Hiram W. Johnson

The Rooseveltian quality of fearlessness that Hiram W. Johnson has demonstrated since he became a political factor in his own state of California has won for him a place in the national councils and has made him a factor in the campaign for the Republican nomination for presidency. Johnson is credited with having wrested California from the political domination of the Southern Pacific company. He is a two-fisted fighter who takes to a political battle as a duck does to water. He has been able in California to dethrone a powerful machine and substitute one of his own that is more powerful than its predecessor. He, with many other politicians, find it popular to denounce the corporations, and rides into office very gracefully on a campaign of prejudice and class hatred.

Ultra-conservative politicians and newspapers will gain nothing by their attacks on Johnson. He poses as a friend of labor and labor is with him. He is bitter in his opposition to any league of nations, and every man who subscribes his antagonism to "entangling alliances" will vote for Johnson as the champion of those international relations diametrically opposed to the views of Woodrow Wilson and Herbert Hoover. Unless we are very much mistaken Johnson will carry practically every Western state and will go into the Chicago convention with votes enough to command respect, but with insufficient votes to gain for him the presidential nomination.

We believe that were Roosevelt alive today, he would prefer General Wood to Mr. Johnson. It is true that Johnson was Roosevelt's running mate in 1912, but he never maintained the same close, intimate relations that had existed for many years between Wood and Roosevelt. The peculiar turn of political fortune, however, has brought the tremendous group of radical Roosevelt supporters into the Johnson camp. General Wood is being supported by a few millionaire easterners, which appears to be enough to discredit his candidacy among the men who deserted the Republican candidates in 1912 and followed the Roosevelt banner to defeat. Wood is an administrator of high order and would possibly make a better national executive than would Johnson.

We cannot forecast the nomination of Mr. Johnson, but his vote in Michigan, in Nebraska and in Montana, along with his prospects in the far west places him in a position to be reckoned with when the great convention nominates its candidate and makes its platform.

SOLDIER BONUS BILL CAUSES ALL DAY DEBATE IN HOUSE

WASHINGTON, April 27.—The fight over the method of raising almost \$2,000,000,000 for soldiers relief legislation precipitated an all-day debate in the house today, during which Republicans on one side and the combination of Democrats and insurgent Republicans on the other explained their proposals.

Representative Johnson, Republican, South Dakota, announced that 75 Republican "insurgents" favored a retroactive "war profits" tax instead of a sales tax, proposed by Republicans. His statement, if borne out later, would indicate an upset of the Republican programme to pass the bill Monday without permitting action on the "war profits" (tax) proposal. Representative Garner of Texas, Democratic whip, predicted the result of Republican caucuses Friday night would be to "whip" the insurgents into line.

Ship Construction Is To Be Continued

WASHINGTON, April 22.—The senate commerce committee completed today its substitute for the house bill defining a permanent merchant marine policy.

The committee voted to retain with amendments the house provision directing the sale of the ships as soon as practicable.

The committee also inserted in the bill a new provision authorizing the shipping board to continue the construction of new ships.

FINE GURNSEYS ARE EXHIBITED AT CLUB MEETING SATURDAY

The grange hall at Clarkes was the scene of an enthusiastic meeting of the Clackamas County Gurnsey club Saturday. Members came from all parts of the county, bringing with them a picnic lunch of goodly proportions, which was spread out on two long tables at noon. The morning feature was an exhibition of fine Gurnsey cattle owned by S. Elmer, Clyde Ringo and Mr. Buol. Professor E. L. Westover gave an interesting talk on the merits of the different animals.

After lunch, M. S. Shrock spoke on the marketing problem; Professor Westover told of the great demand for Gurnsey cattle, and the difficulty experienced in getting them on the island. O. M. Plummer, manager of the Pacific International Livestock exposition, told of the great improvement in livestock that was taking place in the Northwest due to the interest taken by breeders in such shows. After the meeting four men signed up for stock in the big exposition, subscribing \$250 worth. The club passed several resolutions, endorsing the millage tax and the higher education tax, also endorsing the Pacific International Exposition, and the club went on record as in favor of having every cow in Clackamas county tested for tuberculosis.

In the absence of the president, Richard G. Scott presided.

MRS. NETTIE CONNETT IS FINED AND GIVEN LONG JAIL SENTENCE

Mrs. Nettie Connett, who was arrested last November by Sheriff Wilson and deputies near Bull Run, was fined \$500 and sentenced to six months in the county jail at Portland, on the charge of moonshining. She is the first woman moonshiner so far sentenced in the Portland courts.

When Mrs. Connett was arrested a large still was found in her home and a large amount of wash. She was given a hearing at Oregon City and fined \$100. She was immediately re-arrested by the federal authorities and has been at liberty on bail since that time.

After the sentence was passed Monday the woman was released on \$1500 bail awaiting the decision of her attorney to appeal the case.

Lebanon Girl Dies Tuesday Morning

Miss Grace Wagner, whose home is at Lebanon, but who has been working in Portland, passed away Tuesday afternoon at the Oregon City hospital after a brief illness of pneumonia.

Miss Wagner was taken ill a few days ago while at her work and came to Oregon City for treatment and spent a few days at the home of her sister, Mrs. L. W. Forsythe, Eleventh and Washington streets, and Tuesday she was removed to the hospital.

The remains are at the undertaking parlors of Holman & Pace and will be shipped to Lebanon for burial.

The State University Agricultural College and the State Normal

have for many years spent less money per student per year in training Oregon boys and girls than is spent at any other state institution. The present cost at the State University is \$203 even before the war, when money was scarce; at College, it is \$180. But would buy twice as much as it buys now, the average cost at all other state institutions was \$325 a year. In addition.

Their Building Investment is also very low.

At the State University it is at present \$322 per student; at the College, \$300. But in state institutions elsewhere, statistics show the average to be \$99.
