WILLAMETTE SCHOOL CLOSED
The high school at Willamette has closed for a few days, owing to three of the teachers being afflicted with influenza. The grammar school still remains open, and but few cases among the students of the high school and grammar are reported.

MT. PLEASANT SCHOOL CLOSES ON ACCOUNT INFLUENZA EPIDEMIC

Owing to the large number of cases of influenza at Mount Pleasant, about two miles from this city, the public school closed at that place Tuesday. A number of families are afflicted from the father to the youngest child. One of the physicians of this city is reported to have over 20 cases. The influenza is in a mild form and no serious cases are reported.

Canby schools opened Monday with a large attendance, most of the pupils having suffered from the disease, having returned to take up their studies. Several weeks ago there were over 200 cases, necessitating the closing of the school for two weeks. There are about 15 cases in the city at the present time, and these are of very mild form.

ESTACADA BANK SUES ON PROMISSORY NOTE

The Estacada State Bank filed suit Tuesday against W. C. and Florence Repass and O. W. Messelher to collect a balance on a promissory note of \$234.65.

Plaintiff alleges that W. C. and Florence Repass gave a note for \$1400 with interest at six per cent to run two years and gave a mortgage on 14 lots in Estacada to cover the note. It was stipulated in the note that these lots were to be released at \$100 each and 11 have so been released.

It is claimed by the plaintiff that defendants have failed to pay the remainder or interest thereon or the taxes which amounts to \$234.65. O. W. Messelher claims some interest in the property and defendants ask that this be set aside and the property be sold to satisfy their claim.

92ND ANNIVERSARY OF OREGON PIONEER CELEBRATED FRIDAY

Mrs. Sarah E. Miller, widow of the late Captain Sebastian E. Miller, one of the pioneer steamboat men of the Willamette river, celebrated her 92nd birthday anniversary at the home of her daughter, Mrs. M. J. Bolton, a pioneer resident of Canemah, on Friday, February 13. A family dinner was an event of the day, and many old time friends called and extended their congratulations and presented the pioneer woman with gifts and flowers.

Mrs. Miller, who well remembers her old friends, enjoyed the day and talked on the early experiences she had in early days of Oregon, when Portland and Oregon City were but forests.

Mrs. Miller was born in Virginia and was the daughter of Josiah and Harriet Power, pioneers of Ohio, the former having died in that state at the age of 84 years.

Mrs. Miller was educated in the private schools of Ohio, known as the early subscription schools, and was 18 months old when her parents moved to the Buckeye state. The acquaintance of Sebastian Miller and Sarah Power began in childhood days and ended on the plains while making their way to Oregon City, and terminated most happily after arriving here when they were united in marriage by the mayor of Oregon City in February, 1853. Mrs. Miller has continued her residence here since that time as did her husband until his death about 18 years ago. He began his career as a steamboat man as an engineer, worked his way up to the position of pilot, and finally became captain, in which latter capacity he served for about 25 years. He was one of the first captains on the Willamette river, and became engineer of the first large boat, the Canemah.

Mrs. Miller accompanied a party across the plains, and composed of some of the old pioneer families well known in Oregon City. Among these were the late Joseph Hodges, Sr., John Colburn, Al Scott, James Bingham. Mrs. Miller cooked for the parties while making the trip, and it took the party four months and 17 days to make the trip. Mrs. Miller being 21 years of age at that time. Mrs. Miller has made her home with her daughter, Mrs. M. J. Bolton, for many years, the only child surviving, another daughter passing away in infancy.

HODGE GETS VERDICT IN SECOND TRIAL AGAINST SAULSBURY

A verdict was given Friday in the circuit court in favor of A. J. Hodge against J. C. Saulsbury for \$112 alleged due on the sale of some hogs last February.

According to the complaint Hodge sold Saulsbury, a butcher of Willamette, the hogs and delivered them according to agreement, receiving in payment a check, which Saulsbury stopped payment on, alleging the animals were not what they were represented to be.
