to the people. The governor has also vetoed Thrift's measure for the eradication of bovine tuberculosis and other livestock diseases, a bill relating to the release of sureties on bonds and several other measures of little importance.

Free from the influence of the pests that surrounded the state capital during the special session, the governor has acted with wisdom in wielding the veto ax. The road measures were fostered by selfish local interests, and were calculated to hamper the program of the state highway commission. The state cannot afford to consider individual localities in planning its road program, running into many millions of dollars.

The executive may have been expected to kill the straight party measure. It was inspired in the senate by enemies of the governor and there was no public demand for such legislation. Mr. Olcott may have been influenced by the Portland Journal, which anticipated the possibility of Democratic defeat through the operation of the measure, though the charge of the Journal that the bill was one that would affect the sanctity of the Australian ballot system was pure bunk. So long as we have the referendum, which will be after those now living have passed to places where politics do not enter, questions of this character should be referred to the people. We congratulate his excellency in exercising his constitutional prerogative in the right way. We wonder why he did not muster up enough courage to veto the fish and game bill that took from his hands the power that rightfully belongs to the governor.

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 17.—(Special.)—Though the appellation of "Jelly-fish" to the governor of Oregon is not comforting either to the executive himself nor to the people he is supposed to represent, personal observation of the political situation at Salem convinces the writer that Mr. Olcott is to blame for the criticism that has been directed against his uneasy policies, if such they may be termed. It is quietly recited by the governor's friends that Senator William W. Banks, of Multnomah and Clackamas, has a personal grudge against the executive because Olcott declined to stand in on a deal where Mr. Banks stood to gain a \$500 attorney fee for obtaining the pardon of a convict on parole. Banks would probably enter an indignant denial of the story, if questioned, and the fact remains that little sympathy is manifested for the governor, who was importuned by four members of the senate to tender his resignation.

Mr. Olcott has been charged repeatedly with reversing himself over the fish and game squabble and has entered no vigorous denial. He showed a woeful lack of backbone when he attached his signature to a bill taking from his hands the power of appointment of members of the fish and game commission. Any man with a grain of sand in his craw would have promptly vetoed the bill, and the governor's failure to do so recalls the firm attitude of the late James Withycombe, when a movement was initiated to take from his hands the appointment of the members of the highway commission. The sturdy old governor flatly announced his intention of vetoing the measure, and negotiations for its passage stopped right there.

Sam A. Krozer, for many years chief deputy in the office of the secretary of state and a candidate for the Republican nomination for the place now held by Olcott must have a peculiar feeling towards his chief, down in the innermost recesses of his heart. Krozer outwardly manifests a loyalty to Olcott, but no man could receive such a slap in the face as the governor administered this week without wincing. Last year, when Mr. Olcott expected the supreme court to render an early opinion that would

seat him fairly in the governor's chair, he stated to many people that he would appoint Krozer as his successor just as soon as the opinion came down. The court sidestepped the question until now proceedings were recently instituted, and only this week decided that Olcott is governor for the full term of the late Governor Withycombe, or until 1923. The way is now open for Mr. Olcott to resign the office of secretary of state and appoint a successor. Instead of keeping his word and redeeming his promise made in behalf of Krozer, the governor announced that he would not resign at all until after the primary election in May and then he would appoint the man who obtains the Republican nomination. Ordinarily this would have been the course to pursue, but Mr. Olcott indicated that he felt obligated to appoint Krozer, who spared him many petty annoyances. But when the appointment would have meant something to Krozer as a candidate, his chief calmly ditched him and has possibly paved the way for his losing the position of chief deputy, should Krozer be beaten in the primary election.

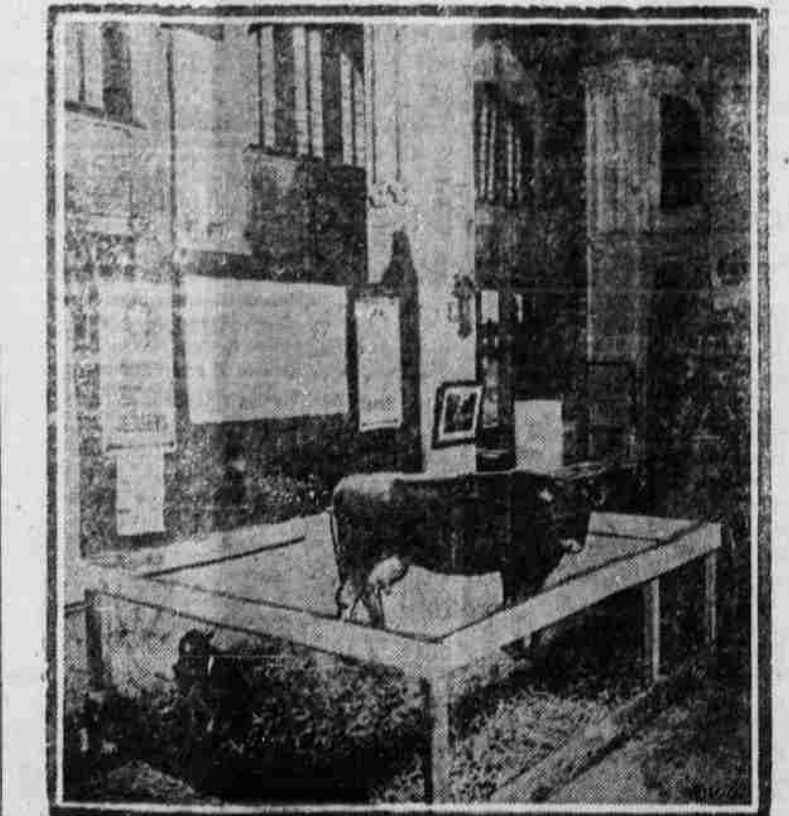
These are concrete illustrations, but there are other instances and many a story in circulation around the statehouse of the governor's absolute lack of firmness. On West, whose campaign manager Olcott was, had the present executive beaten 40 ways, for none questioned West's courage.

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 15.—The House this afternoon, after an oratorical battle, defeated Representative Schuebel's bill authorizing the Highway Commission to purchase or acquire cement manufacturing plants. The bill was fought by the Multnomah delegation almost to a man, and by Eastern Oregon members who are opposed to the policies and plans of the Commission.

Twenty-six members voted for the bill, which had the endorsement of the Roads Committee. Mr. Schuebel declared his intention of opposing the new road bond measure after the vote was announced.

The bill increasing the salary of School Superintendent Calavan to \$1800 passed the house this afternoon.

Cow and Calf Stabled in Bank Lobby Start Real Thrift Campaign in North Carolina



When Bossy and her calf held a reception in the lobby of the Commercial National Bank of Raleigh, N. C., a real thrift campaign was started, with the slogan "Buy a Cow." Several thousand persons attended when the bank advertised a reception to meet Bossy. It was explained that those who would pay down 25 per cent of the cost of a cow could borrow the remainder from the bank. Forty accepted on the spot and hundreds have become cow owners since then. Increased savings deposits have proved that keeping a cow cuts the cost of living.

LATOURETTE COVERS CLUB WORK

Retiring President of Commercial Organization Reviews Its Activities

President M. D. Latourette's annual report to the members of the Commercial Club Wednesday night covers many matters of interest to the people of Clackamas county. The Enterprise prints today some of the features of his report.

The city council at a recent meeting adopted a resolution recommending that certain properties of the city be sold and the money received therefrom be expended towards the construction of a new city hall, etc. With this act accomplished, taxpayers and producers will be placed on those idle city lots and revenues will be coming into the city for future times.

I would also suggest that residents of the city organize themselves during the year and make an effort to beautify the parkings in front of their properties.

The auto parking situation has been organized and we hope during the coming year to have the same in readiness for the numerous tourists who will use the Pacific Highway. The committee in charge of this project has secured a site from the P. R. L. & P. Co. in the northern end of Canemah Park.

The good people of Clackamas county have not yet come to the realization of the worth of stock yards for this city. A small loading chute has been installed in the north end of the city and as time goes on we hope the demand will be so great that larger accommodations will be required.

The Boney question has been solved by the council and it is pleasing to note that the merchant who wears a broad grin when the Canby jitney comes rolling into town with a load of purchasers. It is wise to bring people from the interior into town and supply them with the necessities of life rather than take them to Portland as some of our would-be boosters do.

I might suggest a few things for your consideration for 1920: Assist the council in disposing of its property, help build a new city hall, equip a new paid fire department.

And his society notice was read with more interest generally in Washington than was the letter of Secretary Daniels to Chairman Prager of the senate naval affairs committee, designed to convict Admiral Sims of pro-British leanings.

The announcement that Assistant Secretary Roosevelt was entertaining Admiral Sims just at this critical moment when the latter is leading a
