R. M. BRAYNE IS LAID TO REST AT WEST LINN ON LAST WEDNESDAY

The funeral services of the late R. M. Brayne, of West Linn, were held from the home of Mr. and Mrs. D. M. Shanks, of West Linn, Thursday afternoon at 3 o'clock, with Rev. Melville T. Wire, pastor of the Methodist church, officiating.

During the services Mrs. John Crawford sang impressively "Rock of Ages" and "Lead Kindly Light." Many friends of the family attended. The remains will be shipped under the direction of Holman & Pace on Thursday morning to Astoria, where a brief service will be held at Greenwood cemetery, and the remains laid to rest beside those of his wife, who died in Young's River Falls in 1900.

The brief service at the grave will be as has since resided. He is one of the Methodist church of Astoria.

Mr. Brayne was born in 1833 at Port Stanley, Ontario, Canada, and came to Oregon 24 years ago, where he has since resided. He was one of the pioneer paper makers of Oregon, and had the distinction of building the first pulp mill in Oregon, the pulp having been shipped to the paper mills at Stockton, Calif., for the manufacture of paper. Mr. Brayne was well versed on paper making, and was known by many of the paper makers of the United States.

He is survived by an only daughter, Mrs. D. M. Shanks, of West Linn; four brothers and a half sister in Canada.

Accompanying the remains to Astoria will be Mr. and Mrs. D. M. Shanks, Mr. and Mrs. M. Hawthorne, of Hood River, who came here to attend the funeral services. Mrs. Hawthorne is a sister of Mr. Shanks.

Mr. Brayne, before taking up his home at West Linn, resided in Canemah, moving to West Linn in 1905. He was a member of the Masonic Order of this city.

SUPERINTENDENT KIRK GIVES IMPORTANT STATEMENT ON ORDER

Editor of the Enterprise:—You are at liberty to state that all students who present themselves to the City Health Board or County Health Board for free vaccination will be accepted back in school whether the vaccination has been performed or not.

Inasmuch as the law plainly states that City Health Boards or County Health Boards shall provide free vaccination for persons desiring it, it is plainly mandatory upon them, and those who present themselves to these officials willing to be vaccinated, have complied with the provisions of the law.

The County Health Board according to statute consists of the County Judge and County Commissioners who employ a County Health Officer. The City Health Board consists of the mayor and city council, who also employ a city health officer.

A LARGE NUMBER OF CLUBS ORGANIZED BY COUNTY LEADER
