Cottage Is Erected In Record Time

Building a four-room cottage, equipping it with porcelain bath tub, lavatory, and porcelain wash basin, electric lights, clothes closet in eight days' time has been accomplished in this city and it is considered a good job. Chaplin's Leading Lady Is Injured

LOS ANGELES, April 14.—Edna Purviance, motion picture actress, who has "played opposite" Charles Chaplin since the famous comedian's earliest success, lies seriously injured today as the result of an automobile accident that may mar her face for life.

Miss Purviance sustained a deep cut across her face from nose to ear when a big motor car in which she was riding with C. M. Greer of New York was struck by a speeding machine occupied by two unidentified negroes.

The actress was hurled into the windshield, which splintered. Greer, wealthy horseman and polo player, was uninjured.

J. WILBUR IS GRANTED PAROLE BY CAMPBELL

Julius Wilbur, who was convicted December 18, 1916, on a charge of bootlegging, and sentenced to serve six months in the county jail, and has been fighting the sentence since that time, was granted a parole Wednesday by Judge Campbell. Wilbur had served two days of the sentence when the parole was granted.

Wilbur was proprietor of the famous Friars club at Milwaukee and was convicted three different times of selling liquor. He was fined the first time and the second was given a jail sentence and a fine, but was paroled from the sentence. The third time he was convicted he was given a six months jail sentence and a fine of \$200. He appealed the case to the supreme court of the state, where the conviction was confirmed. He then appealed the case to the supreme court of the United States, where it was dismissed, leaving the case as it was before appeal.

When the order of dismissal was handed down District Attorney Gilbert L. Hedges, asked for a bench warrant for Wilbur, who had left the state. At the same time Hedges asked for the forfeiture of Wilbur's bonds of \$1000, which request was granted.

Wilbur was located at Oakland, Calif., and was arrested on telegraphic orders from the Clackamas county officers. Extradition papers were secured and Deputy Sheriff Hughes left for the southern state to secure the prisoner. After Wilbur's arrest he began to fight extradition on the grounds that a pardon was being considered by the Oregon governor. When asked for information regarding this

Governor Olcott denied all knowledge of the matter. Wilbur then tried for habeas corpus proceedings, but this was also denied.

Hughes and Wilbur arrived in Oregon City Monday of this week and the prisoner was turned over to the sheriff. Attorneys for Wilbur were still striving for the freedom of their client and secured letters from prominent fluent of Portland and Oakland asking the court to show leniency. Judge McGinn, of Portland, came to Oregon City and made a strong appeal for Wilbur's release and Judge Kavanaugh, and Gatens also made appeals by letter.

District Attorney Hedges held that the court had no authority over the matter as the prisoner had been given into the keeping of the sheriff and was then serving his sentence and claimed that the governor was the only one with authority to grant a parole. The court took the matter under advisement Tuesday and promised an answer Wednesday.

To obtain the pardon Wilbur was compelled to pay the costs of the case to the state and also for the expenses of bringing him back to serve the sentence. The circuit court costs were \$170.40 and the supreme court \$72.50. Besides these expenses Wilbur had to pay \$65 for Hughes's expenses to California and back. These with the \$300 fine makes a total of \$608.90.

Wilbur is in the automobile business at Oakland and immediately after being released Wednesday left for Portland to transact business and will leave in a few days for California.

TEACHERS AND BOARDS DISCUSS TAX MEASURES

One of the best attended and most interesting meeting of teachers ever held in Clackamas county was that held at the Baptist church in this city Saturday by the various school boards and teachers of the county.

The meeting was called at 10 o'clock and the day was featured by addresses of several prominent public speakers. Mrs. Alexander Thompson, the only woman member of the Oregon legislature gave an address on the two-mill tax and was followed by Grant B. Dimick. Both speakers brought out the benefits to be derived from the bill and the addresses were well received.

County School Superintendent S. S. Duncan, of Yamhill county, gave a forcible address on the scarcity of teachers and the wage situation and brought out the fact that it was necessary to take some action to overcome this difficulty.

Professor J. A. Bexell, dean of the school of commerce at Oregon Agricultural college, gave a talk on the millage tax for higher education. This was well received and very interesting.

H. G. Starkweather and J. E. Hedges gave talks on the school board's relationship to the schools and there were several very interesting discussions on various subjects pertaining to schools. Some criticism was brought out on the minimum wage question for the teachers but the two-mill tax was unanimously endorsed in the following resolution:

Resolved: That, whereas our present method of raising the funds for the support of our public schools places 70 per cent of the burden of taxation directly upon the school districts, many of which are small and have a low valuation, a fairer, more democratic means of distributing this burden is needed.

That, whereas, the two-mill state tax bill will place a tax upon all property including millions of dollars worth of property in the state that escapes the local district school, and thereby does not do its share toward supporting the public schools.

Therefore, be it resolved that we, the members of Clackamas County School Board convention, do most heartily favor the passage of this bill at our next election.

LOOT RECOVERED

LOS ANGELES, April 14.—A bold attempt to rob the First National bank of what thieves thought would be thousands of dollars, resulted, Tuesday, in the loss and quick recovery of \$1,300,000 in negotiable checks. A satchel containing the checks was snatched from beneath a counter at postoffice sub-station C downtown and later found where it had been abandoned in a lumber yard.

Carelessness of a bank messenger was blamed.

HIGH SCHOOLS AND GRADES ARE TO HOLD TRACK MEETS MAY 8

The date of the high school meet was changed in order to allow the athletes to participate in the state meet, May 15.

A good program has been arranged for the boys, including dashes, relay races, jumps, pole vaulting, weight throwing and the javelin.

The girls are to actively participate in the meet and a program has been arranged for them similar to that of the boys.

In addition to the track meet the base ball games will played as follows: Boring vs. Estacada; Milwaukie vs. Oak Grove; Gladstone vs. Barclay; Estham vs. Mount Pleasant; Willamette vs. Bolton; Canby vs. Molalla.
