STARTS OPERATIONS
AFTER LONG DELAY**
At last after many weary days of waiting the big municipal elevator started operations Wednesday afternoon.

The elevator went out of commission during the cold weather last December when a cylinder was cracked after it had been frozen. The repair of this was delayed pending the decision of electrifying the lift and it was finally decided to repair the break. The contract was given the Oregon City foundry and the work completed a few days ago. Bert Roake, of the foundry, who was doing the work at the lift gave the machinery a try-out last Thursday but after rising a few feet the machine bucked and refused to go further. More trouble was found in the machinery and Mr. Roake has been working on this since that time.

The elevator will be welcomed by the residents of the hill section as the hot weather is coming on and climbing the steps is hard work at the best.

**Rents Are Boosted
Apartments To Let
Landlords Pay Penalty**
CHICAGO, May 3.—More than 1000 vacant apartments were thrown on the market over the week-end and real estate dealers are in a quandary as a result.

Hundreds of families whose rentals had been raised moved out May 1 without warning. Rents have advanced in many cases from 50 to 300 per cent, the agents pleading the law of supply and demand justified the increases.

Real estate agents estimate that 10,000 families who received notice to move May 1 refused to do so, defying the landlords because they could find no place to move.

The unexpected vacating of more than 1000 apartments has left the landlords in doubt. Many families doubled up, two to an apartment, and others moved to hotels rather than pay increased rentals.

WILSON'S STAND ATTACKED BY SENATOR KNOX

WASHINGTON, May 5.—Opening debate on his resolution to declare the state of war with Germany and Austria at an end, Senator Knox, Republican, declared in the senate today that President Wilson was arbitrarily maintaining that the nation technically was at war in order to coerce the senate into ratifying the treaty of Versailles.

"There was no excuse whatever for greatly prolonging the war beyond the signature of the armistice," Senator Knox said, "and the only explanation for so doing was the deliberate aim to retain all those autocratic compulsory powers with which the executive had been endowed for the prosecution of the war in order that they might be used for other purposes."

Germans Asked For Eighteen Billions

LONDON, May 5.—Premier Millerand, in the coming allied-German economic conference at Spa, Belgium, will propose to Prime Minister Lloyd George that Great Britain sanction a proposal to have Germany pay the allies a fixed annuity of \$600,000,000 for a period of 30 years, special dispatches from Paris today forecast.

Restaurants Charged With Profiteering

CHICAGO, April 29.—Government attorneys in Chicago started another high cost of living investigation today. This time it had to do with the action of profiteering lunchroom proprietors who have raised the price of coffee, which costs them only 2 cents per cup, including cream and sugar, to 10 cents a cup. Many restaurant men have boosted the prices of sandwiches to 15 and 25 cents.

General Decline In Stock Market

NEW YORK, April 29.—Bear raiding forced a general decline in prices throughout the entire list on the stock market again today. Call money jumped to 9 per cent, contributing to the general decline.

Steel common was forced to a new low at 94. Reading, which had held up comparatively well during yesterday's slumping market, finally gave way and at 85 was off nearly 10 points from the high of Tuesday. Corn products were forced down to a new low for the present decline at close to 95.

THREE ARE DROWNED

LONDON, April 30.—Seaplane No. 44, with a crew of five, fell in the sea near Felixstowe Thursday, resulting in the death of three of the crew.

FLEET READY FOR DUTY ON MEXICAN COAST

NEW YORK, May 5.—Six destroyers, accompanied by the tender Black Hawk, left their anchorage with the Atlantic fleet in the Hudson river at 2 P. M. today and sailed for Key West for possible duty in Mexican waters.

WASHINGTON, May 5.—Secretary Daniels today ordered a division of destroyers, now at New York with the Atlantic fleet, to sail immediately for Key West, where they will be held for possible duty in Mexican waters.

The destroyers are commanded by Captain Bryon Long on the tender Black Hawk, which will accompany the flotilla. Captain Long was in conference with Secretary Daniels here last night and left immediately afterward for New York to get his ships ready to sail today.

MODERN BLUEBEARD IS CHARGED WITH TWO MORE MURDERS

LOS ANGELES, Cal., May 3.—Walter Andrew Watson, alleged confessed bigamist and murder, lay in the county hospital today slowly recovering from wounds inflicted on himself in two attempts to commit suicide, while investigators were engaged in a further check on his revelation.

These, to date, include the admission of five murders, including two which, he said, he killed the women by beating them over the heads with hammers, and three in which he thrust them under the water and held them there until they died.

They also include a list of twelve admitted marriages.

Today R. T. Hardy, of Los Angeles, told the sheriff that in 1920 at Tecumseh, Neb., a woman and step-daughter formed the family of a man named "Hess," whom Hardy now believes was Watson. Hardy says the woman and her daughter disappeared and Hess told the neighbors they had gone to Omaha.

Shortly thereafter he also disappeared, after filling in a well on the premises. Suspicion was aroused, Hardy said, the well reopened and the bodies of the two women were found at the bottom.

LIFE TERMER WRITES BOOK ON EXPERIENCES IN OREGON PRISON

SALEM, April 29.—Based on his own "inside" experiences behind the walls of the Oregon penitentiary under 12 different wardens, and supplemented by data and information gathered from many of the larger penal institutions throughout the United States, Jesse P. Webb, a "lifer" in state's prison here, has produced "The American Prison System," a 262-page book said by many to be the most able and comprehensive presentation of the subject yet published.

STEAMER SAN MATEO GOES TO BOTTOM OFF MEXICAN COAST

SAN FRANCISCO, May 1.—The steamer San Mateo, owned by the Pan-American line of San Francisco, sank off the breakwater at Salina Cruz, on the west coast of Mexico, according to advices received at the marine department of the local Chamber of Commerce today.

Earlier reports said the vessel was stranded on the breakwater. It is presumed that no lives were lost when the vessel sank.

The ship and cargo are reported to be at total loss.

The San Mateo left San Jose de Guatemala April 26, bound for this city.

The vessel carried no passengers, the Pan-American line headquarters here reported. Her crew consisted of 21 men under Captain Bergmark.

MEXICAN REBELS RETREAT

BROWNSVILLE, Texas, May 4.—Juan Andrew Almazan, rebel leader, who with 300 men has been within striking distance of Matamoros for several days, today was reported to be retreating southward toward San Fernando, 90 miles from the border.

He approached to within 30 miles of Matamoros last week. His retreat was announced at American military headquarters here.

AMERICANS STRANDED IN FRANCE BY BIG HARVE DOCK STRIKE

PARIS, May 5.—The port city of Havre is today jammed with indignant Americans, some of whom are in a desperate plight, as a result of the refusal of the French line to allow them to stay aboard their steamers or insure them hotel accommodations when the dock workers' strike held up the departure of the liner La France.

A deputation of passengers came to Paris in automobiles this morning and besieged the main office of the French line with requests of relief for their fellow Americans, not a few of whom have neither night lodgings nor baggage nor sufficient money to tide over the crisis.

WOOD IS TO SETTLE HITCHCOCK-PROCTOR ROW IN NEW YORK

NEW YORK, May 5.—General Leonard Wood came to town today to settle the Hitchcock-Proctor row which his supporters claim is injuring his chances of gaining the Republican nomination at Chicago. The general went straight to his Eastern headquarters upon arrival. He declined to discuss the matter "at present."

"I am very well pleased with results of the primaries in Maryland and Indiana, though," he said.

In circles close to the Wood movement today it was confidently predicted that Frank Hitchcock will take supreme charge of the general's fortunes very soon and that Colonel William Proctor, the Cincinnati soap manufacturer, who has been "in the saddle" will be relegated to the background.

SOLDIER BONUS BILL FAVORABLY REPORTED FOR HOUSE ACTION

WASHINGTON, April 30.—Payment of a cash bonus to American war veterans of \$125 for each day of service, in excess of 60 days, is provided in a bill agreed on this afternoon by the Republican majority in control of the house ways and means committee. "Victory taxes" are provided to raise funds for the payment of the bonus.

The ways and means committee, by a strictly party vote, favorably reported to the house the soldier bonus bill. If approved by the Republican caucus today, the measure will be called up in the house next Monday for action.

Democrats strongly opposed the provisions of the bill providing for a tax on sales, but were outvoted by the Republicans.

Albany Students Kidnap Teachers

ALBANY, Ore., April 30.—Assembling on the courthouse grounds shortly before 9 A. M., Thursday, 250 high school students selected a delegation to invite Principal E. J. Hudson to attend "Flunk Day" picnic in which the entire school participated this year.

Hudson turned down the invitation. He told the students to go to their class rooms. They did. There they kidnapped several teachers, who, it is whispered, were not unwilling captives.

Swarming into automobiles, the students turned their backs on books and went to Knox Butte, four miles away, where they spent the day of contraband freedom. Students who did not go to the picnic stayed at home.

BRITISH PLANNING TO SUPPORT SULTAN IN FIGHT ON REBELS

CONSTANTINOPLE, April 30.—British troops, it is believed, plan to support the sultan's forces in the movement against Turkish Nationalists in Asia Minor, and even join in an aggressive offensive against Mustafa Kemal.

Elaborate preparations are being made by the British along the Anatolian coast of the Sea of Marmora.

The Circassians, who have been fighting in various parts of Anatolia, apparently are fighting the sultan's forces as well as the troops of Mustafa Kemal.

In many other ways the British are preparing for enforcement of the terms of the treaty with Turkey.

The announcement of the treaty terms is awaited here with considerable uneasiness.

JOHNSON'S CALIFORNIA MAJORITY INCREASING

SAN FRANCISCO, May 5.—With 1093 precincts missing and lacking returns only from Mono county, a sparsely populated community, the delegation that will support United States Senator Hiram Johnson at the Republican national convention next June continued today to increase its heavy overnight gains. The Johnson ticket early tonight on tabulations compiled from 4631 complete precincts out of a total of 5724 by 155,338 votes. The vote stood:

Johnson group, 333,916.

Hoover group, 175,578.

If the Johnson group continues to maintain its proportional lead the delegation, it was estimated, will be returned victor in the Republican contest by approximately 175,000 majority.

PAPER MILL WORKERS GIVEN INCREASE OF 4 CENTS PER HOUR

An increase of 72 cents per day in the wages of paper mill employees of the Hawley Pulp & Paper Co., and the Crown Willamette Paper Co., with in the last 90 days is indicated by the latest advance that has just been announced of four cents per hour for every employ in the mills, except those who are working on a monthly salary basis, and these, also, will receive salary increases on a sliding scale. The last increase of four cents an hour means that around \$200,000 per annum will be added to Oregon City's industrial payroll. The minimum wage in the paper mills has been increased this year from \$3.60 to \$4.32.

Negro Delegates Hold Convention

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., April 29.—When the Republican state convention yesterday voted to seat the delegation from Pulaski county, composed entirely of whites, all the negro delegates in the convention withdrew and adjourned to another hall, held a convention and nominated candidates for delegates to the national convention and for governor.

NAME OF POINDEXTER IS WITHDRAWN FROM OREGON PRIMARIES

SEATTLE, Wash., May 1.—Press of business at the national capital is the reason assigned today for the withdrawal of Senator Poindexter's name from the Oregon primaries.

J. C. Herbsman, who had been in charge of the Poindexter campaign in Oregon forwarded the official withdrawal to Salem.

Had Poindexter been able to make a personal campaign in Oregon he would have allowed his name on the ballot. It was stated. The other presidential contenders, General Wood, Hoover, Johnson and Governor Lowden, will remain on the ballot, though none of them will make a personal campaign. The primaries will occur May 21.

Resolution To End War With Austria

WASHINGTON, April 30.—The state of war with both Germany and Austria would be terminated under a resolution reported today by the senate foreign relations committee as a substitute for the house resolution to end the war with Germany alone.

The vote on the resolution was 9 to 6, with all of the Republicans supporting it and all of the Democrats lining up solidly in opposition. Senators McCumber, Republican, North Dakota, and Shields, Democrat, Tennessee, were absent and did not vote.

SPEEDER ARRESTED

Jacob Kristan, a farmer of Clackamas county, was arrested Wednesday by Speed Cop Long, who alleged that he was driving better than 35 miles an hour.

Kristan alleged that his speedometer only registered 30 miles and convinced Justice Stipp that he was right and escaped a fine.
