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SCHOOL BOARDS OF CLACKAMAS COUNTY TO HOLD CONVENTION

A convention of county school boards will be held in this city April 10 at the Baptist church to take steps to settle the question of the scarcity of teachers. A good program has been arranged for the meeting, which will start at 10 o'clock.

The scarcity of teachers has reached a critical point all over the country and Superintendent Calavan says it is necessary for Clackamas county to take steps to prevent teachers leaving to take positions that pay better in other counties.

Teachers are quitting their professions and taking up other lines of work that pay better and this condition calls for immediate action on the part of the various school boards according to Mr. Calavan.

The South Dakota Primary

General Leonard Wood's victory in the South Dakota primary election was to have been expected, though Governor Lowden's vote in that state exceeded the most sanguine expectations of his followers. South Dakota was a Roosevelt state, and Wood was heralded far and wide as the logical successor of the ex-president. He visited the state in company with young Theodore Roosevelt a few months ago, and this incident gave considerable support to his candidacy. When Hiram Johnson announced his candidacy soon after General Wood had been to South Dakota, the Rooseveltians frankly told the California senator that he would not receive their support; that it would go to Wood and that the aspirations of Johnson would be frowned upon, in the belief that the progressive Republican vote would be divided. Political observers had no idea that Lowden would make a strong showing in South Dakota, yet he ran a close second to Wood, with Johnson a near runner-up.

Had Johnson or Lowden carried South Dakota in the presidential primary, the loss to General Wood would have been severe, and would have materially injured his prospects in the national convention and would most certainly have impaired his prestige as a candidate. The political effect of the election means the definite elimination of Johnson, if it means anything, and the vote amounts to a practical repudiation of him as a Roosevelt candidate. He did draw, however, and will draw in other states the radically progressive strength of the Republican party, and he may carry a few Western states in addition to California, which has been conceded to him from the beginning, just as Illinois has been conceded to Governor Lowden. As the Enterprise has previously said, the real fight is between Wood and Lowden, and while the former appears to have the jump in the early stages of the contest, the Lowden banner has been marching right along, with the ultimate outcome plainly in doubt.
