JUDGMENT AGAINST WEST LINN IS UPHELD IN SUPREME COURT

The judgment of the circuit court in the case of the Oregon Engineering & Construction against the city of West Linn was confirmed in the supreme court of Oregon when the case was appealed by the defendants.

The engineering company sued the city to collect a balance of \$1234.23 for work performed on the water system of West Linn and was given a verdict in the circuit court here. The supreme court modified this verdict \$160.14 and the plaintiffs judgment will amount to \$1074.09.

When the work at West Linn was stopped by winter weather the city held back \$1500 to assure the completion of the system, partly for the reservoir and the sand pipe work which had been sublet by the engineering company.

CRUEL TREATMENT AND DESERTION IS ALLEGED IN SUITS

Irene Paycor and Frank Paycor were married at West Linn, May 15, 1915, and according to a divorce suit filed Friday she alleges cruel and inhuman treatment. She says that defendant has an ill temper and was always nagging and cursed her and threatened her with violence.

She asks the return of her maiden name, Irene Lee. Desertion is the cause given in the divorce suit of Sadie N. Rush against George P. Rush. They were married in Oregon City August 3, 1916, and the alleged desertion occurred in May, 1917.

They have one child of which the mother asks the custody.

FORD MAKES RECORD IN PRODUCTION OF MODERN TRACTOR

On February 19, at 9 a. m. Fordson tractor No. 100,000 left the assembly line in the Fordson plant at Dearborn, Mich., slightly less than two and one-half years after No. 1 was completed. And here again Henry Ford set a new record in the manufacture of farm tractors via the quantity production route," says W. Caulfield local distributor of Ford cars and trucks and Fordson tractors.

"Although the Ford interests are very recent entrants in the ranks of the tractor manufacturers, yet Henry Ford really built a tractor of the steam type before he started work on his first gas car. Now that the political pot is boiling and a dozen or so candidates have thrown their hats into the ring, why not a National automobile party. At first glance this may seem to be rather amusing, but when we think it over it becomes really serious. There are now about 7,000,000 motor cars and trucks in this country. In two years there will be 10,000,000. Even with the present number of owners, if all voted the National automobile ticket, they could swing every National and State election.

"For a platform," suggests Major Logus, local salesman with Miller-Parker, "the National automobile party might adopt the following planks:

"1. Good roads everywhere with a just distribution of the cost thereof.

"2. Scientific supervision of gasoline sources of production.

"3. Fuller use of the highways for passenger transportation by motor car, and freight transportation by motor truck, same to be encouraged by the Federal and State governments.

"4. Widening of highways wherever necessary to care for the constantly growing volume of automotive traffic.

"5. A scientific investigation of licensing rates and a just way of determining them.

"6. For president a big automotive business man who could operate the Nation on the same basis of efficiency on which he operates his factory."

Miss Koch said that she was unable to converse with her husband-elect as she spoke in a broken manner and that she has discovered that he could not even write English and that the letters received from him were evidently written by some one else.

Miss Koch spent about \$140 to come to Oregon City and she said that Begunski at first promised to pay her way back but later went back on his word and insisted that she marry him and then he would send her back to Chicago. She refused to do so and is now wondering how she will raise the necessary funds.

She is a nurse by profession and claimed that she was earning \$35 per week at her work in Chicago. They became acquainted in February, 1919, and have been corresponding since that time.

PORTLAND, April 19.—Joe Laundy, former organizer in Oregon for the I. W. W., was this morning sentenced by Judge Henry Belt of Dallas to serve two years in the state penitentiary, after the court had overruled the motion of George Vanderveer, attorney for Laundy, for a new trial.

Laundy was found guilty April 3 of violation of the state criminal syndicalism act.

China Offers Good Market For Trucks

In a recent speech, the Goodyear president declared that within the lives of his auditors, thousands of motor cars will be running in Chinese roads.
