CHAMPION TYPIST SHOWS GREAT SPEED IN DEMONSTRATION

Miss Hortense L. Stallnitz, cham-
pion typist of the world, clearly dem-
onstrated her right to that title Tues-
day before a large and enthusiastic
audience at the high school when she
wrote 162 words a minute without an
error. This record was on her sec-
ond trial, the first being 153 words a
minute.

This speed was enough to convince
the most skeptical but afterwards
Miss Stallnitz wrote at the bewildering
speed of 137 a minute but this re-
markable record was marred with an
error, one letter hitting on top of
another. These speed contests were
made from manuscript.

Miss Alice M. Owens, head of the
educational department of the Remington
Typewriter company, who is ac-
companying Miss Stallnitz and man-
aging the tour of the country, gave a
very interesting address. After the
contest the two young ladies were in-
vited to the Live Wires luncheon at
the Commercial club and while there
Miss Owens also made an address.

Miss Stallnitz is only 20 years of
age and won her title to champion
of the world at the international con-
test held in New York, October 15,
1917. After she had been working on
the typewriter for one year she won
the novice championship and a year later
won the ama tour title with a record
of 137 words a minute.

The entire office force of the Haw-
ley Pulp & Paper company attended
the exhibition and many employees of
the court house also were present.

Miss Stallnitz is in the employ of
the Remington Typewriter company
and is making a tour of the United
States and only two days were spent
in Oregon, these being at Portland
with the exception of the short time
given to Oregon City.

WILLAMETTE MAN IS DEFENDANT IN SUIT OF CHICAGO NURSE

Ilean Koch, a nurse of Chicago,
who came here last week with the in-
tention of marrying Stanley Boginski,
of Willamette, whom she claims mis-
represented himself, has filed suit
for \$1000 damages and \$140 she al-
leges she has lost through unemploy-
ment and \$100 for her return home.
She also asks costs of the case.

The two people had been corre-
sponding for some time and finally
Boginski asked Miss Koch to come
to Oregon City and marry him. She
came and when she met her hus-
band-to-be she says she nearly fainted
for he looked nothing like the photo-
graph he sent her.

She alleges that she could hardly
understand him and that he is un-
able to write and evidently had some-
one write his letters to her. When
she refused to marry him she says he
at first agreed to pay her way back
to Chicago but later declined to do so
unless she would marry him. This
she declined to do and filed the suit
and asks the \$1000 damages for humil-
iation suffered by his misrepresentation.

BOARD OF EDUCATION FIXES SALARY SCALE FOR LOCAL TEACHERS

A graduated scale of salaries for the
coming school beginning next Sep-
tember has been fixed by the board
of education, with a minimum of \$95
a month and a maximum scale of \$115.
Teachers with one year's experience
will take the minimum scale, with an
increase of \$5 a month for each year
of teaching experience, the maximum
applying to teachers with experience
covering five years or more. A normal
school diploma will be equivalent to
two years' experience. The minimum
salary of high school teachers will
be \$120, and the salary of the prin-
cipal of the high school has been
placed at \$1800 per annum. The school
board has accepted the resignation of
Miss Edna McKnight, instructor of
English in the high school, who was
compelled to give up her position on
account of ill health.

A Dark Horse Possibility

When political forecasters say that unless Gen-
eral Leonard Wood is able to muster sufficient votes
in the Republican national convention to accomplish
his nomination on the first ballot he will be a dead can-
didate, they have sized up the situation correctly. Wood
is generally regarded as the leading candidate for the
nomination, but it is not at all certain that he will se-
cure a majority of the votes in the convention. That
other strong candidate, Governor Lowden, of Illinois,
is in very much the same position, and unless the Wood
and Lowden forces join hands and compel the nomina-
tion of one or the other of these candidates, the place on
the ticket will go to some man who is not now espe-
cially prominent in the public eye of politics. That
man is now a receptive, not an active candidate, but
keep him in mind.

There are certain strong influences in every na-
tional convention that remain in the background. There
are party leaders who are careful to refrain from en-
tanglements and who remain aloof from an allegiance
with candidates whose names are in the mouths of the
reading public. Such men, however, have a tremen-
dous influence, quietly but effectively wielded. They
are consulted on questions of policy and platform and,
if solidified, become a great power.

Out of the mass of Republican candidates, such
as Wood, Lowden, Johnson, Poinexter, Hoover, etc.,
looms the figure of an Ohio citizen, Warren G. Har-
ding by name. He is a member of the senate of the
United States and comes from that state which has
produced more presidents of the republic than any other.
He is broad-gauged, popular with his official associates,
and has stated publicly that no man in this country is
big enough to be an executive that will scorn the advice
and counsel of other men of affairs. In such a state-
ment, he differentiates between an autocratic president
of the Wilson type and most of our other presidents
who have sought the assistance of the best brains in
their party. If he should be selected, everybody would
know that he would not adopt a rule or ruin policy,
though his hand would be firm and his vision clear.

Watch Senator Harding, we say. He is not, at this
time, a probability, but he is certainly a possibility, and,
as such, under the circumstances outlined, he has as
good a chance to obtain the nomination as others now
basking in the limelight, and perhaps better.

The students of the Mount Pleasant
school visited the old historical home
of the late Dr. John McLaughlin, father
of Oregon, Friday afternoon, and
thoroughly enjoyed the visit, viewing
many old time relics of the early days
of Oregon. Many pieces of furniture
have been donated and loaned to the
old home which added to the appear-
ance of the interior. Among the lat-
est pieces of furniture, added to the
home is the piano given by the heirs
of the Holmes family of Mount Plea-
sant. This is one of the earliest
pianos brought to Oregon, and still
has the sweetness of tones.

Several show cases have been given
by the Huntley Drug company for the
preservation of some of the old time
relics. In the case shows several cop-
ies of the Oregon Free Press, a pub-
lication of 1848, and a letter written
by a Washington woman, who knew
Dr. McLaughlin when she was a child.
There are a number of fine pieces of
mahogany furniture formerly the prop-
erty of Mrs. Sophia Charman and the
late Mrs. Mary Charman. Among
these is an old fashioned sewing ma-
chine, Davenport, and writing table
that are highly prized by the Mc-
Laughlin Memorial association.
