CITY NOT ABLE TO FINANCE ANY PAVING IN 1920

The city of Oregon City will be unable to finance any permanent street improvement in 1920, according to Councilman C. W. Kelly, by reason of the reduction by the county court of the district road levy for the county. While the levy for roads and bridges is \$286,000, only \$130,000 has been levied in the district road fund, of which each incorporated city receives 70 per cent of the amount collected on property situated within its boundaries. Mr. Kelly says that only \$8,000 will come to Oregon City from this source during the present year, and after paying the cost of operating the municipal elevator, street cleaning, and salaries of the employees of the street department, there will be about \$500 left and this amount is, of course, not sufficient to make any improvements of a permanent character.

Last year Oregon City used this fund to pave a section of Washington and Fourteenth streets and had expected to pave a considerable portion of the hill section, either on Seventh or Ninth street.

It is within the range of possibility that when the council submits to the people the question of levying a tax for the purchase of modern fire apparatus and the maintenance of a paid fire department, that it will also ask for funds to do a reasonable amount of street paving.

POSTMASTER COOKE HAS BEEN REWARDED BY REAPPOINTMENT

Washington dispatches convey the news that Postmaster J. J. Cooke, who is completing his first term, has been rewarded by a reappointment for the coming four years.

The business of the Oregon City postoffice is gradually increasing the past two years witnessing a growth of practically ten per cent in the receipts of the office.

NAVY IS DEATH TRAP—Wood

BOSTON, Jan. 19.—Major General Leonard Wood, speaking to members of the American Legion yesterday called for a large navy and asserted that "all we have now is a floating deathtrap."

"We want," he said, "a first-class navy and we want it always ready. We cannot make it in a hurry. We cannot have it with a divided fleet." "We cannot fill ships with untrained men and say we have a navy. It is not a navy at all, it is a floating deathtrap."

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MR. OLCOTT SWINGS AX OVER SCORE MORE BILLS

SALEM, Or., Jan. 21.—Too liberal use of the emergency clause in connection with the activities of the legislators in special session here last week, coupled with defective bills and the passage of measures for which it is deemed there was no demand under the call for emergency legislation, today caused Governor Olcott to veto 21 more bills, making a total of 37 proposed laws to receive his disapproval since adjournment of the lawmakers early Sunday.

Among the more important measures vetoed by the executive today was senate bill No. 18, introduced by Senator Norblad, amending the code relative to the powers of municipal corporations designated as ports.

Other bills disapproved by the governor, together with the veto messages as they affect each measure, follow:

H. B. 2, by Edwards—Giving authority to the state for the construction of a bridge across the Nestucca river.

The governor also disapproved of house bill No. 12, introduced by the game commission and which authorized the state fish and game commission to purchase land for game farms.

H. B. 72, by McFarland—To regulate angling in the Willamette river south of the suspension bridge at Oregon City.

H. B. No. 85, by house committee on roads and highways—Relating to tax on motor vehicles in hands of dealers.

H. B. No. 60, by Linn county delegation—Authorizing employment of a stenographer by county school superintendent of Linn county.

S. B. 30, by committee on roads and highways—Amending section 11, chapter 227, Oregon laws of 1917, providing for maintenance of state highways.

H. B. 66, by committee on roads and highways—Increasing state highway revolving fund from \$30,000 to \$75,000.

H. B. 68, by committee on corporation—Extending corporate existence of private corporations.

H. B. 13, by Kuhl—Providing for the acquisition, ownership and control of property by incorporated cities and towns within or without the corporate limits.

FLOUR SHOTS UPWARD

PORTLAND, Jan. 21.—There will be an advance of 80 cents a barrel in the wholesale price of hard wheat flour Thursday. This advance, which has been expected for some time, is due to the high price of wheat, which is bringing from \$3.25 to \$3.30 a bushel in the coast markets or \$1 and more over the government guarantee price to farmers.

STAT ECAPITOL, Salem, Or., Jan. 15.—Governor Olcott was stripped of all power in the appointment of members of the state fish and game commission when the senate, by a vote of 17 to 11, late this afternoon passed the house bill providing for a joint fish and game commission of nine members who shall be elected by the members of the legislature.

The vote follows: For the bill—Banks, Bell Eberhard, Farrell, Handley, Huston, Hurley, Jones, Moser, Nickelson, Norblad, Orton, Patterson, R. Baker, Smith, of Josephine and Wood, Total 17.

Against the bill—Baldwin, Eddy, Gill, Lachmund, La Follette, Pierce, Porter, Smith of Coos and Curry, Strayer, Thomas and Vinton, Total 11.

The bill will be transmitted immediately to the governor for approval. The governor had previously given assurance that in the event the legislature passed the bill he will sign it. Immediately after his official approval the legislators will meet in joint session to name eight of the nine men as provided under the terms of the act.
