POPULAR YOUNG MAN OF CANBY PASSES AWAY ON TUESDAY

CANBY, March 30.—Oscar Sannes, a well known and highly esteemed young man of Canby, died at his home Tuesday afternoon about 2 o'clock. Mr. Sannes has been ill for the past eight weeks and was seized with influenza that hurried his death.

Mr. Sannes was born in South Dakota 35 years ago, and came to Oregon with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Sannes, about 15 years ago, making his home since that time at Canby.

The deceased has been following the occupation of a carpenter. Mr. Sannes is survived by his wife, formerly Miss Gertrude Olson, of Needy, Clackamas county, two sisters, Mrs. Dave Saunders, of Portland, and one in Chicago, Ill.; three brothers, Conrad and Rudolph Sannes, of Portland, and Henry, of Chicago, who was at his bedside when he passed away.

His father died about three months ago in Chicago, and his stepmother about two months ago.

Holman & Pace have charge of the funeral arrangements, and will be held Thursday afternoon at 1 o'clock from the Methodist Episcopal church, Rev. Speers officiating. The interment will be in Zion cemetery.

SCHOOL DISTRICTS IN CANBY NEIGHBORHOOD MAY CONSOLIDATE

Six school districts in the Canby neighborhood may be consolidated through an effort of some of the people in that community to secure graded schools in each of the localities interested. It is proposed to include Canby, Union Hall, Mundorff, Lone Elder, Marks Prairie and Barlow in one school district. A mass meeting was held Friday night at Canby in furtherance of the plan, and it is expected the proposal will be submitted to the people of the several districts.

Koehler and Lucke Solve Boat Problem

CANBY, March 31.—J. W. Koehler and W. H. Lucke, the commission merchant, have the "fish" fever, and are looking forward to the time to be spent on the Willamette river in their new boat during the salmon season.

Last year these men were disappointed on many occasions when they arrived in Oregon City and all boats were in use, and they were unable to rent one, so they decided to make one and go any day they desired. Mr. Koehler furnished the material and Mr. Lucke furnished the muscle. The boat is now ready for launching, which will take place this week. Owing to the absence of champagne, colored water, grape juice, or soda pop is to be used in christening the boat as she slides into the peaceful Willamette. Since the boat is completed the trouble now confronting the owners is the name to be bestowed upon the boat. It was first planned to have the boat named after each of the wives, but since one of the wives does not fancy her name, it might be that the name will be Lucke-Koehler. Several of their friends have endeavored to assist them in naming their boat, but so far a name has not been found suitable.

Big Egg Produced By Faithful Biddy

CANBY, March 31.—The Plymouth Rock and Rhode Island Red birds owned by Mr. and Mrs. Koehler, of this place, are still continuing their record of egg producing, and one "Biddy" has done exceptionally well by producing an egg, this measuring seven by eight inches, and weighs four ounces. It is shown in the window of the publicity building opposite the court house in Oregon City.

In disposing of 75 eggs to Mr. Christiansen a few days ago for his incubator, there were 74 eggs that were fertile, and were from the Koehler chickens. This is somewhat unusual for so many eggs and now Mr. Christiansen is to watch with interest just how many of these will hatch. They are of the Rhode Island Red strain.

Canby Creamery May Start Soon

CANBY, March 31.—A report is in circulation that the Canby Creamery plant to be placed in operation in the near future. The Canby Co-operative Cheese & Produce Company has received a number of flattering offers on a lease basis, and one of these may be accepted by the directors. The cheese making machinery has already been disposed of, but the butter making machinery is still intact.

An offer has been made by W. L. Bentley, of Hubbard, to lease the building to be used as a receiving station for berries and small fruits this season. It is understood that Mr. Bentley has contracted for about 60 acres of berries in this section, principally logan berries and has agreed to pay 12 cents per pound.

LEAGUE TO DEVELOP COUNTY IS ACTIVE

The recently organized Clackamas County Development league started to actively function Saturday when it was formed into a permanent organization and adopted by-laws, elected Carl J. Renhard, of Colton, president; O. D. Eby, of Oregon City, secretary-treasurer, and J. W. Reed, Everman Robbins, Adam H. Knight and Dr. L. A. Morris as members of the board of directors. Meetings will be held the second Saturday of each month at a place and hour to be designated, it being the object of the organization to meet in the various localities of the county, and the next meeting will be held in Oregon City on Saturday, April 10, at 1 p. m.

The new organization was formed at the instance of the Oregon City Commercial club, with the object of assisting in the development of the whole county and to further the better acquaintance and closer association of its members.

The annual dues have been fixed at the nominal sum of \$1, except for commercial organizations and community clubs, who shall pay \$5 per annum for each 100 members or fraction, and shall have one vote for each \$5 paid. Committees on roads, public utility, irrigation and drainage, education, livestock, agriculture, horticulture, membership and assessment and taxation will be named, to consist of three members on each committee, except the committee on assessment and taxation and publicity, which shall have five members, and the road committee, which shall have 11 members, one from each of the road districts outside of the incorporated towns of the county. Herbert Hoover

Herbert Hoover, ex-food controller, has placed his name in everybody's mouth again. During the war it was Hoover this and Hoover that and Hooverize on everything. During the war, if we are correctly informed, it was Mr. Hoover who told the country that President Wilson was entitled to a Democratic congress, but the country paid a little attention to his dictum as it did to Wilson's, when that gentleman had declared that politics was adjourned. It was the New York World, always Democratic and realizing that the country was tired of Democratic mis-rule, that declared itself for Hoover on any ticket, knowing that he would be elected if the Republicans could be induced to nominate him, and knowing also that his chances on the Democratic ticket would be better than any real Democrat but not much better. Hard upon the heels of the World came Oswald West, et al, forming Hoover Democratic clubs by the thousands, and now comes Hoover with the public statement that he will accept the Republican nomination—if he can get it—with reservations. He is not in favor of the Wilson draft of the peace treaty, he says, but he favors a league of nations with reservations, and no more sympathy with Mr. Wilson, who has kept us out of peace better than he kept us out of war, than he has with Hiram Johnson, who is agin' any league whatsoever.

Mr. Hoover is a business man, Leonard Wood is a physician and a soldier and Frank O. Lowden is a statesman, which Mr. Hoover is not. If the name of Hoover should sweep this country like wildfire, which is possible, he would be elected certainly, and he would get away with the job better than some of his predecessors and better than some of those who now feel the call.

His declaration has placed the Hoover Democrats up a tree, and they will have to hurry to the tall timber for rest and comfort. What is known as the independent element of the Republican party, which includes those Republicans who voted against Mr. Hughes, will support Hoover. At least, most of them will. Thousands of business men will be for Hoover and he will be considered, along with Wood and Lowden, as a formidable factor in connection with the Republican nomination for the presidency.

Spring Birds Late

Many lovers of birds have missed the early spring birds here this season, and very few have so far seen their appearance. Most of the song birds here at the present time are the winter birds of their spring song. A large number of Alaska robins are still remaining instead of taking up their home in the mountainous regions where they generally go in the early spring and remain for the summer. By the scarcity of spring birds here this season it is believed that their absence is due for the late spring we are having.

A few of the song sparrows have arrived and have commenced building their nests in the bushes and trees, and the English sparrow, that remain here the year round are hunting up places to build their homes. The bird houses in the library park are in a dilapidated condition and the birds seem to realize this, for if you visit the park at any time during the day you will find sparrows in countless numbers either perched on top of their former homes or on the benches close by, wondering no doubt why their homes are not repaired for their reception. Several years ago the boys in the Oregon City school built the houses, and were assisted by Mr. Mighells, of Maple Lane, who is also a lover of birds.

Another interested in the feathered creatures, who has called the attention of the scarcity of the spring birds, says among the birds having recently arrived are the violet green swallow, Audubon warbler, Seattle wrens, and several Parkman wrens, generally making their appearance about April 1. Two of these have made the appearance at a certain home, and are commencing to build their nests where they have made their home for three seasons. The White Crown sparrow have not made their appearance so far, nor have the Parkman wren.

HUSBAND WAS CRUEL DID NOT PROVIDE WIFE ASKS DIVORCE

Florence Moore and E. W. Moore were married in Portland, June 20, 1912, and have resided in Clackamas county for some time, where they have a small place near Oak Grove.

According to a divorce suit filed Friday by Mrs. Moore the place is isolated and very lonely and she was compelled to live there alone as Moore conducted a photograph studio in Aberdeen, Wash., and spent his time there.

Plaintiff alleges that when she went to see him on a visit he compelled her to pay her railroad fare both ways and while in Aberdeen she had to pay half of the grocery bill. She says that when he came home he treated her cruel and one time forced her out of the house and struck and beat her and that he tried to hit her on the head with a heavy hand spray. She claims that when the defendant saw her face covered with blood he deliberately scratched his own face and told the neighbors she did it. At one time, she claims, he threatened to scratch her face with a fork.

According to complaint she was compelled to work for her living and that she taught school for several years and made \$3175 from this work, which the defendant used for his own purposes.

The defendant owns the home place and plaintiff asks the court for \$1000 alimony and \$300 per month and a divorce.

COUNTY SCHOOLS PLAN FOR BIG FIELD MEET AT GLADSTONE PARK

A meeting of the representatives of the schools of Clackamas county was held at the court house March 27 and rules and regulations for the Clackamas County School League Track and Field meet were decided upon.

The annual track and field meet will be held May 15 at the Chatauqua park, Gladstone, and a good list of events was scheduled. If the state Athletic association will permit it was decided to allow the high school boys to play the eight graders and it was also decided to include six events for the girls at the track meet.

SCHOOL GYM PLANS DELAYED BY HIGH COSTS

With only \$35,000 on hand to finance the construction and equipment of a gymnasium and manual training building, the school board is faced by an expenditure of about \$45,000, because the rising costs have affected the situation to the extent of about \$10,000 since last August when the original estimate was made. Bids were received Wednesday night and the total of the lowest proposals for the general contract, heating, plumbing and wiring is \$40,805, which does not include the hardware and electrical fixtures, the fee of the architect and the equipment for the building.

The school board rejected all of the bids and will take time to consider the situation, which offers little hope, as costs are still mounting. There are three alternatives, one of them being to go to the taxpayers for authority to issue \$10,000 more bonds, the second to delay construction, which might mean a period of years and operate the schools without proper buildings and apparatus, and the third is for some public spirited philanthropist to come forward and help the schools out of a hole. Oregon City, bid \$5500 on the heating and immediate prospect of securing one.

The lowest bidders were: Tranchell & Parelis, general contract, \$32,538; M. J. Walsh Co., wiring, \$827; Rushlight & Hasterd, heating, \$5,475; Rushlight & Hasterd, plumbing, \$1965; Pope & Co., of Oregon City, bid \$5500 on the heating and \$2250 on the plumbing. The highest bidders on the general contract were Hopkins & Andrews, with a figure of \$56,588.

Mrs. Florence Harlow, of Oregon City was elected for the remainder of the year as primary teacher in the Eastman building, to succeed Miss Ethel Martin, resigned.

Father Of Local Dentist Passes On

Dr. L. G. Ice, of this city, has received word of the death of his father, Dr. C. H. Ice, prominent physician of Mannington, West Virginia. His death occurred early of last week, and was due to heart failure, of which he had been a sufferer for about a year, and his death was not unexpected by members of his family.

Dr. Ice was stricken on Market street at Mannington, at 2 o'clock that afternoon while conversing with friends and was carried to his office, where medical attention was given him, but he passed away shortly after being taken to his office.

Dr. Ice practiced medicine for the past 22 years at Mannington. He had visited in Oregon City with his son and his family on three different occasions, and had made many friends while here.

SEEKS DIVORCE

Alice G. Straus filed suit for divorce against William Strauss Wednesday alleging cruel and inhuman treatment and desertion.

They were married in Portland May 31, 1913, and have resided in Clackamas county for some time.

The alleged desertion occurred in 1917 and the plaintiff asked for the restoration of her maiden name, Alice G. Sparks.

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
