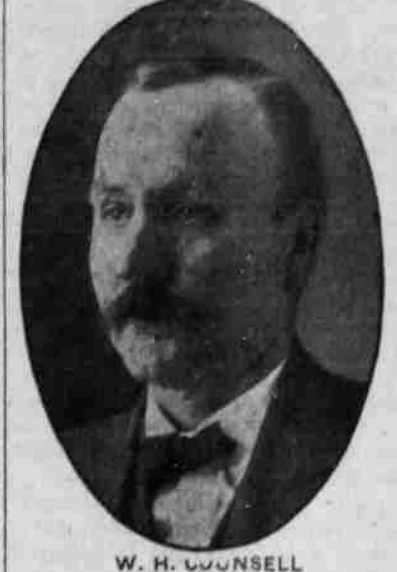
MOTHER IS WORRIED

GRAND JURY RETURNS INDICTMENT AGAINST JENNINGS LODGE MAN

The Clackamas county grand jury returned an indictment Monday against C. A. Elwell, former postmaster and merchant at Jennings Lodge, who is charged with arson. It is charged that Elwell, who conducted the store at Jennings Lodge, on December 26, 1919, burned the building and the content and when he was arraigned in the justice court he waived preliminary hearing and was released on bail. Bail was fixed at \$1500 Monday and C. D. Atchley and Carl Starker, of Jennings Lodge, went security and Elwell was released pending his trial. Elwell was also arrested by the federal authorities, who charged him with misappropriating postoffice funds and he was released on bail and will be given a trial later.

They are now intending to enjoy a much needed rest, and among the trips they have planned for the summer is one to California, which will be made in their automobile.

Mr. Willis was a resident of Oregon City for many years, where he engaged in the blacksmithing business, and is well remembered by the early pioneers, and has been a resident of Albany for some time. He recently suffered from influenza, terminating into pneumonia.

Mr. Willis is survived by his wife and two children, Rockwell Willis and Mrs. Anna Crawl. He also leaves two sisters, Mrs. Amanda Dewhurst, of Livermore, Calif., Mrs. Mary V. Howell, of Oregon City.

Sues To Collect Promissory Note

Katherine Rometsch filed suit Tuesday against Daniel and Irene Johnson to collect on a promissory note for \$13,000 given March 25, 1918. There was a mortgage given on property in Clackamas county to secure the note and also a mortgage on personal property.

Part of the personal property was sold and the money, was applied on the note. Plaintiff alleges that the defendants have defaulted on payment of the interest and that none has been paid since March 28, 1919. It is also alleged that the defendants have failed to pay the taxes, amounting to \$90.45, and that the plaintiff paid these. A settlement is asked for the balance of the note and the interest and \$750 attorney's fees.

Jury Recommends Repairs On Jail

Before the Clackamas county grand jury ended their session Monday they recommended that the county jail be renovated and that new mattresses be provided for the beds and the bedding be laundered.
They also recommended that the necessary changes be made in the tax department to provide more room and that the floors in some of the offices be repaired as they were getting badly worn.

Use Soap To Stop Leak In Gas Pipe

Comparatively few owners and drivers of motor cars are aware of the value of soap for sealing leaky joints in the gasoline system. Very frequently gasoline oozes out around the filler cap, especially when the tank is nearly full such a leak is objectionable because the gasoline spreads over the outside of the tank which nowadays is usually carried at the rear of the car, collects dust and impairs the finish. A coating of ordinary soap on the gasket and threads will prevent leakage, even when the tank is full. When joints in the fuel line and around the carburetor in particular develop small leaks, a coating of soap will usually prove efficacious.

Governor Olcott Visits Oregon City

Governor Ben W. Olcott, of Salem, was in Oregon City Saturday, having visited here while on his way to Portland, where he went to attend the funeral services of the late Bishop Hughes.

While in this city Governor Olcott visited Judge Thomas F. Ryan at the Bank of Commerce. Judge Ryan, who was in the state treasury's office at Salem for eight years, had office rooms adjoining the governor, who was secretary of the state at that time.

H. E. CROSS ENTERS RACE FOR JUDGE OF CLACKAMAS COUNTY

Harvey E. Cross, of Gladstone, filed his petition Tuesday for the Republican nomination for county judge of Clackamas county. Mr. Cross is well known in the county, having been a representative from Clackamas at the last legislature, and is one of the leading good roads enthusiasts of the state.

UNIFORMED POLICE ASSIST MASONS IN CONFERRING DEGREE

One of the largest and most enjoyable meetings of the Multnomah lodge No. 1, A. F. & A. M., the oldest lodge west of the Missouri river, was held Monday evening in the Masonic temple. An unusual event was the feature of the evening when 54 uniformed policemen from Portland, accompanied by Chief Jenkins, were in attendance, and put on the work, conferring the M. M. degree on a candidate.

Judge Grant B. Dimick, worshipful master, of Multnomah lodge, presided previous to turning the degree work over to the Portland visitors.

Following the impressive ceremony a delicious banquet was served in the adjoining banquet room.
There were over 225 Masons in attendance, many coming from the Logan section, and former members of Lone Pine lodge, which was recently consolidated with the local order, and a number from Canby and other sections of the county as well as from the Portland order attended.

FIRST INSTALLMENT OF WATER BONDS IS PAID ON APRIL 1

The first installment of water bonds numbering from 1 to 15 inclusive, and amounting to \$7500, has been paid by the water board of Oregon City. This is the first installment of the series of the South Fork water system. The amount was paid April 1, and the next will be paid April 1, 1921.

The outstanding indebtedness is still \$340,000.

The pipe line was constructed at a cost of \$375,000.

Water In Radiator Saves Sparkplugs

Operating the engine without sufficient water or with no water at all may result in injury to the spark plugs. To give service without cracking, the plugs must be properly cooled and provision for this is generally made in the water packing system. When the water runs low the plugs become hotter and there is great danger of their being damaged.

New School House Plan Voted Down

At a meeting of the residents of the Mount Pleasant school district Saturday evening the authorization of bonds for a new building was voted down 37 to 15.

S. S. Duncan, superintendent of the Yamhill county schools, gave a talk on the two-mill measure, which was well received by the large audience.

They have an income of \$75 a month from an estate in Illinois.

Viola Duncan also filed letters for appointment as guardian of Mary A. Stucken, who is 65 years of age and in poor health and according to the petition is incapable of taking care of her affairs. She has property valued at \$6000.

Anna Jane Burnett filed Tuesday for letters of administration of the estate of the late Arthur Burnett. This estate consists of real and personal property valued at \$4000.

Stanislaus Landi, 35, and Curtis 27, of West Linn, were granted a marriage license by the county clerk Saturday.

Earl M. Odum, 27, of Wendling, and Freda Bertha Wiese, 25, of Gaston, also were granted a license Saturday.

COMMITTEE FAILS TO DECIDE ON LOCATION FOR NEW CITY HALL

Failure of the joint council and Commercial club committee named to recommend a definite plan looking to the erection of a city hall and the purchase of modern fire apparatus to reach an agreement will result in the committee asking for additional time for further consideration of the question. The proposition has been before the city administration ever since the big fire of last November when the Methodist church and Price Bros. department store were totally destroyed by a fire that threatened the entire business district.

The committee, considering of Councilmen Eby, Tobin and Kelly, and A. A. Price, A. R. Jacobs and C. G. Miller, have held several conferences and have not been able to agree, and at a meeting Monday concluded to make a request for further time.

It is understood that the acquisition of modern fire apparatus will be followed by a general decrease of insurance rates in the business district of at least five per cent, including the paper and woolen mills located in Oregon City, and this saving will be sufficient to more than maintain a paid fire department.

There is a possibility, should the committee find that it is not able to agree on a plan for a city hall building, that it will sidetrack that feature of its work and propose that the city purchase a fire truck and establish a paid department, leaving the question of permanent housing for the future.

WILLIAM KARJALA IS GRANTED PAROLE ON FORGERY CHARGE

William Karjala, who was arrested about two months ago on the charge of forgery and has been held in the county jail pending action of the court, was sentenced Tuesday to not less than two years and not more than 20 in the penitentiary. After passing sentence Judge Campbell gave the young man a parole with the provision that he pay back the money obtained by the forgery, the expense he has been to the county, remain in the county and engage in a useful occupation and report to the court at certain times.

Karjala had been employed in road work near Mount Pleasant and securing two warrants belonging to his brother-in-law, came to the court house and representing himself to be the man the warrants were made out to, cashed them. They amounted to \$175.

Immediately after securing the money Karjala purchased a ticket for Calumet, Mich., his former home, and left for that place. Authorities here wired the Michigan officers and Karjala was arrested and returned here by Deputy Sheriff Meads.

Sentence was delayed while the court was investigating his war record with the Canadian forces during the world war.
