RIVER VICTIM IS FOUND EARLY FRIDAY MORNING

The body of Evan R. Thomas, of Portland, who was drowned in the early morning of April 30, just after starting on a fishing trip, was recovered Friday morning about 7 o'clock by H. M. Cahoon and Frank Dewey, of Portland, who were trolling for salmon. The body was floating near the bridge, not far from where it is thought the accident occurred.

Evan R. Thomas was a son of T. C. Thomas, of Mount Pleasant, and in company with David B. Thomas, of Portland, leased a boat from the Frieble boathouse at 4:30 on the fatal morning and within an hour the boat was found near the bridge partly wrecked and full of water. A search was made for the missing men but no trace of them could be found. Their automobile was found near the bank of the river and when the men failed to report for duty in Portland they were given up for lost.

Both men were well known in Clackamas county. E. R. Thomas having formerly lived at Greenwood and David B. Thomas resided at Beaver Creek. The former was employed by the McGuire real estate company in Portland, and the latter was assistant chief clerk of the Portland water bureau.

The body was taken to the Kenworthy undertaking parlors at Bellwood where funeral arrangements will be made.

Cross Country Air Service Is Planned

CHICAGO, May 14.—An aerial passenger line operating daily between Chicago and New York and San Francisco is a new project announced by Bion J. Arnold, president of the air board of Chicago at a meeting of the board yesterday. He said that ten ships with a carrying capacity of twenty-six persons each were under construction.

Huns Ask French Troops Withdraw

LONDON, May 14.—The German cabinet, after a full discussion with the ministers of the federal states, decided unanimously that Germany should not send representatives either to the Spa or Brussels conferences unless the French troops are entirely withdrawn from the Main district by May 16, according to a dispatch from Berlin today.

Furniture of Kaiser To Be Auctioned

NEW YORK, May 13.—Sixty-five pieces of the imperial furniture, said to have been left by Kaiser William to satisfy bill collectors when he moved from Berlin, will be offered to Americans at auction here May 22. The furnishings include hangings of the throne room, rugs and antiques.

Wilson Accused Of Personal Ambition

WASHINGTON, May 13.—To gratify his personal ambition, President Wilson, standing practically alone in his insistence on unconditional ratification of the peace treaty and the League of Nations, is willing to sacrifice the peace of this country, to injure our commerce, to jeopardize the stability of Europe," Senator Kellogg, Republican, of Minnesota, charged in the senate this afternoon.

Living Statistics Show Big Gains

WASHINGTON, May 15.—In a table showing the change in cost of living from December, 1917, to December, 1919, in several cities of the country, the bureau of labor statistics gives the increase for Minneapolis in that period as 32.71 per cent; Indianapolis 36.53, Kansas City 38.16, Denver 38.17, St. Louis 34.24.

Speed Demon Adds Records To List

DAYTON, Fla.—Tommy Milton concluded his record breaking motor trials by covering one-half mile in 11.57 and a kilometer in 14.40 recently, given him all the world's marks up to five miles. These records supplant those formerly held by De Palma. Injury to Milton's eyes when his car caught fire necessitated calling off at tempts for the twenty mile mark.

Women Are Robbed Of Valuable Jewels

SAN FRANCISCO, May 14.—A masked robber invaded a fashionable hotel in the heart of the downtown section and held up and robbed two women guests, in their rooms, of jewels valued at \$10,000, according to report to the police last night.

Maximum Bonus For Soldiers Is Proposed

WASHINGTON, May 14.—A maximum cash bonus of \$500 for the service man was agreed to today by Republicans on the house ways and means committee.

The maximum benefit to be allowed on the optional forms of aid (which are farm or home aid, vocational training or paid-up insurance) was fixed at \$625.

Chairman Fordney plans to submit the revised bill to the committee Wednesday.

CANBY HIGH WINS CHAMPIONSHIP WHEN ESTACADA BACKS OUT

Canby high baseball players are the new champions of Clackamas county. This was decided Friday afternoon at Crystal Lake park, Milwaukie, when the Estacada team failed to appear and the game was forfeited to the Canby boys.

Canby and Estacada were tied for first place, each going through the season without suffering defeat and were to play for the championship on neutral grounds Friday. Both teams were officially notified to be on the grounds at 1 o'clock, the game to start at 3:00 P. M. The Canby boys were there with bells and confident of winning the game but Estacada evidently got "cold feet" or had some fancied grievance for they were conspicuous for their absence.

This is not the first time that Estacada has failed to show up; they having refused to compete in the track meet at Gladstone last week. At that time they insisted on sending a team of athletes that were much older than the other school boys and when this privilege was refused they crawled into their holes and remained away, showing a very poor class of sportsmanship. Estacada has some good athletes and probably could make a fair showing if they ever wake up to the fact that they must give the other fellow some consideration.

Dr. Frank Mount was immediately summoned, and found Mrs. Edgecomb to be suffering from a fractured collar bone and painful bruises. Her son, William, was sent for and another son has been summoned to his mother's bedside.

MRS. ANNA M. CALIFF DIES ON MONDAY OF BLOOD POISONING

Mrs. Annie M. Califf, wife of Merwin Califf, of this city, died Monday evening at 8 o'clock, after a week's illness of blood poisoning, caused from an infection. Everything was done in order to save Mrs. Califf's life, her two eldest brothers, Fred and Charles, who saw active service in the big battles in France, undergoing operations in order to furnish blood for blood transfusion of their sister, Fred giving two quarts and a pint of blood and Charles about two quarts, but without avail.

Mrs. Califf was 25 years of age, and resided in Clackamas county for a number of years, first making her home at Bolton (West Linn). She was united in marriage about six years ago to Mr. Califf, and since that time has made her home in this city.

Mrs. Califf is survived by her husband, two little children, Victor, aged five years and Lavina Ruth, 14 months. She also leaves her parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Stuits, of this city; seven sisters, among them being Mrs. Lizzie Fugill, Misses Mary Emma, Dolie, Esther and Grace Stuits, and a married sister in Washington; four brothers, Fred, Charles, Paul and John Stuits, of this city.
