OREGON PIONEER TAKES OWN LIFE AT COLTON HOME

Harvey Lewis Ball, a well known resident of Clackamas county, who has for the past twelve years made his home with his brothers, R. D. Ball and D. C. Ball, of Colton, committed suicide Wednesday morning at 10:30 by shooting himself in the head. The cause of the deed was ill health. Mr. Ball having suffered for the past twelve years.

Mr. Ball arose Wednesday morning at the usual hour, and while sitting on the back porch of the home, exclaimed to his brother, Calvin, who was engaged in hoeing near the house, that he was ill. After partaking of a drink of water from the well he went back to the porch, and the brother engaged in gardening paid no further attention to the brother, until he heard the report of a gun. Rushing to the porch he found his brother dead.

In committing the deed, Ball tied a string to a chair and sitting in another chair, had tied the other end of the string to the trigger of the gun, and when jerking backward caused the gun to explode. From indications he had carefully carried out his plans at self destruction.

Coroner E. J. Johnson, of this city, was called, but only an inquiry was made, as the facts showed it was a case of suicide. H. N. Everhart, of Molalla, took charge of the body, and the funeral services are to be held Thursday afternoon at Carus, with interment in the Carus cemetery.

Mr. Ball was 68 years of age, and had resided in Oregon since a child. For many years he made his home at Canby, and fifteen years ago moved to three miles from Colton, where he has since resided with his unmarried brothers. He is also survived by another brother, George F. Ball, two sisters, Mrs. Frank Bonney and Mrs. Julia Pendleton. His mother died two years ago, and his father many years ago.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT—Referred to the people by the Legislative Assembly.
LIMITATION OF FOUR PER CENT STATE INDEBTEDNESS FOR PERMANENT ROADS.—Purpose: To amend Section 7 of Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Oregon so as to permit the creation of debts and liabilities for the purpose of building and maintaining permanent roads to the amount of four per cent of the assessed valuation of all the property in the State of Oregon, instead of two per cent as now provided by law.
NO PROPERTY TAX—NO DIRECT TAX
NO INCREASE IN AUTO LICENSE FEES
NO INCREASE OF GASOLINE TAX
Keep these three facts in mind. The present auto license fees and gasoline tax will pay both the principal and interest on all the bonds under this amendment, and will yield an annual surplus besides for other state highway work. No additional taxation of any kind.
