CLACKAMAS COUNTY FAIR PROMISES TO BE EXCEPTIONALLY GOOD

CANBY, Ore., May 12.—Dave Long, secretary of the Clackamas County Fair association was in Canby this week, and accompanied Andrew Kocher to Gribble Prairie, where they interviewed L. Gribble, son of A. D. Gribble, the latter one of the prominent Jersey breeders of Clackamas county, and where they secured the assistance of L. Gribble as superintendent of the livestock department at the 1920 fair. Mr. Gribble has had much experience as a livestock grower, and his services will be valuable.

Andrew Kocher, who worked untiringly last year as superintendent of the poultry department, is to have the position again this year, and has already secured a number of valuable prizes for his department. He believes that from the present indications that this department will be even better than that of last year, for a number of poultrymen, who have never exhibited before, have decided to enter their birds and help the good cause along.

Among others contemplating exhibiting is the Russellville nursery near Montaville, as A. C. Newdell, representing the firm, was in Canby this week, and talked favorably of making an entry.

As the fair starts Monday, May 29, this giving many of the exhibitors time to make their booths ready for that day, and will continue for four days, and Friday and Saturday will be taken up in preparing the exhibits for shipment to the Oregon State fair.

The premium lists will be published and ready for distribution much earlier than last year, thus enabling those contemplating entering exhibits to make their decisions at an early early date.

Carl Joehneke, of this city, is to be a clerk of the fair. He has had much experience in this line.

More Than \$12,000 in Fines Collected by Sheriff

CORVALLIS, May 12.—The gasoline shortage has struck this city pretty hard. In order to regulate the distribution of the available supply the Standard and Union Oil companies have decided on what shall be done with the 6300 gallons allotted to Benton county. This will only meet one third of the ordinary demand, so it is to be sold to physicians first, then to truck drivers and, lastly, to ordinary automobile drivers.
