MESERVE FUNERAL IS HELD AT CLATSKANIE SATURDAY AFTERNOON

The funeral services of the late Charles Meserve, formerly editor of the Oregon City Enterprise, were held at Grants Pass at Hall's chapel Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock, and the remains were shipped to Clatskanie, where the final services were held from the Presbyterian church Sunday afternoon at 1 o'clock. The grave conducted the services at Grants Pass, Mr. Meserve being an active member of the organization. Both services were largely attended, and a large number of friends of Clatskanie and St. Helens attended the funeral services in that city and followed the remains to their last resting place beside his wife, formerly Louise Conyers, and infant son, who died a number of years ago.

Mr. Meserve was born at St. Louis, Mo., July 11, 1855, and at the age of 10 years went to Cincinnati, Ohio, and two years later went to Malcolm, Ia. In 1870 he went to Cortland, Nebraska, where he taught school in Gage county, later taking charge of the development and operation of an 800-acre farm at Gage county. In 1882 the family moved to Rainier, Oregon, where Mr. Meserve entered the office of the St. Helens Mined as apprentice. He became editor and conducted the business for six years, and then came to Oregon City where he purchased the Enterprise.
Mr. Meserve remained as editor of the Enterprise until 1894 when he disposed of his interests and went to Southern Oregon, where he established the Sentinel of Jacksonville, and later established a paper in the interest of fruitgrowing at Medford, and then took up his residence at Grants Pass, where he was connected with the Weekly Courier. He also engaged in the real estate business, and at the time of his death was interested in a restaurant. He had been ill but a week before he passed away.

FUNERAL SERVICES FOR CHARLES FRANZEN HELD IN PORTLAND

The funeral services of the late Charles Franzen, of Oswego, were held Tuesday from the F. S. Dunning establishment in Portland, and the interment was in Riverview cemetery. The services were conducted by the Samaritan Lodge No. 2, I. O. O. F., and were largely attended.
Charles Franzen died January 29 at Oswego. He was 35 years of age, and is survived by his widow and two children, Dorothy and Regina Franzen.

Salton's Brother Fears Foul Play

As he was reputed to be well to do and might have had considerable money on his person the brother here fears that there is a possibility of foul play.

Early Pioneer Died on Monday

Mrs. Sarah Salisbury Williams, widow of the late Captain Richard Williams, who has visited in Oregon City on many occasions, died in Portland Monday at the age of 79 years. Mrs. Williams crossed the plains when five years of age, and was married in 1856 to Richard Williams, an early steamboat captain of Oregon. She is survived by two daughters, Mrs. William Foote, of New York, and Miss Caroline Williams, of Portland.

WILLAMETTE VALLEY LANDSLIDE REPAIRED TRAINS ON SCHEDULE

The slide on the Willamette Valley Southern about two and one-half miles from Oregon City, caused by the heavy rainfall on Sunday was cleared Friday and the first freight train since Saturday passed over the track. There were three heavily laden freight cars from Portland to Mount Angel and way points.

The company has carried regularly the express and mail since the slide, and in making trips to and from Oregon City it was necessary for passengers to climb over a hill, where the mud was deep, but the company had distributed sawdust brought from a nearby sawmill, and this was greatly appreciated by the passengers.

It was necessary for the passengers to be transferred at that point, and the first passenger car went through on schedule time Friday evening.

The slide extended 150 feet along the track and was eight feet deep. A portion of the track was misplaced by the big slide. The soil at that point is heavy clay, and made working difficult. There were as many as 20 men employed at one time before the dirt was removed, but the force was reduced to half on Wednesday and Thursday.

Superintendent Stacer and George Collier, section foreman, were at the point where the slide occurred assisting in the work and remained until car service was resumed.

STOLEN AUTOMOBILE PLUNGES OVER BANK IN CLACKAMAS RIVER

Plunging over the bank into the cold waters of the Clackamas river late Saturday night, a stolen car, bearing the number 32902, and having plates numbered 39460 in the tonneau, was found early Sunday morning by V. M. Wallace, of 1040-1-2 Albina avenue, Portland, who had spent the night with John Fishback and had gone fishing in the river. The machine was stolen from M. M. Rounds, 1477 Sacramento street, Portland. The car went into the river at the curve just north of the Judge Ryan place.

The machine had run over a 40 foot embankment into the river. The brakes were still on when the machine was discovered. No trace has been found of the men who were operating the machine and it is not known by the police whether the machine was run over the bank accidentally or intentionally.

The license tag found on the machine was stolen from another machine owned by Guy A. Woods, Morgan building. Woods reported to the police department that his license tags and all the oil and gasoline in his machine had been stolen. The thieves left a note, explaining that they must have oil and gas.

MEADS TO LEAVE FOR KALAMAZOO AFTER KARGALA

William Kargala, alias Fred Williams, has been arrested at Kalamazoo, Michigan, and is being held for the Oregon authorities, according to a telegram received by Sheriff W. J. Wilson Thursday. Kargala or Williams formerly lived with his sister in the Beaver Creek section and was employed with a road crew in that neighborhood. He was delegated to draw the warrants for the men employed on the work. The charge against him is that of forging the endorsements of the payees and appropriating the money to his own use. The warrants were cashed at the Bank of Commerce. District Attorney Gilbert L. Hedges has prepared extradition papers, which will be presented to the governor for his signature Friday morning. Deputy Sheriff H. E. Meads will leave tonight for Kalamazoo for the prisoner.

MRS. P. HAMILTON IS PNEUMONIA VICTIM

Mrs. Prescilla Hamilton, wife of George Hamilton, of Beaver Creek, died at the Oregon City hospital Tuesday evening from typhoid pneumonia. She was 45 years of age.

Mrs. Hamilton is survived by her husband, who resides at Beaver Creek, and several children, one a daughter residing in Portland. A daughter died about a month ago.

Lad Returned to Training School

Jesse Dennison, 16 years of age and a ward of the Boys and Girls industrial home since 1923 has been committed to the state training school at Salem on a charge of delinquency. He was given a hearing before Judge Anderson Thursday afternoon.

Porter, West Linn recorder, who has been distributing a large quantity of government supplies to the people on that side of the river at the same price charged for them in Portland, has placed another large order with the government store in Portland for bacon in tins, canned tomatoes, corn beef, candy and garden rakes. The bacon will sell at 23 cents per pound, the same as at Portland. Mr. Porter, who is working without compensation, has previously sold more than four tons of bacon in slabs, at 20 cents a pound; a ton of prunes at 11 cents, and more than 100 cases of tomatoes and 35 cases of corned beef.

FORMER EDITOR OF ENTERPRISE ON DEATH ROLL

Charles E. Meserve, a well known newspaper man of Oregon, died in Grants Pass Thursday morning after an illness of about a week. Death was due to Bright's disease and complications.

Mr. Meserve is well known here, and was editor of the Oregon City Enterprise for a number of years until about 25 years ago.

Mr. Meserve was born July 11, 1855, and has resided in Oregon all of his life, making his home at Clatskanie for some time, and was known throughout Columbia county. The deceased is survived by the following sisters and brothers: Mrs. Ella M. Wonderly, of Rainier; Mrs. E. M. Bothwell, of Troutdale; Mrs. Fannie Huddell, of McMinnville; J. B. Meserve, of Portland; L. J. Meserve, of Gray's River, Wash.; W. M. Meserve, Gray's River, Wash.; H. E. Meserve and Elmer Meserve, of Portland. His wife and infant son died a number of years ago.

Otto H. Naef Is Buried on Monday

The funeral of Otto H. Naef, of Naef Station on the interurban line of the P. R. L. & P., between Portland and Oregon City, was held from the M. E. church in Oak Grove Monday afternoon. Mr. Naef, who had been in California for several months for relief from bronchial trouble, died at San Diego. Mr. Naef was a well known resident of Oak Grove district where, with his father, O. Naef, and his brother, Ernest, he was engaged in general farming. Up to two years ago they maintained one of the finest herds of Jersey cattle in the state. He was about 36 years of age and, besides his wife, is survived by two young children.

Interurban Accident Fatal to Maurice Fox

The body of Maurice A. Fox, who died at the Oregon City hospital from injuries received in November, when an automobile in which he was riding from Portland to this city, was struck by a Portland bound train of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, was removed to Portland on Wednesday. He died Wednesday morning. His condition improved for some time after the accident and indications pointed towards his recovery.

L. C. Smith, of Portland, was also on his way to Oregon City with Fox when the car struck the automobile, causing Smith's death shortly after. Both were traveling salesmen for Portland firms.

Fox was married about a week previous to the accident, and besides his wife, is survived by his mother, who resides at Tenino, Wash., and who arrived here before the young man passed away.

Mrs. Lottie Evelyn Penman, wife of David J. Penman, of Portland, died at St. Vincent's hospital Thursday morning following an operation performed eight days ago. Mrs. Penman had been ill but two weeks before being removed to the hospital.

She was born in Oakland, Calif., July 29, 1877, and was the daughter of Mrs. Eunice C. Eastman, of Central Point, Clackamas county, and of the late Harry Eastman, pioneer engineer of the Southern Pacific company. She came to Oregon when but a mere child with her parents and in 1893 married David Penman, whose parents' farm adjoined that of her parents at Central Point. Twelve years ago Mr. and Mrs. Penman and family moved to Portland, where Mr. Penman became connected with the Standard Oil company.

Mrs. Penman is survived by her husband, David J. Penman, of Portland; five children, Percy Elsworth, Ernest Raymond, James Everett Penman, Mrs. Alto Myrie Molven and Mrs. Mable Teague, all of Portland; her mother, Mrs. Eunice C. Eastman, of Central Point; two brothers, Harry and Hobart Eastman, of Central Point. Her father died in 1908.

Mrs. Penman is the daughter-in-law of Mrs. Hannah Penman, one of the early pioneers of Oregon, whose farm is at Central Point, and other relatives by whom she is survived are her husband's brothers and sisters, E. W. Penman, of Portland; George Edward Penman, of Midas, Nevada; Joseph Penman, of Portland; Thomas J. Penman, of Central Point; Mrs. Martha Hinton, of Tekoa, Wash.; Miss Anna Penman, of Portland.
