BIG WARSHIP COMPLETED

NEWPORT NEWS, Va., March 2.—The superdreadnaught Maryland will be launched here March 20. She is the largest ship yet constructed for the navy, being 600 feet long, 97 feet broad, and having a displacement of 32,000 tons. Her main battery will be composed of eight 16-inch rifles, the heaviest guns used on a naval craft.

LOCAL PEOPLE ASSISTED WITH INCOME REPORTS

From the appearance of the Petit Court room at the court house Wednesday John C. Collins, deputy internal revenue collector, is about the most welcome visitor that has been in Oregon City for some time. All day the room was crowded with people who were seeking aid on their income tax returns.

Mr. Collins will be here until Saturday evening and is assisting those in doubt about filling out their income tax blanks. He is in the office from 8:30 A. M. until 5:00 P. M.

Mr. Collins is giving information regarding the income tax and when it is desired he assists in filling out the blanks and those who wish may make their returns to him. It is not necessary to pay the full amount with the return of the blanks, but one-fourth of the amount must accompany the blank. The balance may be paid in three equal installments as follows: June 15, September 15 and December 15. Although this time is given it is desirable for those paying income taxes to make the full return at the first.

OREGON JOINS WITH MAINE IN TESTING VALIDITY OF DRY LAW

SALEM, Or., Feb. 27.—Oregon today agreed to join with the state of Maine in opposing an action brought by the state of Rhode Island to test in the United States supreme court the validity of the federal prohibition amendment.

Charles Hughes, ex-member of the United States supreme court, has been retained as counsel for the several states which have joined in defense of the amendment. Because of Oregon's proposed part in the suit, Attorney General Brown's name will appear among the lawyers associated with Judge Hughes in the trial of the case.
