ASSISTANCE OFFERED TO GET TAX REPORTS ON BUSINESS BASIS

Payment of excess income tax, which cost Oregon farmers many thousands of dollars additional expense last year, can be avoided by substituting the income on the inventory basis instead of on the cash receipts and disbursements as nine out of ten did last year, says R. D. Gunn, of the state college farm management division. Federal income tax officers for Oregon are supporting the college extension service in giving instructions and fair treatment to the farmers.

"The inventory plan now approved by the federal treasury department provides that the farmer may use the 'farm value of livestock and grain,'" says Gunn. "Use of this plan does not mean that a farmer has got to know the exact cost of producing a bushel of grain or raising a steer, but it does mean that he must keep records and accounts, a practice he should follow anyhow."

Reporting on the inventory basis insures against doubling up two years income also one, Gunn points out. The first year but little net income is reported, the second an abnormally large one. As the income tax and the surtax are both graduated the taxes are much higher if paid on \$10,000 every other year than when paid on \$5000 every year. The farmer paying on the cash basis pays more tax, often 50 to 100 per cent, than he would if he included his inventory value, each year.

"Our department cooperating with county agent, will be glad to assist farmers in getting their farm accounts and income tax reports on a business like basis," announced Mr. Gunn. "Some confusion may result in substituting the inventory plan, but with care and the help of the field agent of the internal revenue office a satisfactory adjustment can be made."

The judging team of the Twilight and Happy Valley Calf Clubs were present and certainly did fine judging of the four registered Jersey cows which E. O. Thatcher had selected from his herd.

If every man in Clackamas county who owned a cow was as good a judge as those boys, there would be more interest in the dairy business and fewer buyers of scrub animals.

It has been found that there are around one hundred breeders of registered Jersey cattle in this county and it is to be hoped that every one of them will join us and help to boost the Jersey, their chosen breed and the most economical fat producer.

TEACHERS MEET SATURDAY IN OREGON CITY

AMERICAN LEGION TO MEET MONDAY NIGHT AND ELECT OFFICERS

The local post of the American Legion will elect officers at its meeting next Monday night from the following candidates that have been nominated:

State service medals were distributed to members of the Molalla Post last Monday evening, a delegation from Willamette Falls Post going to Molalla.

Chosen by President to be Secretary of State

Announcement from the White House of the selection of Bainbridge Colby to succeed Robert Lansing as Secretary of State came as a surprise, as his name had never been mentioned as a possibility. He has been successively Republican, Progressive and Democrat. When Theodore Roosevelt bolted the Republican Convention in 1912, Mr. Colby aided him to found the Progressive party and was a delegate to its Chicago Convention. He continued to be active as a leader in the party and in 1914 and again in 1916 he was a Progressive candidate for senator from New York State. When Colonel Roosevelt threw his weight of influence to Charles E. Hughes he identified himself with the Democratic party. When he was nominated in 1917 for membership on the shipping board his confirmation was accomplished only after a prolonged fight in the senate.

Colby was elected a member of the council from the fourth ward and Richard Petzold from the first ward at a meeting of the council Wednesday evening. The former was chosen to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of E. W. Scott, who gave up his seat two weeks ago to become chief of police. Councilman Roy Woodward tendered his resignation Wednesday night and Mr. Tobin, from the same ward, nominated Mr. Petzold, who was elected unanimously, as was Mr. Eby, though Mr. Kelly said Petzold refused to entertain the proposal. The name of William Mulvey was suggested by Mr. Kelly and that of H. E. Straight by Mr. Bridges. Mr. Eby was given Mr. Scott's place as chairman of the cemetery committee.

The council got down to brass tacks on the new city hall and fire truck proposition by providing for a committee of six to give first consideration to the matter. This committee composed of Councilman Tobin, Kelly and Eby, will meet with a committee of three citizens to be chosen by Dr. L. A. Morris, president of the club, and the joint committee will recommend a definite program for the consideration of the people. It was suggested that \$40,000 in bonds be authorized for the construction or purchase of a city hall building, with space for fire headquarters, municipal offices and jail. The council already has authority to issue bonds to the amount of \$10,000 for fire apparatus. Mr. Kelly proposed an annual levy of two mills for the maintenance of a paid fire department, and he pointed out that if the city should lease its present site on Main street for \$100 a month under a plan to have a building erected thereon by the lessee, that the building which would revert to the city at the termination of the lease would have a value, with the site, of around \$45,000.

City Attorney Story reported against the proposed fire ordinance suggested by the state fire marshal's office. A new street lighting ordinance, covering a period of 5 years, was read first time and will come up for final passage March 17. Some criticism was voiced because it was stated that the Portland Gas & Coke Co. had installed mains without first securing the necessary permits.

Owners of pool halls fathered a petition asking that the city permit boys over the age of 18 years to frequent these amusement places. Mr. Tobin understood that the state law placed the age limit at 21 years and the matter was referred to the city attorney to determine whether another ordinance removing the 18-year-old bar would conflict with the statute. It was stated that ex-service men who have not reached their majority resent being denied the same privileges as they enjoyed in the army.

Councilman Tobin objected to the city licensing fortune tellers. He said the gypsy fortune tellers were not here for any good purpose. The matter was referred to the committee on health and police, of which Kelly is chairman.

"If they are suckers enough to give up their money to fortune tellers, why we can't help 'em," said Mr. Kelly, who said he had seen a little gypsy girl with nothing on but an apron.

The council, after a little talk, voted to pay George Woodward, former chief of police, for eight days service that he did not render. Mayor Holman opposed it.

"I thought you fellows believed in saving money?" he said.

Right on the heels of this spasm of liberality, the council, over the protest of Mr. Kelly, again declined to permit the publication of the report of the water board, which is provided for by charter.

"If you can ignore one charter provision, you can ignore another," declared Councilman Kelly. Bridges opposed the publication for reasons of financial stringency and Green seconded Kelly's motion to order the report published. "Just so as to settle it," he said.

J. C. Spaggle, secretary of the American Legion post, demanded an investigation of the language of Night Officer Ed Surfus, who was charged with using words reflecting upon war veterans, when he arrested two boys charged with accosting girls with whom they had no acquaintance. Mayor Holman and to health and police committee will make an official inquiry.
