BONDS FOR REFUNDING WATER WARRANTS ARE VOTED ON AT CANBY

CANBY, April 21.—At the special election held at the city hall Monday, April 19, a large number turned out. This was for the purpose of issuing bonds in amount not to exceed \$7500, which shall draw interest at a rate not to exceed 6 per cent, providing for an annual levy to pay interest and principal. The money derived from such bond issue to be used for the purpose of refunding water warrants of Canby.

The votes cast amounted to 125, with 64 voting yes, and 61, no.

Harvey And George

One of the most interesting campaign documents that has come to light in anticipation of the primary election next month is a letter circulated by G. E. Hamaker, chairman of the Democratic county central committee for Multnomah county, in behalf of the candidacy of our own Harvey G. Starkweather, who just now in the business of trying to unhorse Senator Chamberlain and separate that distinguished statesman from the public crib. Harvey has some job on his hands, but we wish him well. Chamberlain has been able to obtain enough support from Republicans to defeat any Republican that ever went up against him for any office and the Democrats, up to the present time, have been almost a unit for him. But now there is dissension in the camp of the Oregon democracy, based, theoretically, upon the statements made by our senior senator in reference to the conduct of the war. We all recall that he found fault with the administration, and that Mr. Wilson, in reply, said the senator's utterances amounted to "unjustifiable distortion of the truth." The president made this statement:

"I am bound to infer that that statement sprang out of opposition to the administration's whole policy rather than out of any serious intention to reform its practice."

Mr. Hamaker charges the senator with having no vision concerning our needs, even after the Lusitana was sunk. He cut the appropriation for army trucks from \$150,000 to \$25,000 and provided only \$16,000,000 for field artillery equipment, though we spent \$396,000,000 for the same purpose within four months after we entered the war. He is said to be hopelessly out of step with the aspirations of the Democrats of Oregon. It may be that the senator listened closely to the slogan of "he kept us out of war" and imagined there would be no need for large appropriations.

In any case we're for Harvey as against George. If we have to swallow a Democrat we would prefer the Oregon to the Mississippi brand. There is a bright light ahead with strife in the ranks of the party that has always manipulated its forces to promote strife among the Republicans. Go to it, gentlemen!

JOHN P. IRVIN DIES AT ESTACADA HOME AT ADVANCED AGE

John P. Irvin was born in Jessamine county, Kentucky, February 26, 1836, died at Estacada, Oregon, April 17, 1920, aged 84 years, 1 month, and 21 days.

He was united to marriage to Mary K. Shortridge at Independence, Missouri, August 29, 1862; to this union were born 10 children, five of whom are now living: Alice A. Folsom, John T. Frank M. J. Alex and William K. Irvin. There are 14 grandchildren, and 6 great-grandchildren.

His wife Mary K. Irvin passed to her final rest April 2, 1913.

Mr. Irvin was a kind thoughtful husband and father, and to his friends a loyal and true friend. The deceased came to Oregon in 1875, residing in Salem until 1880, when he and his family moved to his farm at Garfield residing there for a number of years, later moving to Estacada where he lived until his death.

Final services for the departed were held Tuesday afternoon, April 20, 1920 at Mt. Zion church, after which he was laid to his last rest in the family lot at Mt. Zion cemetery. Many friends gathered to pay their last respect to the deceased.

CITY HALL AND FIRE TRUCK UP TO VOTERS

The city council solved the fire apparatus-city hall problem so far as its authority is concerned Wednesday night, when it adopted the report of the special committee of three councilmen and three citizens, recommending that there be placed on the ballot for submission to the people at the primary election May 21 two district propositions, as follows:

Authority to issue bonds in the sum of \$15,000 for the purchase of fire apparatus and an annual tax levy of two mills for the maintenance of a paid department and for the interest and principal of the bonds.

Authority to issue bonds in the sum of \$35,000 for the purchase of a site and the construction of a city hall building to house all of the municipal activities, including the fire apparatus.

The committee, consisting of Councilmen Tobin, Kelly and Eby, along with A. A. Price, C. G. Miller and A. R. Jacobs, has been in conference of and on for the last six weeks, and was unable to agree on a joint program covering both propositions, and was in receptive mood when approached by the Live Wires committee, consisting of Dr. L. A. Morris, W. A. Huntley, M. D. Latourette and E. E. Brodie, with a proposal to divorce the fire prevention question from the city hall, and submit them independently to the people.

The report carries with it authority for the mayor to appoint a committee of three councilmen, three citizens and a representative of the fire department, with power to contract for the purchase of fire apparatus, subject however to the passage of the maintenance measure.

Lloyd B. Heth, assistant United States district attorney in Chicago, announced on April 9 that he had received an unconfirmed report that Reed had been put to death in Finland.
