CANBY, March 24.—Never before in the history of Canby have there been more people interested in the poultry industry, and many orders for eggs for hatching have arrived here from those engaged in the poultry industry. These already engaged are making good at the business. Among these are Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Koehler.

Mrs. Koehler, who is engaged in breeding pure-blooded Rhode Island Reds, is finding steady demand for the eggs of this breeding. During the past week she has averaged \$50 from her eggs, and for two weeks averaged \$75. Many of these went to some distance to breeders. She has a number of hens setting on high priced eggs, some of which were shipped from Kansas City, Mo., and others from Marblehead, Mass.

Mr. Koehler, who is interested in the Plymouth Rocks, and winning some of the prizes at the Clackamas county fair, is making good with his birds.

Better Public Service

With a primary nominating election close at hand and along with it the submission of a number of measures and constitutional amendments proposed by the legislative assembly, little attention has been paid to other measures that come under the initiative through the usual machinery of the constitution, and will be on the ballot next November. Much has been written of the 4-per cent interest bill, and the anti-cigarette measure, these proposals being sufficiently drastic in character to excite early comment, most of it unfavorable in tone.

There will be submitted to the people at the November election a constitutional amendment fixing the terms of the county clerk, treasurer, sheriff, coroner and surveyor at four years, these officers now being chosen for two-year terms. The amendment is self-executing and becomes effective on the first Monday of January, 1921, when the officers selected in November of this year shall qualify.

This amendment has much to commend it. In the first place, there is no good reason why we should elect a county assessor for four years and a county clerk for two years. Why should we say that a county school superintendent shall serve for four years and a county sheriff for half that time? Is there any good reason why we should restrict the term of a county treasurer to two years and give a county commissioner four years and a county judge six years. Let us have a little more standardization and certainly more common sense.

As a rule county offices are not attractive. They do not pay large salaries, and we have been fortunate, as a rule, in securing capable officials for the short terms allotted by law. It is not reasonable to expect people of capacity to go to the expense of running for office under our Oregon system that requires two elections, when the campaign for a second term must be commenced before the first election is forgotten. It is well to have such laws that will make public servants responsive to the people, but so long as we have the recall, it is well to make the election burden as light as possible and within the bounds of reason.

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ONLY 25 DAYS TO REGISTER

April 20, 1920, is the last day on which voters may register with the county clerk or local registrars.

Any person 21 years of age on May 21, 1920, and who has resided in the state at least six months prior to primary election day can register and vote.

You should re-register if:

First. If you have moved from the precinct in which you were formerly registered;

Second. If the county court has changed the boundaries so as to put you in another precinct;

Third. If you failed to vote at all within the past two years.

You are a voter if you become of age or will have completed your six months residence in the state between April 20 and May 21, 1920, and should register with your county clerk or local registrar during the thirty-day period between March 20 and April 20, 1920.

To vote for Republican candidates you must be registered as a member of the Republican party.

Should you for any reason be unable to register you can register later with the election board, but it will cause you inconvenience.

TWILIGHT RESIDENT IS FOUND DEAD BY NEIGHBORS FRIDAY

Ell E. Parker, a bachelor, aged 65 years, and a resident of the Twilight district, about two miles from Oregon City, was found dead in bed at his home Friday morning by one of his neighbors, Carl Krummel. The cause of his death was probably due to heart disease.

Parker was last seen alive at his home Wednesday evening, and at that time was apparently enjoying the best of health. As he was not seen by his neighbors Thursday, investigation was made by Mr. Krummel, who called at his home and found him dead. He probably died some time during Wednesday night.

The deceased had told friends that he had no near relatives.

Only an inquiry was held by E. L. Johnson, coroner, as it was apparent that the man had come to his death from natural causes.

The remains were removed to the undertaking parlors of Holman & Pace, where the funeral arrangements will be made.

Parker was a member of the Methodist church. He has resided in Clackamas county for the past thirty years.

Building Is Declared Nuisance In Suit
