OLD PIONEER RECITES HISTORY River Overrun With Salmon Much Larger Than Present Day Fish

Thinking that the readers of The Enterprise would like a few more items of early Oregon history I will give some more of my observations of early life in this state.

Speaking of the salmon as I saw them in 1846 and 1847 at the falls of Oregon City and the Clackamas river. They were running up the river some of them would go up the Clackamas the remainder would continue up to the falls. At sundown you could see thousands at one time out of the water trying to get over the falls, leap ten feet and strike the water, they fall back below on the west side of the falls. There were several streams that poured over the rocks to the river below and quite a few of the fish would go up over the falls on the east side. Before the brookwater was put there there was quite large streams of water pouring down and a great many fish went over.

A large number of seal always came with the fish. The salmon of early

days were very much larger than they are now. Fifty or sixty pound salmon were plentiful then. I saw a ninety pound fish speared by an Indian boy 10-years-old, at the mouth of the Clackamas river, the spear struck the fish clear to the tail. The salmon started for the middle of the stream taking the boy with him and down the stream they both went. His mother got into a canoe and overtook the boy and salmon below the mouth of the Clackamas river. My father gave the boy one dollar for the fish.

In the fall of 1852 when the emigrants crossed the mountains on the Barlow road, coming to Oregon City they forded the Clackamas ferry. The salmon were so thick in the river the oxen would not take to the water till men on horse back went before them to clear the track.

But poor salmon like the poor Indians have fallen a prey to the greed and waste of the white man.

MARNE MEMORIAL POSTER

JUST as the school children of France gave for their country's gift to the United States—the Statue of Liberty—so will American school children contribute "one cent and upward" for "America's Gift to France," a monumental statue by Frederick MacMonnies, the noted American sculptor. Mr. MacMonnies is contributing his services toward the monument which, it is estimated, will cost \$250,000.

The poster shown herewith, is by Albert Sterner, noted American portrait painter. It typifies the tribute which this country will pay to the French through the Marne monument. The poster will be displayed in cities, towns, and villages, and will designate many of the places where contributions may be made during the week of March 22—a free will offering, in which numbers of contributors, rather than size of contributions, will be sought from school children and others.

Contributions are now being received at National Headquarters, 150 Nassau street, New York, by Charles H. Sablin, president of one of New York's largest trust companies, who is treasurer of the fund.

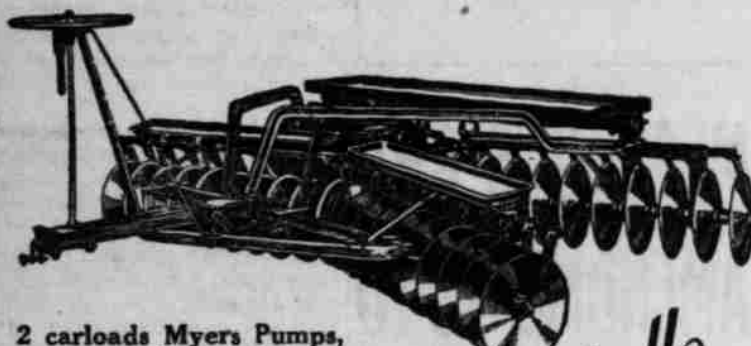
