MRS. WILLIAMS DIES LAST SATURDAY AT HOME IN SEATTLE

Mrs. A. M. Williams, of Seattle, and a former resident of Oregon City, residing here many years ago, died at her home last Saturday at the age of 80 years.

Mrs. Williams was born in London, England, 80 years ago, and came to the United States with her parents in 1852.

For many years the family made their home at Beaver Creek, and later in Oregon City, where Mrs. Williams is well remembered by many of the old time settlers.

Mrs. Williams was interested in large property interests at The Dalles, Oregon, but for the past two years has made her home at the Sorrento Hotel, Seattle, her health being greatly benefited while residing in the latter city.

Mrs. Williams was known far and wide as a philanthropist, and had on many occasions given financial assistance to the needy without knowledge as to the donor. She was a woman who is mourned by hundreds of friends, and this was evident on the day of the funeral, which was held at her former home, The Dalles, Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock, when all business houses were closed during the funeral services at the home of her son, Carl Williams, and during the services at the cemetery.

The hundreds of handsome floral tributes were a token of the high respect and love of the pioneer woman. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. Polling of Corvallis, an old time friend of the family, and former pastor of the Congregational church of The Dalles.

The interment was in The Dalles cemetery, and the remains laid to rest beside those of her late husband, Griffith Williams, who died at The Dalles many years ago.

During the services at the Williams home a quartet sang "Lead Kindly Light" and "Asleep in Jesus."

Mrs. Williams is survived by the following children: Edwin, Carl and Dr. Robert Williams, of The Dalles; Mrs. Anna French, of San Francisco, Calif.; Mrs. Arthur Dunn, of Seattle, Wash.; Miss Florence Williams, who has been with her mother in Seattle for the past two years; Mrs. Russell Sevall and Mrs. George Russell, of Portland; two brothers, John Marshall, of Portland, Ore.; Edward Marshall, of Los Angeles, Calif.; Mrs. Walter Wentworth, of this city, is a niece of Mrs. Williams, and who was among those attending the funeral services.

Mrs. Williams was a sister of the late W. H. Marshall, of this city.

She also leaves two brothers.

DR. AND MRS. HOEVE ARE FIRST TO OFFER FUNDS FOR MEMORIAL

As Oregon City is contemplating erecting a new city hall, it has been suggested that a suitable building be erected as a memorial in honor of the 4000 boys of Clackamas county who were in the service during the world war, this to be made of brick and each patriotic citizen purchase a brick for its construction.

Since the suggestion appeared in the Morning Enterprise of Sunday, one of the patriotic women of Oregon City, Mrs. George Hoeve, is the first to offer to purchase a brick, and will donate \$20 towards the good cause. Dr. Hoeve will also purchase a brick as well if such a building is to be erected.

Dr. and Mrs. George Hoeve's son, Emerson, one of the popular boys of Oregon City, and the youngest from Oregon City to enter the naval service, died while in the service. His death was due to diphtheria, and he died in the East November 9, 1918. He was 17 years of age, and was one of the first boys of Clackamas county to answer his country's call.

Dr. and Mrs. Hoeve have resided in Oregon City for the past 23 years and both did much patriotic work during the war.

FUNERAL OF CAREY JOHNSTON WAS HELD ON SUNDAY

Carey Johnston, a well known resident of Clackamas Station, died in this city Thursday evening.

The cause of his death being pneumonia. Mr. Johnston had been in California and was on his way home when taken ill, but was unable to make the journey from this city to his home, so was removed to the Oregon City hospital, where his death occurred shortly after arriving at the institution.
