Miss Menga Batalgia went to Portland, on Saturday.

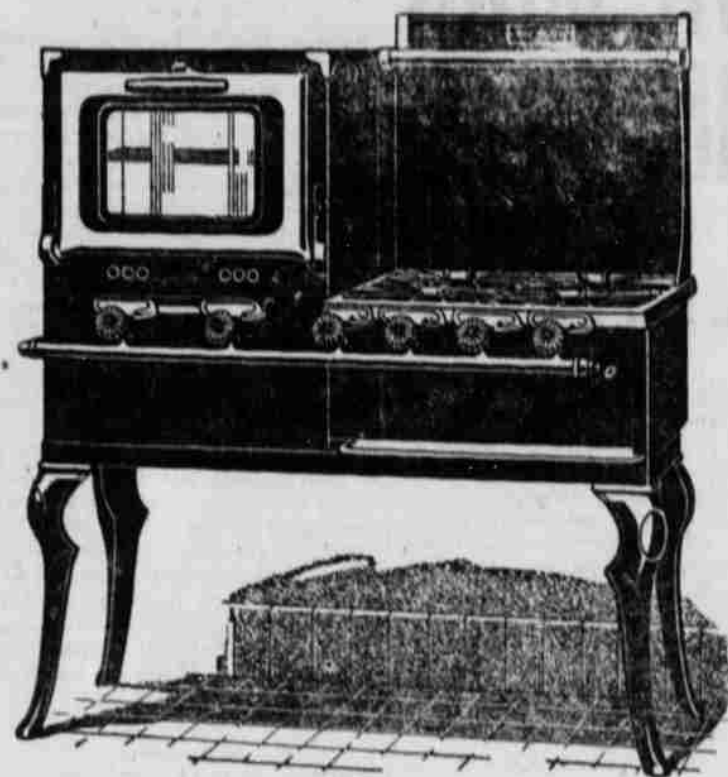

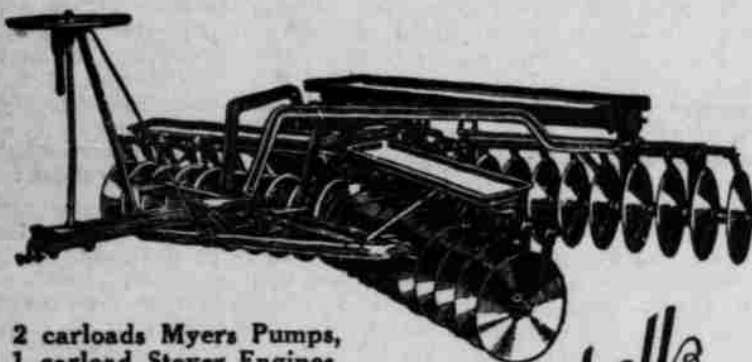
