Six Families to Take Homesteads

ELK PRAIRIE, Or., March 11.—(Special)—Joseph Jonas, a traveling evangelist, has invited the people of Elk Prairie to attend Sunday school in the Maple Grove school. Mr. Jonas came from Idaho. Charles Tidd is building an addition to his house. Mr. Tidd was formerly of Oregon City. It is reported that six new families are to join Elk Prairie homestead colony this summer. Mrs. Helvey is expected to return to the place that she homesteaded before her marriage. This place is known as the Mary West homestead. It is also reported that a restaurant man from Portland has bought the North half of the Walter LeRoy property. Mr. Hollingsworth, of Anaheim, Cal., wrote to Mr. Fletcher that four families in their party will be here this summer. We have now three school sites, still no school in sight, however this is no discredit to the people. First, Mr. and Mrs. Lefzel offered two acres of land to the community when it appeared as if that would accommodate all the pupils. After the railroad homesteaders moved here, Mr. and Mrs. Joplin offered a building spot on their property near the county road. Now Mr. and Mrs. Fletcher have offered an acre near their home, also close to the Elk Prairie auditorium. The generosity of these neighbors is greatly appreciated in this vicinity. It is hoped that one will soon be selected. Mr. and Mrs. Fletcher visited the home of Mr. and Mrs. Steve Fisher near the Molalla river. Mr. and Mrs. Fisher took up government land several years ago, so have more clearing done than some of the newer arrivals. Mr. Fisher still has the record for fine large potatoes, though there are some who are preparing to compete with him. Joseph Kolshinski wheeled a hand plow home from supplies. Now the new implement is doing duty on the homestead. Mr. Kolshinski had the misfortune to lose his only horse last winter. However, these people are not to be discouraged so easily, as is proven by the clearing and new fences which are appearing. Often the father packs nearly a hundred pounds of supplies from Scotts Mills, seven miles away, to his family of seven children. Mr. Kolshinski learned to milk a cow while moving to his place. In Poland, as in Germany, it is not the custom for a man to milk cows, however, last spring, he was on the road three days bringing his cow and calf to this neighborhood. Faced with the necessity of milking bossy, the task did not seem so hard.

TREASURER HOFF DEMANDS PROBE OF BOND SALES

SALEM, March 8.—The machinery for a grand jury investigation of the state treasurer's office with particular reference to bond buying transactions was set in motion by Governor Olcott this morning, following the receipt of a letter from State Treasurer O. P. Hoff requesting an investigation into the administration of the affairs of his department. Acting under authority of the state law, Governor Olcott today instructed Attorney General Brown to appear before "a grand jury of competent jurisdiction for the purpose of managing and conducting an inquiry and investigation into the matter of the purchase of securities by the state treasurer's office." "I desire the scope of this investigation to be of securities by the state treasurer or his assistant," Governor Olcott's letter to the attorney general reads, calling particular attention to "the transactions covering purchases of bonds of the city of Warrenton, city of Redport, city of Monmouth, Port of Bay City, city of Oakland, city of Ontario, city of Yamhill and city of Rainier, with the end in view that the grand jury take such action, make such report or such recommendations as may be deemed warranted by its findings." Joseph G. Richardson is assistant state treasurer.

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APPEAL TO BE TAKEN IN HAWLEY SEPARATION

Mrs. Marjorie Hawley will appeal to the Supreme Court of Oregon from the decision of Circuit Judge George R. Bagley, under which she loses the permanent care and custody of her child and all hope of alimony. Judge Bagley awarded the divorce decree to Willard Hawley, the defendant, and gave the child to him. C. Schuebel, chief counsel for Mrs. Hawley, said Wednesday very emphatically that an early appeal would be taken, though he was not prepared to state that the court's ruling on the question of attorney's fees would be taken up to the higher court. Judge Bagley gave the attorneys \$3500, though \$15,000 was asked for in the complaint, and this fee covers the legal services incident to an appeal. The court allowed an additional \$1000 for court costs for the prosecution of an appeal. This decision means that Mrs. Hawley will continue to occupy the family residence and retain the custody of her baby until the final determination of the suit, which will be a matter of probably six months or more. She will enjoy an income during this period of \$250 a month for the care of the child. It is understood that Mr. Hawley will permit her to continue to live in the house, as recommended, but not ordered, by Judge Bagley, until the Supreme Court passes upon the case.

BERNE, March 6.—The Swiss people will vote on Sunday, May 16, on the question of whether Switzerland shall join the league of nations.

Lets Wear Long Hair Dollar Cut in Sight Barbers Costs Loom

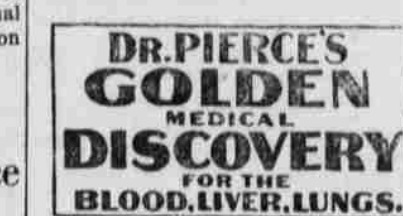
