ETTA PARISH FILES SUIT FOR DIVORCE FROM LAZY HUBBY

Etta M. Parish filed suit for divorce Tuesday against Joseph C. Parish, alleging cruel and inhuman treatment. They were married October 19, 1901, and have three children. Plaintiff alleges that her husband is lazy and will not provide and that when they were married she deeded him a farm at Highland and in place of working this he mortgaged the place. Later she claims he made another mortgage and finally sold his equity in the farm for a house and lot, which he later sold for \$500 cash and \$400 terms. She claims that he spent this money and then sold his equity in the place. She further alleges that he made their children go to work and that she had to support herself.

She says that he has often threatened violence and told her that if she got a divorce he would kill her. She asks that he be restrained from coming to their home at 725 John Adams street as she is afraid of him.
