CANBY TO IMPROVE MAIN CITY STREETS

CANBY, Or., March 18.—A special meeting of the city council was held Monday evening, when the matter of improving the streets was brought up for discussion. Owing to the few members in attendance little was accomplished.

It has been decided to improve the streets during the coming summer, and the city engineer, C. A. Garrow, gave his estimation of the cost of the improvement, and the assessment of the improvement, and the assessment of the property owners.

Among the streets to be improved will be Second street, two blocks on Third street besides the cross walks. There will be about 20 blocks in all improved.

Big Price Is Paid For Canby Property

Captain Of Oil Boat Given Stiff Penalty

SAN FRANCISCO, March 17.—Captain A. Sawyer, commander of the ill-fated Associated Oil steamer Chanslor, has been suspended for a period of two years for failing to use proper caution in navigating his vessel, as the result of a hearing here by United States steamship inspectors.

Thirty-eight lives were lost when the Chanslor went aground at Cape Blanco, and broke in two, the stern portion sinking, December 18. Captain Sawyer is one of three survivors.

WILSON FUNERAL FRIDAY.

The funeral services of August Wilson will be held from the Brady funeral chapel Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock. The Rev. Pettibone, pastor of the Baptist church, is to officiate; and the interment will be in Mountain View cemetery.

Mr. Wilson is survived by his wife, formerly Mrs. Lundgren, of this city, a daughter in California, and several stepchildren.

MARINES GET NEW EMBLEM.

WASHINGTON, March 16.—The emblem of the marine corps hereafter will be worn on the collar of enlisted men, of that organization. Heretofore the soldiers have worn the globe, anchor and eagle device only on their headwear. The collar emblem will be bronze for the khaki and brass for the blue uniforms.

ROUTE FOR HIGHWAY INTO CITY SELECTED

The state highway commission has definitely determined to bring the Pacific Highway into Oregon City from the south over what is known as the high line, running from Canemah to the undergrade crossing at the foot of the south end road hill. This procedure will eliminate a grade crossing or an overhead crossing at Canemah over the Southern Pacific tracks and will permit the uninterrupted use of the present roadway along the basin for railway traffic and for industrial purposes.

While the cost of the road along the bluff will probably be in excess of a road along the present right of way, the additional expense is justified, according to the highway officials. Herbert Nunn, state highway engineer, says the underground crossing at Third street will be made 70 feet wide, and set at an angle to afford a view of 100 feet in each direction. The cost of the proposed road will be in the neighborhood of \$100,000, exclusive of the paving.

Nunn is enthusiastic over the park possibilities, and County Judge Anderson, who was present at the council meeting Wednesday night, urged the city to render the county and state all possible assistance.

Councilmen Eby, Petzold and Tobin, with City Attorney Story, were appointed a committee to cooperate with the county court and help in securing the right of way. It was suggested to the council that the people be asked to contribute funds, and that the road and park program be linked with the city hall and fire apparatus plan now under consideration. Judge Anderson told the council that the state and federal government had appropriated in excess of \$1,500,000 for Clackamas county roads and bridges, without a single dollar of expense to Oregon City.

Eastern Man To Make Home Here

Raymond Fuson, of Decatur, Ill., has accepted the position of making up man of the Morning Enterprise, and commenced his duties.

Mr. Fuson, who was captain in the aviation corps, had two years' experience in the army, and was among the young men who were disappointed in not being able to go overseas. He was first bombardier at Fort Thomas, Ky., and later went to the officers' training camp in San Diego, where he was commissioned lieutenant, and was assigned to the Arcadia Field in Florida. After being stationed there for a short time was rapidly promoted and received the commission of captain, and was instructor in the Arcadia field, but had experience on six different fields before the armistice was signed. He received his discharge in Florida.

Mr. Fuson is an experienced newspaper man and will be joined shortly by his wife, who is for the present visiting relatives at Seattle, Wash.

IRISH QUESTION ACTION DELAYED IN U. S. SENATE

WASHINGTON, March 17.—The senate today laid on the table the question of Irish independence, along with the whole question of self-determination for subject peoples. By a vote of 54 to 21, the senate tabled a reservation to the treaty offered by Senator Owen, Oklahoma, stating that the United States understood that the British protectorate over Egypt would be ended. The reservation carried an amendment recognizing the Irish republic and stating that the United States understood that Great Britain would also recognize Irish independence and further amendments of the same import as to Korea, the Philippines, Porto Rico, and Hawaii.

SECRETARY HOUSTON SAYS INCOME TAXES SHOULD BE REVISED

WASHINGTON, March 17.—Federal income taxes cannot be reduced until after 1922, Secretary of the Treasury Houston today informed the house ways and means committee.

He declared, however, that revision of several of the present federal taxes should be made and revenue adjusted to make up the loss the government will suffer as a result of the supreme court decision that dividends paid on stock are non-taxable.

SIMS WOULD GIVE BRITISH NAVY POWER

WASHINGTON, March 17.—Rear Admiral William S. Sims urged that entire control over naval operations during the war be turned over to one of the allies, the others to put their resources at that nation's disposal, he disclosed in testimony before the senate naval affairs committee today.

Although he did not suggest that Great Britain was the nation to assume this unrestricted control, he pointed out to the navy department that she was bearing the brunt of the war and that London was the logical center for directing all allied naval operations.

Atlantic Fleet Is To Meet Pacific

WASHINGTON, March 16.—The Pacific and Atlantic fleets will meet off the Pacific coast of Panama next January in their first joint maneuvers, designed to keep the navy "on its toes" during peace time.

This was decided today at a conference between Secretary Daniels and Admirals Rodman and Wilson, fleet commanders. It is practically certain that a "battle" between the fleets, similar to actual warfare, will be arranged. It may also serve as a test of the Panama canal as an element of naval strategy.

Chicago Woman, Called "Kiss Burglar," Who Slew Bleyer and Killed Herself



"Vamp" and "kiss burglar" are two of the many terms that have been used to describe Mrs. Ruth Randall, divorcee, who killed Clifford Bleyer, wealthy head of an advertising agency, in her Chicago apartment and then committed suicide. In a diary found by the police she complained that she was starved for love. Bleyer was married and had two children.

WM. GALLOWAY PASSES AWAY AT THE DALLES

Judge William Galloway, Oregon pioneer and one of the best known jurists of the state, died Tuesday at The Dalles. Judge Galloway was visiting his son, District Attorney Francis V. Galloway, of Wasco county. The judge was 68 years old.

In 1852 William Galloway came across the plains with his father and mother in an ox-team from Wisconsin. Galloway senior established a farm in Yamhill county. At the age of 19 the lad entered Willamette university. Six years after graduating he married Miss Emma Baker, of Yamhill county.

Judge Galloway entered upon his political career in 1876, when he was elected to the lower branch of the state legislature. After serving three consecutive terms, he was elected judge of Yamhill county. In 1894 he ran for the office of governor on the democratic ticket, but was defeated by William P. Lord, republican. Two years later he was appointed receiver of the land office at Oregon City, which position he held until 1903.

The following year Galloway was elected to the judgeship of the old third judicial district, and in 1910 was re-elected. At the conclusion of this third term he retired. Surviving Judge Galloway are three children, Charles V. and Miss Zilpha V. Galloway, of Portland, and Francis V. Galloway, of The Dalles.

FAILURE TO PAY JITNEY FEE PEEVES CITY DADS

John J. Tobin, councilman from the first ward, did not take kindly to a set-back handed to him Wednesday night at a meeting of the city council when Councilman Albright, Eby, and Petzold were named as a committee to confer with business men over the proposal to relate a \$10 money jitney license to M. J. Lee, who appeared before the council with a petition signed by a number of Main street business men, asking that the license be remitted.

Councilman Tobin was loud in his protests. He declared that Lee had been granted a franchise with license clause at his own request; that the document had been eminently satisfactory when it was issued; that Lee had failed to comply with his contract and had not paid the city a dollar.

"If Lee can't afford to pay \$10 a month, he should discontinue his line," said Tobin. "We entered into a contract with him fairly and squarely and he should fulfill his own obligations to the city."

Lee denied the existence of a money consideration in his original application, and charged that Grant R. Dimick had inserted the license fee, in the interest of a client. He was backed by Linn E. Jones, William Anderson, C. G. Miller and Clyde Huntley, who said that Lee was performing a real service for Oregon City in bringing business to the town and should not be required to pay a license. Councilman Kelly insisted that if a paltry sum of \$10 a month should strange Lee's business, it was not worth much. The petition was placed on file, but later in the evening the matter was presented again and terminated in the appointment of a committee, much to Mr. Tobin's disgust. He said he objected to merchants coming into the council and upsetting the ordinances. He declared they ought to pay an occupation tax.

The council passed the ordinance authorizing a contract for street lighting and passed to its second reading an ordinance providing that motor vehicles carrying freight or passengers and doing a drayage business shall pay a quarterly license of \$5, which is now imposed on horse drawn vehicles operated for profit. Fire Chief Selter reported some of the fire hose in a mildewed condition and was asked to submit an inventory of the fire department property. The council ordered \$99 paid to Ray Young, whose thumb was injured in February, when he was jammed between a horse cart and the side of a building, as compensation for lost time.

W. R. Wentworth, of Canemah, protested against violations of traffic rules, and the city recorder was directed to request the several transportation companies to comply with the city ordinances. Mayor Holman said a freight car had been left in the center of the intersection of Fourteenth and Main streets a greater part of the night, and it a danger to motorists.

County Judge Anderson indicated the county court would welcome financial aid from the city for the improvement of the Holmes lane, on which the estimate was \$2700 for a gravel road. The county had improved the road with crushed rock, he said, at a cost of more than \$6000.
