MILWAUKIE, Feb. 9.—M. Cross, a veteran of the Civil war, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Howard Umstead, on Thursday and the funeral services were held at the Portland crematorium Monday afternoon. Mr. Cross was aged 75 years and had been very active until a short time before his death. He is survived by one son, and two daughters, Mrs. Umstead and Mrs. Straight of Milwaukie, and one brother of Salem.

Grandma Stuckey is survived by her aged husband; two sons, J. M. Stuckey and Henry Stuckey, and a step-son, Jacob Stuckey, all of Milwaukie; many grandchildren and other relatives, and one sister, Mrs. A. Lehman.
