## POSSESSION OF LIQUOR CAUSES ARREST OF TRIO

The treasury of Clackamas county was enriched \$150 when Ecola Battilaga, Louis Battilaga and Nick Carroll entered a plot of guilty whom arranged before Justice Lavy \$400, charged with having liquor in their possession unlawfully. The trio were arrested by Sheriff W. J. Wilson near Ardenwald Tuesday night with several hundred gallons of wine concealed in cellars and outbuildings. Fifteen barrels of mash was also seized.

Sheriff Wilson also took into custody and turned over to the federal authorities Charles Bogbill and Tony Hematie, and the officer confiscated fourteen 50-gallon barrels of homemade wine. These men were taken into custody on the Lake Shore road about three miles from Milwaukie.

## Value of Mark Causes Concern

BERLIN, Jan. 30.—The sudden further depreciation in the value of the mark is causing anxiety and there is painful surprise evident that the new Dutch credit failed to stabilize the exchange rate. Newspaper and public opinion seems to be that the depreciation in the value of the mark is attributable largely to the uncertainty concerning the indemnity Germany will be required to pay, an uncertainty which deters foreign financiers from giving Germany credit.
