Mt. Angel Bank Sues On Notes

The bank of Mt. Angel filed suit Tuesday against Agnette and P. C. Forman to collect on promissory notes amounting to \$1400; these notes were issued prior to March 1, 1914 and deeds for property in Molalla were given to secure them.

Plaintiff alleges that nothing has been paid on the notes except the interest to May 6, 1918 and \$150 on the principal. They further allege that defendants failed to pay taxes and assessments on the property amounting to \$150.40, which the bank paid to protect themselves.

They ask the property be sold to satisfy their claims.
