RATE EXPERTS ARE TO HOLD MEETING WITH COMMISSION

SALEM, April 8.—Members of the
public service commission, together
with rate experts and traffic engi-
neers connected with those commis-
sions, from the state of Washington,
Oregon, Idaho, Montana, Utah and Ne-
vada, will meet in Portland Friday
and Saturday for the purpose of draft-
ing recommendations of the National
Association of Public Utility and Rail-
way Commissioners relative to the
standardization of accounting rules in
use by the various state regulatory
bodies.

The meeting has been called by O.
O. Caulderhead, rate expert and traffic
engineer with the Washington commis-
sion, who is chairman of the commit-
tee on accounting of the national as-
sociation. E. J. Green, engineer with
the Oregon commission, is also a mem-
ber of the national association.

STOLEN AUTOMOBILE RETURNED TO OWNER AFTER YEARS TIME

In May, 1919, the Ford car of A. K.
McDonald, of Seattle, was stolen and
was not located until a few days ago
when it was found in the possession
of Herman Seibert, of Damascus.

Mr. McDonald reported the loss of
his car to the Oregon authorities and
when Seibert applied for a license this
year and gave the number of his en-
gine it was discovered to be the car
stolen. Seibert had purchased the car
from the Frances Motor company of
Portland some time ago. He wanted a
roadster and as there were none in
stock the company changed the body
of the stolen car to meet the
requirements.

Mr. McDonald came to this city Fri-
day and with Deputy Sheriff Meads
recovered his car and Mr. Seibert ac-
companied him to Portland, where he
will try to arrange a settlement with
the motor company.

Game Commission To Sell Pheasants

SALEM, April 9.—All Silver and
Amherst pheasant owned by the state
game commission at its game farm at
Corvallis are to be sold. Game War-
den Carl Shoemaker said Thursday.
Reason for their disposition lies in
their uselessness as game birds. The
birds were raised for show and experi-
mental purposes. A pair of pea fowls
will also be sold. Prices quoted are
\$25 a pair for the peafowls, \$15 for
the Silver pheasants, \$16 for the Am-
herst pheasants and \$7.50 for hybrids.

Oregon Paper Co. Buys Water Power

SALEM, April 9.—Transfer of all
the "north power" on Mill creek here
from the Salem Flouring mills to the
Oregon Pulp & Paper company for use
in the operation of its plant now
in the course of construction, is said
to be involved in a deal pending be-
tween the two interests, which is said
to involve a consideration of \$100,000.

A total of 15 acres of land adjoining
the three power sites in the "north
power" units is said to be included
in the proposed transfer. The power
sites are of sufficient capacity to de-
velop approximately 2700 horsepower
to which another 1000 horsepower will
be added through the erection of a
power plant at a cost of approximate-
ly \$50,000.

TO PROBE GRAIN RATE
SALEM, Ore., April 9.—Arguments
on the Oregon grain rate case will be
heard by the interstate commerce
commission at Washington, D. C., on
April 17. J. O. Bailey, assistant at-
torney general, will leave Sunday for
Washington, where he will represent
the Oregon public service commission
in the hearing.

Finish The Program

Oregon has started on a comprehensive program of
highway construction and is facing an acute situation
which will force the state highway commission to slow
up unless additional funds are made available. It is
proposed to meet this situation by permitting the state
to issue road bonds in amounts aggregating four per
cent of the assessed valuation of the state's property,
the present limitation being two per cent, though the
limitation of counties to vote bonds for road purposes
has been increased to six per cent, and Clackamas was
one of the first counties to take advantage of the op-
portunity to vote bonds for better roads and more
roads, though Clackamas voted against the proposal to
raise the limitation.

It should be remembered that the state and federal
governments have set aside one and one-half millions
of dollars for expenditure in Clackamas county, and
second that the bridge project is not yet out of the woods.

The present bridge across the Willamette river,
connecting Oregon City and West Linn, and joining the
east and west sections of the county together will have
to be replaced with a new structure. This is evident.
There is no dodging it. The old bridge is unsafe and the
county authorities are probably fully aware that they
are taking chances in permitting it to remain open for
traffic.

The state highway commission agreed to pay one-
half of the cost of a new bridge, a modern structure, the
longest span of its type in this country, if not in the
world, a bridge that will be an ornament and that will
have a durability of a hundred years. The very liberal
offer of the commission was based upon an estimate
made last fall of about \$268,000. Since that time costs
have advanced. Labor and materials are higher and the
present estimate is nearly \$100,000 in excess of that
originally made. The commission is unable to do more
than it first agreed, and is willing to pay one-half of the
higher cost if the funds are available. Clackamas county
is in no position to pay more than half of the cost of the
structure, yet the bridge must be built.

There is only one answer. The limitation measure,
on the ballot at the primary election, must be passed, to
give the state adequate money. Clackamas is interest-
ed to an appreciable extent. The amendment carries
no tax as the bonds, when authorized, will be paid out
of the automobile licenses and the gasoline tax. Good
roads advocates have a plain duty to perform at the com-
ing election.

ED FORTUNE FILES PETITION TO ENTER RACE FOR CONSTABLE

Ed Fortune, constable for the past
term, filed his petition Tuesday for
the Democratic nomination for that
office for district No. 4.

Mr. Fortune is well known in Clack-
amas county, having resided here for
the past 30 years and gives the fol-
lowing as his platform for the nomina-
tion:

"Strict enforcement of all laws; co-
operate with all peace officers in ap-
prehending criminals and law viola-
tors; serve all criminal proceedings
with promptness. Have kept all pre-
election pledges. Kept down the ex-
penses of the office of which the court
records speak for themselves.

To be placed on the ballot: Adhere
strictly to business and give special
favors to none.

DRIVERS SHOULD USE ENGINE AS BRAKE ON STEEP INCLINES

Abuse of the brakes on an automo-
bile is characterized by an automo-
bile manufacturer as the most care-
less habit of many motorists. So
many fail to realize that depending
long steep hills on the brakes alone
tends to burn them out and will at
least decrease their braking power.

His suggestion is that the auto-
moblist learn to use his engine as a
brake. On ordinary grades this can
be done by pushing the throttle to full
closed position, leaving the clutch en-
gaged so that the car will drive the
engine.

On exceptionally steep hills, closing
the throttle, shifting into second or
first speeds and having the car
drive the engine will usually prove
effective in reducing the speed. Should
the car continue to descend too rapid-
ly use the brakes.

Cutting off all ignition will also
aid in stopping the car under such
circumstances and will have the
added advantage of helping cool the
engine.

DIFFERENTIALS ARE WORKED OVERTIME BY USE OF ONE CHAIN

You often see cars ambling along
the wet pavements on a rainy day
with a tire chain on only one of the
rear wheels. While it is true that by
insuring good traction for one of the
rear wheels the chances are that the
car will be able to move over even
the slipperiest places, still it is a
bad practice to use only one chain
because you are thereby imposing too
great a strain on the differentials. By
working it overtime in this fashion
undue wear is the result and no doubt
many noisy axles come from just such
thoughtless stunts as this. By using
but one chain you gain nothing except
the few minutes extra time it would
take to put on the other chain. A
word to the wise is sufficient.

Two Formulas Given To Clean Upholstery

ing leather upholstery than the old-
fashioned formula: Raw linseed oil
and turpentine mixed in proportions

best cleaning agent is plain cold water
and a solution of three-quarters of an
ounce of common salt and two ounces
