HOW TO KEEP SMELT

BARLOW WOMAN DIES LAST FRIDAY AFTER FEW MONTHS ILLNESS

CANBY, Ore., April 28.—Mrs. Amanda Jesse, wife of W. W. Jesse, one of the most prominent residents of Clackamas county, died at the family home at Barlow Friday, after an illness of several months duration.

Mrs. Jesse was born in Missouri in 1839, and was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bogges. In 1859 she married Mr. Jesse in Missouri, accompanying her family to Oregon in 1870, where she has since resided, making her home first at New Era, when in 1891 the family moved to Barlow.

Mr. and Mrs. Jesse have been married over 61 years, and recently celebrated their 51st wedding anniversary.

Mrs. Jesse was the mother of ten children, two of whom are dead. The eight children remaining and all of whom attended the funeral services, are Mrs. Mary Parrot, of Portland; Mrs. A. D. Gribble, of Aurora; Mrs. Lena Bond Young, of Portland; James, and Frank Jesse, of Portland; Wood B. Jesse, of Lewiston, Idaho; William Jesse, of Barlow, and Fred Jesse, of Spokane, Wash.

The funeral services, which were largely attended, were held from the family home Sunday afternoon, with Mrs. Hiedson, of the First Spiritual Church, of Portland, officiating. The interment was in the family lot in Gribble cemetery.

GIRL INJURED WHEN AUTO JUMPS BANK ALL OTHERS ESCAPE

CANBY, Ore., April 28.—T. L. Collier and family had a narrow escape with their lives Sunday, when the automobile in which they were riding went over a steep embankment, throwing the occupants out and badly injuring Frances Collier, the 12-year-old daughter. The child's chest was crushed and she is also suffering from injuries to her throat. It will be necessary for her to be confined to her bed in one position for some time.

The automobile skidded when a rough section of the road was struck.

SUPREME COURT IS ASKED TO DISMISS DISBARMENT CHARGE

SALEM, April 28.—Dismissal of the disbarment proceedings instituted against George A. Hall, Portland attorney, was asked by Oval Pirkey of Portland, who appeared before the Oregon supreme court to show cause why Hall should not be disbarred from the practice of law in Oregon. The plea for dismissal was based on technicalities.

Disbarment proceedings were instituted against Hall and J. M. Selvers, an Oregon City attorney, several weeks ago, by the Oregon State Bar association, charging the attorneys with unprofessional conduct in conniving at the extortion of money from Parmelia L. Tyler, invalid mother of William Tyler who was being sued by one Ethel Tyler for an alleged claim as Tyler's housekeeper and common law wife.

Selvers failed to make an appearance Tuesday, the last day on which the attorneys could show cause as to why the disbarment should not be granted.
