Poles Demand Huns
Disarm At Once

WASHINGTON, May 14.—The Polish government is reported to have sent a note to the allies demanding the immediate disarmament of the Germans as the result of clashes between Poles and Germans in Upper Silesia, according to a dispatch received here today from Warsaw.
The Warsaw dispatch declares that reports are current that the Germans are secretly transporting troops into Upper Silesia. The French are guarding the Polish consulate at Opol.

Wheat Belt Short
Of Farm Laborers

WASHINGTON, May 13.—Farmers in the wheat belt have agreed to pay a minimum of 70 cents an hour to harvest hands, in addition to food and lodging, yet there is more than usual likelihood of a labor shortage, according to Wade H. Skinner, assistant general director of the United States employment service.
Skinner estimated 60,000 harvest hands from outside will be needed to gather the crop, starting June 15, when the harvest rush will begin in Oklahoma.

DANIELS CRITICIZES
POLICY OF ROOSEVELT
ON NAVAL AFFAIRS

WASHINGTON, May 15.—Secretary Daniels today assailed the naval policies of former President Roosevelt and Taft, declaring they permitted the United States to lose its place as the second naval power of the world and allowed Germany to pass us.
"The greatest strides in the history of the navy were made under President Wilson," he declared.
Continuing his defense before the senate naval investigating committee, Daniels asserted the Wilson administration relieved the navy from the position it drifted into under the "stand-pat" policy of Roosevelt.
President Taft, he said, failed to recover the lost ground and as a result the Wilson administration improved the whole situation. "Between March 1913, and September, 1916, the navy increased in personnel, efficiency and material more than in any similar peace period in our history," Daniels asserted.

LARGE MOHAIR CLIP
TO BE POOLED AND
OFFERED AT AUCTION

TOLEDO, Ore., May 15.—The Eddyville mohair pool, consisting of 25,000 pounds of mohair, will be offered for sale at auction at Eddyville on Wednesday, May 19. The current year's clip exceeds last year's clip by 15,000 pounds, last year's pool of 15,000 pounds being bought by Walter Kilne, of Corvallis, at 62 1/2 cents a pound.

WAR VETERANS START
FIGHT TO PREVENT
PARDON FOR ALBERS

PORTLAND, May 15.—A fight to smash efforts to obtain a pardon for J. Henry Albers has been started by Scout Young camp No. 2, United Spanish War Veterans.
It will be carried directly to President Wilson.
Furthermore, the co-operation of other Portland organizations, particularly veteran bodies, has been asked as a means of withholding presidential clemency.
In resolutions denouncing Albers as an "undesirable citizen" and "a menace," the goal post of Spanish-American veterans asks President Wilson to deny the petition for a pardon.

DEMOCRATS GIVE
REGULARS SEAT
IN WASHINGTON

SPOKANE, Wash., May 17.—The "organization" forces of the Democratic party in Washington were credited with the honors of the first day of the state convention here today when the convention credentials committee late this afternoon upheld the action of the state central committee yesterday in seating the "regular" delegation of 268 members from King county.
The vote of the credentials committee on seating the delegation was 24 to 14, and came at the close of three hours of fervid debate between partisans of the "regulars" and of the contesting or so-called "federal" delegation. To the latter application the representatives of the delegation took sharp exception, declaring that the presence on their delegation of King county federal office-holders was only incidental.
The vote of the credentials committee, the first show of strength of the convention between the proponents of the state organization and the element opposing the re-election of A. R. Titlow as national committeeman, showed credentials committee members of delegations representing a total of 700 of the convention's 1168 votes supporting the Fuller delegation and representatives of 367 votes opposing the seating of the delegation.

ADJUDGED INSANE

John G. Smith, of Milwaukie was examined Monday and adjudged insane. He was committed to the asylum, where he was taken Monday evening.
Smith has been living in the woods near the top of the mountain. His strange actions caused an investigation.
