ALLEGED MURDERER COMMITTS SUICIDE AT GRAVE OF VICTIMS

GREENVILLE, Ill., May 18.—Harley O. Beasley, 25 years old, alleged murderer of his wife and two boy babies, today committed suicide over his wife's grave in Bethlehem cemetery, three miles from here. Beasley shot himself in the right temple.

Beasley had been hunted by about thirty possemen almost continuously since last Friday. A woods near here had been combed twice, but Beasley was not found. Shortly before noon today he emerged from the woods accompanied by his brother, Delmar, and visited the graves of his wife and two sons.

His eyes became tear-dimmed, his brother said, and before he could be restrained, drew a revolver from his pocket and kneeling at the graveside, pulled the trigger.

CANBY, Ore., May 19.—William Mainwood, residing just out of the city limits and north of Canby, who shot a pet dog at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Deere, has paid his fine of \$50 for carrying a concealed Mainwood was arrested by Officer Charles Bowland, and brought before the justice of the peace, William Knight, who set the fine of \$50.
